Another Large Hurricane could hit Florida soon! Will You and Rotary be ready?

Hurricane season is rapidly approaching, and the 2025 forecast is for 17 storms with 4 major hurricanes. Last year our District helped hundreds of families begin their home rebuilding process. We were able to do this because of our investment in resources and our numerous volunteers. Before the next storm impacts south Florida, we need to improve our storm preparations and expand our pool of volunteers.

This past year we experienced district wide damage from Hurricanes Helene and Milton and hurricane preparation is one key to reducing the impact of the next storm. As part of the District 6960 Disaster Response effort, we encourage each club to prepare a disaster response plan. Part of that plan is to ensure that each club can communicate with its members immediately before and after a disaster. Effective communication depends on the contact information that is stored in DACdb, our district wide database. Some of you have moved, or changed phone numbers, or just never looked at your data in DACdb. Please take time to log on to DACdb and verify your contact information. Having accurate information in DACdb is essential to our efforts to reduce damage to our homes, reduce injuries, and save lives caused by the next storm.

As individuals these are the measures you can take to prepare for the coming hurricane season:

The ability to respond to a hurricane in South Florida is based on our extensive Rotarian volunteers. To join our volunteer team before the next storm, fill out the volunteer information form [here](#).



Forty-two student-athletes honored at Rotary South Club Scholar Athlete Banquet

The nominees at the 39th annual Rotary South Scholar Athlete Banquet made quite an impression on the selection committee. So much so that instead of only two scholarship winners, there were four co-winners of the male and female Scholar Athlete of the Year awards at Bell Tower DoubleTree on Monday night, May 12th.

The event honored 42 Lee County high school male and female student-athletes for achievements in the classroom and athletics.

Bishop Verot's Mackenzie De Lisle, North Fort Myers' Seth Tshiams, and Fort Myers nominees Nick Bloomston and Julia Lemmon received top honors and were awarded \$4,000 scholarships. The other 38 nominees were awarded \$600.



"It felt great to bring it home for Fort Myers and go up there with Julia," Bloomston said. Bloomston is coming off his second consecutive weightlifting state championship. He also serves on the Lee County Student Athlete Advisory Council as well as co-founder of Exercise Science Club and vice president of Greenshore Initiative.

Important Message for Club Officers from RI

To: All current and incoming Rotary club officers

Cc: Governors, governors-elect, assistant governors, current and incoming district executive secretaries

Dear current and incoming Rotary club officers:

This is a friendly reminder to update your club membership and officer information in your local country or district database by **1 July 2025**. We will use this information to generate your July 2025 club invoice.

It is important that your club's member information is up to date, because Rotary cannot change the club invoice after it has been generated or accept membership updates with your payment.

As a current club officer, you can ensure that your club invoice will be correct by updating the information in your local database.

1. Your club has indicated that it is using a partner system connected to RI to manage membership information in My Rotary, the details of which are linked here. Please make all updates to membership in your local database.
2. Report all new or terminated members and 2025-26 club officers no later than 1 July 2025.
 - Members with admission dates of 1 July 2025 or before will be counted for the July 2025 club invoice.
 - Members with termination dates of 1 July 2025 or before will not be counted for the July 2025 club invoice.

The Rotary International invoice is generated from the data in Rotary's database, and you can see your membership changes reflected in Rotary International's database by signing into [My Rotary](#). Club officers can download a member list under **Members** to compare the data in RI's database to the information in My Rotary to make sure that it is accurate as the invoice will be generated based on the information on this list. If you see any discrepancy between My Rotary and the partner system used by your club please contact data@rotary.org.

Besides updating membership, any changes to subscriptions to Rotary International's official magazine, Rotary [in English] should be reported to data@rotary.org prior to 1 July 2025.

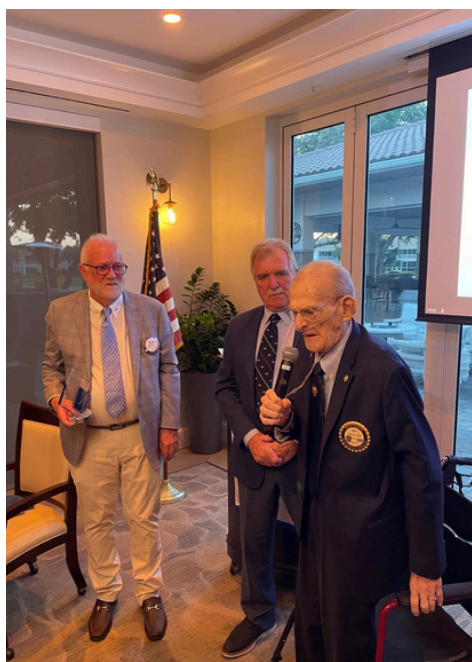
Rotarian for 65 years, Rex Sims Receives Lifetime Achievement Award

Rotarian James "Rex" Sims, a man whose life and service left an indelible mark on Rotary and beyond, received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Rotary Club of Bonita Springs at its Rotary Celebration and Installation Dinner at Spring Run Golf Club on Monday, April 28, 2025.

