Transitions

Every summer since 1993, Maria and I have vacationed on the same beach in Southwest Florida. It is a magical place that I like to call "Heaven on Earth" as in the 1956 Platters' song of the same name. I can't tell you how many sandcastles our two sons, Maria and I constructed on the water's edge at low tide, only to see them wash away a few hours later with the incoming waves. Doing that has been one of my greatest joys in life, and now we get to do it all over again with our grandchildren.

This magical beach is located in an ecosystem where the land meets the sea, and as such, the variety of animal life is astounding. Seagulls, willets, and sanderlings patrol the shore, while skimmers glide by with their bottom beaks in the water, occasionally catching a tidbit in their path. An occasional osprey with a mullet in its talons will fly back to its nest, while pelicans and least-terns dive nearby into a school of baitfish churning up the water around them. High above, the magnificent frigate birds ride the thermal air currents in search of schools of fish below. Schools of dolphin come within 50 yards of shore, and early in the mornings, an occasional manatee will swim within feet of bathers. At night, the sea turtles come on shore to lay their eggs. We all make sure to turn off our lights and close the shades of our apartments so that we don't disorient them.

All this is happening above the surface, but the variety of life underwater is just as marvelous. One of my favorite things is to get up early in the morning and

take my cast net and fishing rod to the beach, in hope of catching something tasty for dinner. It used to be that my two sons would accompany me, but they have grown up, so now it's my granddaughters who go fishing with me. Soon, my grandsons will be old enough to come along as well. If nothing else, they can guard my bait bucket from snowy egret or blue herons that try to steal my baitfish when I'm not paying attention.



Many years of sitting on the beach and watching the animals and the people going back forth – each minding its own business – can give one a perspective of the natural transitions in life. The beach is a setting where things and people are constantly changing, while things around them seem to be ever-present. For example, a very nice elderly couple from Coral Springs, that we befriended in the early

1990s have now passed away. First the wife, and a couple of years later, the husband. But now their two sons and adopted granddaughters come to the same beach every year. They don't remember us, but we still remember them.

A Cuban family from South Miami that we became friends with has expanded logarithmically, and now there are about forty of them coming every year. All the children have grown up and gone their separate ways. Most have gotten married and are now bringing their children to the beach to be with their grandparents ev-

ery year. I used to hear a lot of Spanish being spoken, but now English is the predominant language. A couple of years ago, this family set up two 10 X 10 beach tents side-by-side – one with the Florida Gators logo, and the other with the Florida State Seminoles logo. Predictably, this past summer, a third beach tent was set up next to the other two. This one had the University of Miami Hurricanes logo on it. I'm curious as to what's coming next summer.

People come and go, just like the wildlife. Tents and umbrellas that erected are often swept away by incoming storms. I'll never forget as we watched in amazement one afternoon the destruction caused as a waterspout came from the Gulf of Mexico and made landfall within 100 yards of our apartment. The waterspout tore through all the beach chairs and umbrellas as it made its way toward the hotel immediately north of us. Thank goodness everyone had left the beach minutes earlier and no one got hurt. But it was one of the most majestic and beautiful sights that I have ever witnessed up close. The mid-day thunderstorms on the beach are my favorites.

In this magical place, the waves pound the shore with a hypnotic rhythm every day. It never stops. I love hearing the sound of the waves pounding the shore, then immediately followed by the trickling sound of millions of seashell fragments striking each other as the waves recede. In this magical place, people come and go. I am saddened when I hear that someone I know has passed away. But it makes me happy to see the new babies experiencing the wonders of the beach for the first time. I watch in splendor as the sun rises and sets every day. In this magical place, every day is the same, but every day is different. Amid all the changes around us, some things seem to last forever. I am thankful that we get to be part of it for at least a short while.

In Rotary, we are now heading into January, and we are preparing for the transition into the new Rotary Year in July. Governor-Elect Allen is putting his team together, and he and his wife Theresa will be going off to Governor's training at the International Assembly in San Diego soon. I wish them the very best. For Maria and me, the International Assembly in San Diego last year was one of the most memorable experiences in our

lifetimes. I wish that every Rotarian could be there to experience it.

Shortly after returning from San Diego, Allen will be holding the President-Elect Training Seminar-1 (what used to be called "Pre-PETS) on Saturday, February 2nd for all 48 club presidents-elect, and for the new group of assistant governors. On that day, Allen will reveal the Rotary theme for the 2019-20 Rotary Year. Then from March 7-9, all club presidents and assistant governors will be expected to attend PETS-2 in Orlando, Florida. At that point, Allen will be well on his way to preparing for his year as District Governor. Likewise, the new club presidents-elect will meet other presidents-elect from clubs all around Florida and the Caribbean. They will exchange ideas among themselves, and they will get to hear some great motivational speakers. Don't be surprised if your club's president-elect comes back all fired up and ready to go after attending PETS-2.

January through June is a transitional period when the new club presidents and District governors do most of their planning, training, and getting ready for their years as servant leaders of Rotary. Ideally, this is a time when the current club presidents and the current District governors help to mentor the presidents-elect and the governors-elect through the transition. It is important for the continuity of the Rotary clubs and for Rotary in general that the current and future leaders work hand-in-hand to ensure a smooth transition. Continuity of leadership is one of the fundamental tenets that has made Rotary so successful over the years. It is imperative that we continue this long-established practice.

