What is Rotary?



Rotary started with the vision of one man – Paul Harris.

The first club was The Rotary Club of Chicago - 1905.

Harris founded the club so professionals with diverse backgrounds could exchange ideas and form meaningful, lifelong friendships.

The Club had four members.

Meetings rotated between the four member's office, thus the name Rotary.

Fun Fact – Rotary almost started in Jacksonville, but the Great Fire of 1901 devasted the City. It was felt the community would not be able to support such an organization.




The Four Way Test

In 1932, Herbert J. Taylor set out to save the Club Aluminum Products distribution company from bankruptcy. He believed himself to be the only person in the company of 250 employees who had hope. His recovery plan started with changing the ethical climate of the company.

"The first job was to set policies for the company that would reflect the high ethics and morals God would want in any business. If the people who worked for Club Aluminum were to think right, knew they would do right. What was needed was a simple, easily remembered guide to right conduct - a sort of ethical yardstick - which all of us in the company could memorize and apply to what we thought, said and did."

He searched through many books for the answer to his need, but the right phrases eluded him, so he did what he often did when facing a problem. He turned to the One who has all the answers. He leaned over his desk, rested his head in his hands and prayed. After a few moments, he looked up and reached for a white paper card. Then he wrote down the twenty-four words that changed the history and became synonyms for Rotary evolution.



Our Motto's

Service Above Self One Profits Most Who Serves Best

- **Rotarian Arthur Frederick Sheldon**
 - Speech at the 1st Convention in Chicago, 1910
 - "Only the science of right conduct towards others pays. Business is the science of human services. He profits most who serves his fellows best."
 - Formally approved at the 2nd Convention, 1911, Portland
- Ben Collins President of the Rotary Club of Minneapolis
 - Service, Not Self is the proper way to organize a Rotary Club
- Both slogans approved as the formal mottos at the 1950 International Convention, Detroit.
- 1989 Council on Legislation established Service Above Self as principal motto.
- He Profits Most was updated to They Profit Most in 2004
- In 2010, updated to current wording, One Profits Most Who Serves Best

Jacksonville Rotary Club started the District in 1912.


Currently Comprised of:

Our Beginning

At one time, only ONE Rotary Club was allowed in each city.

The Rotary Club of DeLand (the Noon Club) was charted in 1926.

In 1976, Rotary International started to allow additional clubs in a city. Those clubs were called Overlay Clubs and had to be sponsored by an existing club.

DeLand Breakfast Rotary

The 2nd Overlay Club in the world was charted in March of 1976 The DeLand Breakfast Rotary Club.

In 2003, a group of Rotarians from the Breakfast Club and Noon Club saw a need for an evening club. These individuals met Downtown for over a year to develop the principles and bases for a new club.

On July 1, 2004, The Rotary Club of Downtown DeLand was officially charted with 27 members, becoming the first club charted in the Centennial Year of Rotary International.

Club Service focuses on making clubs strong. A thriving club is anchored by strong relationships and an active membership development plan.


Vocational Service calls on every Rotarian to work with integrity and contribute their expertise to the problems and needs of society.




Scholarships

Rotary International is governed by a President and Board of Directors elected from all over the world. Each District elects a District Governor annually.

- Our club holds its election each year during the December Annual Meeting
- At this meeting, members vote on the President Elect, President Elect Elect, Secretary, Treasurer, Sargent-at-Arms and four Board Members.

- The President is nominated by the Past Presidents Council and confirmed at the club's annual meeting by a vote of all members.
- Directors are elected by the club to two (2) year terms.
 - There are a total of eight (8) Directors.
 - Director terms are staggered so as four (4) Directors cycle off as four (4) new Directors are elected.

Committees and Duties

- Prepare a workable budget and continue to develop proactive processes to maintain fiscal integrity.
- Planning and organizing weekly meetings and programs
- Promoting fellowship among club members.
- Conduct monthly business meetings to review board meeting actions.

Membership

- Oversea the membership onboarding process.
- Work with club members to attract quality new members.

Public Image

Keep members informed through a club newsletter, website, and social media.

Foundation

- Solicit worthy projects locally and internationally that could benefit from additional funds from district and global grants.
- Prepare Rotary grant applications and administer the funds as required by the district.

Service Projects

- Provide oversight to all service events ensuring that they are executed in a professional, competent manner.
- Use the event planning document to record aspects of every event so necessary details are address and make next year easier.
- Event chair documents event attendance.

Our club participates in many of the Foundations projects and programs.


- 100% Foundation Giving Club
 - For clubs that achieve an average of \$100 in per capita giving and 100 percent participation, with every dues-paying member contributing at least \$25 to any or all funds during the Rotary year.
- Every Rotary, Every Year Club
 - For clubs that achieve a minimum Annual Fund contribution of \$100 per capita during the Rotary year, and every dues-paying member must personally contribute at least \$25 to the Annual Fund during the year.
- Paul Harris Fellow
 - Established in 1957
 - Recognition who contribute (or have contributions made in their name) of \$1,000 to the Foundation
 - Our club currently has 33 Paul Harris Fellows.

We put money into the Foundation and money goes back to the club to help with grants and projects


