Veterans sometimes find it hard to transition back into the routines of life outside the military.

A year-old Sarasota-based program hopes to make that transition a little easier by getting vets' hands dirty-literally.

The program, Green Path Veterans Farm, was started by the Florida Veterans for Common Sense Fund, says Gene Jones, one of the group's founding members. There was discussion in the group about the importance of local urban agriculture to help cut down on the energy wasted by transporting and importing food from other states and countries. The group also learned that if more food was locally produced, it could have a \$100 million impact on the local economy.

"If we could do just a fifth or a tenth of that," the program could be successful, Jones says.





### Global Grant w/Croatia

The life saving & therapy medical equipment will provide better treatment of children with severe respiratory complications

Ensuring this medical equipment to Clinic will Improve dealing with life threatening child's conditions & speed up child's therapy and recovery

WALL oxygen connection is used in children who require oxygen support due to various lung diseases (eg asthma, bronchitis or bronchiolitis, cystic fibrosis etc)

Wall Suction regulator (aspirator) is used in children who require aspiration of secretions from the upper or lower respiratory tract

Pulse Oximeter is a non-invasive method of measuring oxygen saturation in blood. It reduces the need for frequent analysis of arterial blood, which is painful and traumatic for the child

Vital sign monitor enables fast and accurate monitoring of patients who require enhanced control of vital functions

Anti-decubitus mattress is used to prevent decubitus in children who are forced to lie down, are immobile or are recovering after extensive surgical procedures requiring particular "forced position"

Reanimation sets (for breathing) are ensuring a timely procedure for resuscitation in children who are for some reason isolated within the department or when transporting children to a remote diagnostic unit or other facility

**Apnea monitors** are used for surveillance and breathing control most often in infants and young infants and for preventing life threatening conditions in infants and young infants


Professional inhalation device are used for inhaling of aerosol dispensers in the upper or lower respiratory tract

Immobilization board ( for reanimation purposes) are used to secure the hard surface on which the resuscitation process is being carried out. Beds or mattresses are soft and are not adequate for heart massage or intubation

There are 28 State Colleges in Florida with a number of branches. A main focus is on transfer degrees so that students can go on to other universities. Their flagship program is in nursing degrees where there is the largest demand and they have 650 students in the program. Following that a vocations emphasis is on baseball players with 28 going on to play in the

big leagues.

Dr. Probstfeld tries to focus on the needs of the students in every way they can with on-line learning and evening and weekend courses. They teach responsibility and being on time for jobs. Students that did actual research work showed up in class on time, regularly, and their grades were higher than students that didn't have the hands on experience

The consortium of schools has allowed students to take class at four different local colleges to focus on any area of learning. They have about 35 students that are being educated in micro brewing technics, a leg up on local jobs in the growing market She added "a most important job is to make sure that when kids graduate high school can read at the 12th grade level."

### Laut Week: Human Services Center



Dr. Kameron Partridge Hodgens is CEO of Sarasota's Glasser/ Schoenbaum Human Services Center. She described her 5 acre campus of 14 buildings housing 20 nonprofits. This was to create affordable rent so that the non-profits could focus on their mission and not be fundraising for overhead. At \$8.50 sq. ft. the costs for them is less than half of what they ould have to pay to stay in Sarasota. Dr Hodgens pointed out that the non-

profits mission is not our mIssion. She tracks data for the organizations and noted that the Campus generates 17.3 million in funding serving 28,000 people providing 210 jobs for the servicing agencies. This is the only center like this in Florida at this time. She went over the history of Schoenbaum and the support in starting the center which was an effort by Dr. Kay Glassee

Clients receive support for multiple issues at the same location saving transportation costs for many. Glasser/Schoenbaum does not apply for grants so they do not compete with the agencies they support. Funds are generated by personal donations. Dr. Hodgens would be happy to meet with individuals.












The District Governor Elects were on their way to San Diago, California, for training with more than 500 other DGEs from accound the globe. The gaests stayed for a week in the homes of local Rotarians and had a chance to experience the Sarasota area.

This unique program furthers the understanding of different cultures and often results in reciprocal visits to their home occurries.

While here, the gasets visited the Ringling Museum, the South Florida Museum in Bradenton, and Myakka State Park. Host parties, shopping and visits to Rotary Club meetings filled the time between events.

The event culminated with a banquet at Michael's on East where guests experienced a special musical performance by the Booker Middle High School Jazz Band. ### Manatee County hosts special passport event.

The Manutee County Clerk of the Circuit Court and Comptroller is hosting a special passport application event Saturday, March 24, from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. as an added convenience before the passport execution fee increases in Aveil.

The event will take place at the Manutee County Historic Courthouse at 1115 Manutee Ave. W. in Brademton. The Manutee County Clerk of the Court staff will assist customers throughout the passport application process. Passport photos can be taken ensite for an additional \$55.05 fee. Effective April 2,2018, the U.S. Department of State is increasing the passport execution fee from \$25 to \$35.

SEND US NEWS: Share your communit

This fee applies only to U.S. passport applicants using the DS-11 form, such as first-time applicants over 16, children under 16, and applicants who reapply after reporting their previous passport lost or stolen.

The \$10 passport fee increase does not apply to adults eligible to renew their passports by mail using the D6-82 form. Renewal contomers can mail their application and supporting documentation directly to the U.S. Department of State. Appointments will be scheduled in 15-minute increments with the last appointment time at 12:30 p.m. All contomers requesting an appointment will receive an email reply confirming their appointment time. To schedule an appointment, contact the Manutee County Clerk of the Court via email at passportsvent@manateeclerk.