As for me, I will continue to faithfully serve my term as District Governor until June 30th when I turn over the banner to my good friend Allen. Then on July 1, I will be back on the beach, fishing with my grandkids again.

Fill the sled: Seminole Lake Rotary Club collects toys for foster kids through Red Sled initiative

SEMINOLE – For the fourth consecutive holiday season, the Seminole Lake Rotary Club continues its Red Sled initiative, working to collect toys and other gifts for the more than 3,500 children in the foster care system.

All donations collected will be donated to Eckerd Community Alternatives, which works with foster children and families in Pinellas County.

At the heart of the project is a giant Red Sled that the organization brings into the community through a variety of events, said Gerry Cachia, one of the toy drive's organizers. The Rotary Club then fills the sled with toy donations everywhere it goes.

Cachia promises a "bigger and better" program this year. In 2017, the club collected more than \$40,000 in toys and other gifts, gift cards and cash throughout the holiday season. This year's goal is "really lofty," he said - \$60,000 in toys and gifts for area foster children.

"What we've done this year is upgrade everything from the previous year," he said.

The initiative's signature event is The Red Party, which will be held Friday, Dec. 7, at Chapel on the Hill's Evans Hall, 12601 Park Blvd. This year, The Red Party will run an extra hour from 6 to 9 p.m.

"The Red Party has become huge, so this year we extended it," Cachia said. "People have just been having such a good time and two hours goes quickly."

At least 15 local vendors will serve a variety of food. A live band, the Citizens of Soul, will perform, and there will also be a DJ, cash bar and door prizes. Attendees are also asked to dress in red for the festivities.

Tickets to the event are \$20, and attendees are also

encouraged to bring a gift to fill the Red Sled.

The club will also bring the Red Sled to Robby's Pancake Breakfast hosted by the Gulf Beaches Rotary Club and Middle Grounds Grill Saturday, Dec. 9, 8 a.m. to noon., at the Treasure Island Community Center. The cost for breakfast is \$5.



The Red Sled, with Santa and his crew aboard, will close out the city's annual Holiday Night Parade, Sunday, Dec. 10, 6:30 p.m. The parade travels south along 113th Street after leaving the St. Petersburg College Seminole campus.

The Rotary Club asks parade attendees to bring a toy for the sled to the parade. Volunteers will collect these gifts from the crowd.

There are other ways to donate gifts as well, Cachia added. This is the first year that local businesses will keep donation boxes – miniature red sleds – in their lobbies for anyone who stops by with toys and gifts. Locations include the Seminole recreation center, Big Jim's Famous Steaks Tavern & Tap, Seminole Chiropractic and Wellness Center, Guardian Home Care Services, Dr. Sandra Lilo's office, Sea Hags Bar & Grill, Deloach, Hofstra, and Cavis, PA, Golden Bear restaurant, and Willie Jewells Old School Bar-B-Q.

Work with the Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Advisers

One of the strengths of the Rotary Foundation is that it has a well-developed process of evaluating humanitarian service projects. As members of the Rotary family, we invest time, money and skills offering hope to thousands. All of us would like to know the impact of our efforts, which is not always easy.

Evaluation of projects is vital because it can not only show us our impact, but also helps improve the way projects are designed and implemented. It also helps to ensure projects meet community needs, they are evidence based, do no harm and more importantly the outcomes are measured. This is where Cadre of Technical Advisers play a vital role.

The Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Advisers are a group of Rotarian volunteers with skills in the six areas of focus and training in program evaluation. Currently, there are about 150 cadre members assisting the Rotary Foundation with evaluating health projects. Cadre members help the Rotary Foundation review, monitor and evaluate projects and ensure grant funds are being used properly.

A Cadre assignment may include evaluating the technical feasibility of a proposed project, reporting on the implementation of an ongoing project, or evaluating the impact of a completed project. Specialist cadre auditors also evaluate the financial management of grant funds.

Global grants can appear daunting and the application process sometimes deters Rotarians with excellent project ideas. In 2015-16, there was 10% growth in the number global grants with the most number of grants (378) implemented in the area of disease prevention and treatment.

The Rotary Foundation accepts a broad definition for health projects. Grants can be used for capacity building and training, prevention of non-communicable diseases, improvement of health infrastructure including purchase of equipment, preventing disability, rehabilitation and physical therapy, spectral disorders, mental health, suicide prevention, treatment of substance abuse and depression, as well as scholarships, technology and vehicles that help promote healthier communities.

There is a high need to get involved in health improve-

ment program at this time. The grant process is designed to ensure the best use of our resources, it is not meant to deter anyone. Cadre members have the training to help anyone considering a global grant application. If you would like to connect with a local Cadre member for assistance planning or designing a project, contact your District International Service Chair for an introduction to local experts.

Do you want to add your expertise to the cadre? We're looking for Rotarians in all technical areas. Eligibility requirements include:

- Current, active member of a functioning Rotary club
- Good standing with The Rotary Foundation and Rotary International
- Professional experience in at least one of the technical sectors

We need Rotarians in Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean, and Southeast Asia in all areas of focus, particularly experts in the following areas:

- Agriculture, small enterprise development, vocational training, or adopt-a-village projects
- Medicine and health care, including doctors, nurses, midwives, and public health workers (especially women)
- Water and sanitation in schools, hygiene education, or water and sanitation advocacy
- Community health care training, mobile health care technology, or infectious disease control
- Teacher training or curriculum development that incorporates technology




