POLIO UPDATE

One new case of Wild Poliovirus this week in Afghanistan. There now have been 13 reported cases of Wild Poliovirus year to date in 2018 as compared to 8 cases at this point in 2017 and an eventual 2017 total of 22 Wild Poliovirus cases. 10 of the cases this year have occurred in Afghanistan and 3 in Pakistan.
