Diane Chido is a native of Erie returning this July after serving for three years as the Security and Intelligence Policy Advisor for the U.S. Army's Peace Keeping and Stability Operations Institute (PKSOI) housed at the Army War College in Carlisle, PA. Prior to that assignment, Diane was an instructor at the Department of Intelligence Studies at Mercyhurst University for 6 years. In 2008, after graduating from the Mercyhurst Program and working for two years as a consultant with McManis and Monsalve Associates, Diane started her own analysis firm, DC Analytics.

She conducts research for many Department of Defense agencies as well as market analysis for local firms and other organizations to support strategic planning and business development.

Diane has published widely on such topics as the intelligence process, ethnic conflict, alternative governance and Sub-Saharan African military engagement. She recently published a book on information-sharing and transnational organized crime in United Nations peacekeeping missions. Her partner is Matthew and her 19-year-old son is named Zachary.

International Cultural Connections Offer Life-Changing Experiences

Rotary Clubs in our region are presenting area students and families with opportunities to become involved in the Rotary International Youth Exchange Program.

2 Ways for Students to Participate

- 1. Long Term/School Year program. Travel overseas to spend a whole school year in a foreign country.
- 2. **Short Term program**. Spend 3-6 weeks in a foreign country in the home of another student; host that student in your home for 3-6 weeks. Short Term applications are due March 30 of each year.

2 Ways for Families to Participate

- 1. **Long Term/School Year program**. Host a student from another country in your home for part or all of a school year.
- 2. **Short Term**. Enable your child to spend 3-6 weeks in a foreign country in the home of another student; host that student in your home for 3-6 weeks. Short Term applications are due March 30 of each year.

Students Needed for School Year Rotary Youth Exchange Program

Are you between 15 and 17 years old and looking for something exciting and different to do during the next school year? Do you want to travel overseas and help increase world understanding here at home? Rotary Clubs of District 7280 are searching for outgoing high school students to travel overseas to over 40 countries next year as part of the Rotary International Youth Exchange Program.

Eligible students should be of good character and reputation, not older than 18 at time of departure, have above average academic ability and have a pleasant personality. A preliminary application with a local interview is required before the Rotary District 7280 interviews in November. Country preferences will be taken into consideration and placements made in January.

The student's share of expenses includes a \$450 youth exchange program fee, airfare, insurance and other travel costs. The program is for one year and the hosting Rotary club will provide housing with host families, food, schooling and a monthly allowance. **Check out <u>www.exchangestudent.org</u> for more information**. Host Families Needed for School Year Youth Exchange Program

Families are needed to host an in-bound foreign student for all or part of a school year. Many Rotary Clubs have found it good to have the in-bound student live with 2-3 families during the school year so the student gets to enjoy a variety of experiences, several families get to enjoy that student and no one family is over-burdened. The local Rotary Club will be responsible for getting approval from the school district for the student's enrollment. The club also provides the student with a monthly allowance.

All families—even those without children—are encouraged to apply to be hosts. Any reputable family in our community is eligible to host a Rotary exchange student. For more information on how to become a host family, see the Rotary contact information on Page 2.

Nicklaus plans to thank the next 12 individuals who make a new donation of \$250,000 or more to the PolioPlus Fund by inviting them to play golf with him at the Bear's Club in Jupiter, Florida, USA, on 12 March 2019. There, donors will be divided into three groups of four, and each group will play 18 holes of golf – six with Nicklaus. Donors who prefer not to golf may allow one friend or family member to golf in their place.




