

5 AVENUES OF SERVICE

1. **Club Service** focuses on making clubs strong. A thriving club is anchored by strong relationships and an active membership development plan.
2. **Vocational Service** calls on every Rotarian to work with integrity and contribute their expertise to the problems and needs of society. Learn more in *An Introduction to Vocational Service* and the *Code of Conduct*.

4. **International Service** exemplifies our global reach in promoting peace and understanding. We support this service avenue by sponsoring or volunteering on international projects, seeking partners abroad, and more.
5. **Youth Service** recognizes the importance of empowering youth and young professionals through leadership development programs such as Rotaract, Interact, EarlyAct, Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, and Rotary Youth Exchange.

HISTORY

- Rotary started with the vision of one man — Paul Harris. The Chicago attorney formed the Rotary Club of Chicago on February 23, 1905 so professionals with diverse backgrounds could exchange ideas and form meaningful, lifelong friendships.
- Over time, Rotary's reach and vision gradually extended to humanitarian service. Members have a long track record of addressing challenges in their communities and around the world.

GLOBAL POLIO ERADICATION INITIATIVE


- Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.
- As a founding partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.
- Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.
- Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

The polio endgame

Since 1988, when the WHO resolved to eradicate polio, its footprint has shrunk dramatically. It is only considered endemic in Afghanistan, Pakistan and Nigeria (which hasn't seen a case since 2016). Last year there were only 22 new cases reported.

- The test can be applied to almost any aspect of life.
- The test was scripted by Herbert J. Taylor, an American from Chicago.
- It was later adopted by Rotary International, the global federation of Rotary service clubs.