Rex's Rotary journey began 65 years ago, in the fall of 1960, when he joined the newly-formed Rotary Club in Rochester, Indiana. As a young entrepreneur establishing his manufacturing business, Rex quickly embraced Rotary's mission, serving as an officer, a board member, and eventually elected President in 1964. That same year, Rex and his wife, Peggy, attended the Rotary International convention in Denver, Colorado.

In 1983, Rex and Peggy made Bonita Springs their home, and Rex immediately joined the Rotary Club of Bonita Springs. From that moment, Rex's contributions were felt profoundly. Among his many endeavors, Rex played a significant role in the establishment of the Club's annual Christmas Tree Sales and sold countless trees over the years.

Rex and Peggy also found deep purpose in supporting the Wheelchair Foundation, making it one of their cherished causes. One of the defining moments of their lives was traveling to Bimini to deliver a container of wheelchairs. They were deeply moved by the life-changing joy of one young man who had no legs was finally able to support his family after receiving his wheelchair. That simple \$200 wheelchair not only transformed his life but also etched a memory in the heart of the Sims family that will last forever.



Rex's remarkable talents extend beyond service to the written word. A published author of four books, with a fifth on the horizon, Rex decided to turn the proceeds from his fourth book into donations for the Rotary Wheelchair Foundation, raising over \$7,000. Even in loss, Rex's dedication to service shines through; after Peggy's passing in October 2024, the family asked that memorials be made in her name to the Wheelchair Fund.

Rex's unwavering commitment to Rotary is demonstrated through his six Paul Harris Awards, along with the prestigious Rotary Inspiration Award. His life is a testament to the transformative power of Rotary. Reflecting on his own childhood, Rex vividly remembers the polio scare of 1935, a period that shut down his hometown. For Rex, Rotary's role in eradicating polio on a global scale is nothing short of extraordinary—a mission he has supported with pride and purpose throughout his life.

SWFL Rotary: A New Club Making Local & Global Impact in Less Than 45 Days!

The newly chartered **SWFL Rotary Club**, less than 45 days old, is already making a meaningful impact in Southwest Florida—and beyond. With a heart for service and a vision for local and global goodwill, this dynamic club has accomplished more in weeks than many in years. It all began with **a community-centered service project over Easter**, where members of SWFL Rotary collected over **15 bags of clothes, children's products, and essentials** for **Eva's Closet**. This local nonprofit provides aid to underserved families in the region. On **May 3, 2025**, SWFL Rotary teamed up with the **Rotary Club of Fort Myers East** to support their **annual Golf Scramble**, which benefitted a **pet food pantry**—an early example of powerful local collaboration.

Just one day later, on **May 4, 2025**, a group of SWFL Rotarians flew to **New York City**, where they honored world-renowned humanitarian and Michelin-starred chef **Vikas Khanna** with a **Paul Harris Fellow Award**, a prestigious recognition for his commitment to service above self. As the club gained momentum, it donated **\$600 to Babcock Middle School**. It proudly sponsored a **HAM Radio and Emergency Communication System**, which will be installed on campus in **June 2025**, bolstering community preparedness and safety.



On **Tuesday, May 20, 2025**, the club hosted a vibrant art unveiling event at Rotarian **Diana Patula's** residence in Babcock Ranch. The powerful community artwork, **"Unite For Good,"** will now travel across Florida—and hopefully the world—serving as a beacon of unity and service. The very next day, **Wednesday, May 21, 2025**, SWFL Rotary hosted its **first successful fundraiser**, the **French Wine Social**. This event combined fellowship and philanthropy. Proceeds were split between SWFL Rotary and **The Drop Project**, an initiative focused on clean water access.

Then, on **Thursday, May 22, 2025**, the club held its **first official meeting** at Swamp Cat Brewing in Downtown Fort Myers. From the beginning, the club's goal has been to reflect the diversity of its communities. That vision came to life at the meeting, where attendees ranged from **15-year-olds to over 65**—a vibrant gathering embodying Rotary's inclusive spirit and multigenerational strength.



Looking ahead, the club **will donate \$425 to Charlotte County Habitat for Humanity on May 30, 2025**, helping support affordable housing initiatives in the area. Additionally, SWFL Rotary has committed to **sponsoring the annual Kids Fishing Tournament at Babcock Ranch** for a whole year, beginning **June 2025 through June 2026**, reinforcing their dedication to youth programs and outdoor engagement.
