This month is the first of a four-part series about leadership. Hands down, the reason I stay in Rotary is because Rotary is where my friends are. The first object of Rotary sums this up: "The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service." The friendships and relationships Rotary has given me access to have played a vital role in my personal development, not only as a person, but as a businessman. Leadership development has been another area that has shaped my life significantly through my connection with Rotary. Developing leadership skills is similar to getting your physical body in shape. The Center for Creative Leadership has also helped inspire me in this area.

Fundamental Leadership Skills

1) Self-Awareness 2) Communication 3) Influence 4) Learning Agility

Self-Awareness is critical to each of us because this is how we as individuals can understand ourselves on a highly personal level. Core personal development occurs through our self-awareness and gives us a self-reflective view of all aspects of our personal life and surroundings. Developing these skills is critical to the development of leaders. Self-awareness is a core-building block skill on which to build all other leadership skills. Each one of us is a unique and separate individual bringing the immensity of diverse emotions and skills to our organization. In that diversity, we find the strength of a group coming together to build strong leaders.


So what does this have to do with Rotary? If we go under the premise that Rotary builds leaders, then identifying the skills leaders utilize is an important step in development. I believe Rotary has developed an environment, especially for young leaders, and it's become an ecosystem in which leaders develop these skills. Matching the wisdom of seasoned professionals to guide the next generation of leaders is essential to the long-term sustainability of our organization. As a leader builds the self-awareness competency, other skills start to show because of strong self-awareness, wisdom, identity, reputation and a leadership brand. These leadership skills forming in our clubs spill over into all aspects of life, not only one's own personal life, family, business or community, but the world, to make this earth we all share a better place.

I have a favorite quote from David Goggins, "The most important conversations you'll ever have are the ones you'll have with yourself." When I heard this comment, it goes to the core of what self-awareness is to me. It all starts and ends with each one of us on a very personal basis. We all write our own story. No one else can write our story for us. No one is too old or too young to build self-awareness skills. Please ponder this core fundamental skill as you exercise your own self-awareness skills, or encourage those around you through mentorship to encourage the development of this skill.

Just a few short weeks ago, a 7.2 magnitude earthquake devastated hundreds of thousands of lives in southern Haiti. Hope for Haiti, an organization that provides aid to those living in Haiti, is executing relief plans that call for more than \$5 million in support to help Haitian families recover. Initial assessments of the damage to schools, healthcare facilities, and homes have indicated that the costs of rebuilding will be significantly higher than originally planned. Reading with Rotary

The Literacy Buddy Pen Pal Project is a wonderful program for clubs to consider starting up in September as Rotary celebrates Basic Education and Literacy Month. Rotarian volunteers and students exchange drawings, letters and books. A child will draw a picture or explain a current interest (i.e. dinosaurs, bugs, butterflies, rainbows, football, etc.), and the volunteer responds by sending back a letter and a book to the child. The letter introduces the volunteer, talks about the book they selected and asks the child questions about the book. The volunteer includes a self-addressed, stamped envelope for the child to return the letter. Including a fun photo is a nice addition. The child returns the envelope with drawings and information about why they liked the book. The adult can also ask what the child likes to do, their favorite color, etc., to establish a bond and to get to know the child better. 
