Year End Progress Report: The Good, the Bad and the Ugly

First, the good: District 6890 concluded the 2018-2019 year with a net GAIN of 21 members! Next, the bad: Net change from clubs in operation throughout the year was minus 6 (see chart at right for membership change by club). Our district figures were helped significantly by the charter of the newest Rotary club in West Central Florida, Lakeland TigerTown, whose 30 charter members included 27 new Rotarians! Welcome and Congratulations! Finally, the ugly: During the first month of the new year, Avon Park Breakfast Rotary voted to disband. While a number of their members are expected to join Avon Park (noon) Rotary, it still represents a significant loss.

Membership Takes a New Tone on an Old Theme at 2019 Training Summit

There was a different atmosphere during the Membership breakout session last weekend at the annual District 6890 Training Summit. Amidst his usual wit and wisdom, our Zone 34 Rotary Coordinator, George Robertson-Burnett emphasized the urgency of reversing declining membership in North America. Ed Odom added detail, pointing out a net loss of roughly 1,000 District 6890 Rotarians over the last two decades. The trend is not sustainable. Attendees learned more specifics about club flexibility granted by the 2016 Council on Legislation. Now is the time for honest assessment, and strategic application of club autonomy.
