#### The State of the District with Membership

The concept follows the Shop with a Cop idea, only instead of Christmas presents, we purchase school clothes for under privileged schoolaged kids. This year, we focused on middle school children. Our goal is to set up again for around the time school starts next August.

Each child receives about \$200 to purchase any type of clothing they need for school, from shoes and pants, to dresses or undergarments. A total of 10 middle school students families made great selections, using clearance items, sale prices, and bin- reductions. The Rotary Club Golf Open beneficiaries are Babcock Neighborhood School, Josh The Otter water safety program (drowning awareness/prevention) and ACTAbuse, Inc., a Fort Myers- based domestic violence shelter serving multiple counties.

Rotary Club of Lakewood Ranch Celebrates Literacy Efforts in Manatee County Schools

As Manatee County educators work hard to improve grade-level literacy, the Rotary Club of Lakewood Ranch is doing its part to help. Through its Books for Kids program, specially trained volunteers are visiting classrooms to read aloud selected books and engaging students in discussion to improve their concentration on reading, listening comprehension skills, critical thinking and more.



Superintendent Jason Wysong, principals, and volunteers from participating schools will celebrate the success of the program during the Books for Kids Luncheon at 11:45 a.m. on Thursday, March 6, 2025, at the Lakewood Ranch Golf and Country Club, located at 7650 Legacy Boulevard in Lakewood Ranch.

"This literacy effort is crucial in bringing up grade-level reading scores in our community," said Ted Lindenberg, Director of Books for Kids. "By providing children with access to books and one-on-one mentorship, we are not only fostering a love for reading but also equipping them with the skills they need to succeed academically."

Books for Kids began 11 years ago by distributing 300 books. As the program nears the 200,000-book distribution mark, approximately 170 volunteers are helping kindergarten students at Ballard, Daughtrey, and Oneco Elementary Schools, and visiting first, second, and third-grade classrooms in a total of 10 Manatee County schools. After each volunteer's visit, they distribute a book to each child to take home.

# Disaster Relief Fund's \$25,000 Matching Grant Brings Hurricane Relief in District 6960

The Rotary Club of Anna Maria has worked locally with the Cortez Village and Anna Maria Island residents after the devastation caused by Hurricanes Helene and Milton. Working with support from Rotary Clubs of Lakewood Ranch, Bradenton, Port Charlotte and other local donors, they produced \$25,000 to receive matching funds from our Area Disaster Relief Fund. Here's a brief summary of how that money helped families recover.



- 70 affected residents provided with appliances and/or bedding
- 2,000 meals served to post-hurricane service workers and displaced individuals
- Over 200 Thanksgiving dinners served and gift cards for food and supplies distributed
- 4 Rotary Clubs involved
- Over 220 Rotarians helping directly or supporting through funding
- 3 new members for AMI through outreach and community work

Even though CART chair Nanci Landy regularly reminds members to place coins and cash in the blue buckets, the response was modest.

Angela, a retired grade schoolteacher, used her craft skills to create 15 jars that she and Nanci distributed to members to take home to collect coins. The response exceeded expectations. Contributions to the CART Fund have more than tripled and members have a renewed interest in raising funds to support Alzheimer's research.
