
## Dick DeLuca

It is fitting that we pay tribute to our beloved Dick DeLuca by printing this special edition of the SeeWay, our club newsletter that he designed, wrote, printed, and mailed weekly for nearly three decades, eventually transitioning it into electronic format. It was one of the hardest things for him to let go when he became ill, but in true devotion to maintaining exceptional club communication, Dick helped transition it to Lisa Watkins several years ago.

Most of us knew Dick DeLuca through the Erie Rotary Club which truly became his second career when he joined on April 3, 1985. Dick lived and breathed Rotary. Some highlights of his Rotary Years:

- He learned every facet of managing a Rotary Club, its board, and membership, and the intricacies of membership in the larger Rotary District 7280 and Rotary International.
- He happily took on the role of Erie Rotary Club Secretary for nearly two decades. It has taken several Rotarians two full years to unravel understand, and reassign the many duties that Dick performed for our Club as secretary.

- In 2002, Dick embraced Rotary's tenet to create international understanding and goodwill by volunteering to travel with two other Rotarians to Haiti on a Miller Discovery Grant, a trip that resulted in a ten-year literacy project with the Rotary Club of Les Cayes.
- Dick believed strongly in the Rotary Foundation, giving annual contributions that made him a four time Paul Harris Fellow.
- He received the Four-Way Test Award, the highest honor given by the Erie Rotary Club for service.
- Above all, Dick created, participated in, and promoted the many social events we created over the years for Rotarians and their spouses/partners and families: the Holiday Party, the Summer Picnic, and the Rotary at the Seawolves.
- Dick was a mentor and educator to the end. He hoped that memorials in his name would be made to our Erie Rotary Club Scholarship Fund P.O. Box 1424, Erie, PA 16512






It was a pleasure to know and go with him to district meetings, conventions and other events. I'll truly miss him and I'm glad he is in a better place without pain. – Gary Flick

Richard P. "Dick" DeLuca, age 84, passed away on Monday, May 29, 2017 surrounded by family. He was born in Erie on August 5, 1932 a son of the late Dominick and Congetta (Amendola) DeLuca.

Dick was a graduate of East High School and Edinboro University. He received his master's degree from the University of Arizona. He began his memorable teaching career at Fort LeBoeuf High School, where he founded their wrestling program and was inducted into their hall of fame. Later he worked as a guidance counselor, principal and finally the Executive Director of Erie County Vocational Technical School.



He is also survived by many nieces, nephews and extended family. Dick's family was most grateful to the staff at Westlake Woods who cared for Dick during the past year.
