Rotary Foundation Awards Scholarships for Post-Secondary Education

Since 1956, the Scholarship Foundation of the Rotary Club of Erie has been supporting the post-secondary dreams of seniors in Erie City Public High Schools. The Foundation is a separate nonprofit corporation and is managed by a Board of Trustees. The five students that were selected for this year's scholarship awards were from Erie High and Collegiate Academy. Through the Foundation, worthy seniors from Erie high schools, who live in the City of Erie, receive a \$3000 scholarship that is a onetime grant that may be used for any school related expenses in achieving higher education, either for college or technical school.

It is amazing to meet these high achieving students; they are inspirational and excited to get out into the world. These students enjoy performing many hours of community service, and have economic circumstances which might otherwise make post-secondary education unattainable. Often these students have part time jobs in order to help support their families. Several take an active role in being a role model and many times help in parenting their siblings. Each student is asked to write an essay about how they put others needs above their own, exemplifying the "Service Above Self" Rotary Motto. Join us Wednesday and meet the students and those that have encouraged them in attaining the 2019 Rotary scholarship. These young people are our community's greatest asset and worth the investment of your time and financial support. Linda Breakiron, Scholarship Foundation President, will introduce the committee. Each committee member will share a bit about why they chose the student from their selected school.



UPDATE from Joyce Miller as of April 16, 2019

Everyone:

I last sent out an update on February 3, just prior to my departure for a 2.5 week visit to Mexico, where my family joined me for 10 days. I am happy to say we had a wonderful time in Puerto Vallarta and it was great to have that time together before I started my 6 weeks of radiation and chemo at the Cleveland Clinic.

I started this first round of treatment on February 25th and completed it on April 5th. While the first couple weeks were rough, as I was still feeling the effects of the steroids that I had been given to reduce any brain swelling. Once those drugs were out of my system, I began to feel better--I was sleeping better and my manic state was diminishing.

All in all, I came through the 6 weeks of treatment with few side effects. I was able to come home most weekends since I only needed to be in Cleveland M-F for radiation and the chemo was pill form that I took every day for 6 weeks. I visited museums, went out to eat with friends who came to stay with me at the Hope Lodge during the week, and I even took private dance lessons 2 days a week in Beachwood. I was fortunate enough to have a room at the American Cancer Society's Hope Lodge at the Cleveland Clinic, which provides cancer patients under treatment with a place to stay for free and a shuttle to/from the Cleveland Clinic.

Of course, even while in treatment I continued with my work and have made lots of plans for my future. In light of this, the JAM TEAM (Joyce's Amazing Miracle Team), is being formalized and soon all of you will learn about what this JAM TEAM is all about.

I knew that I would need more than just hope if I were to beat the odds and live up to the 20+ years that the rare Glioblastoma patient has lived. Indeed, it will be my miracle support team who will help me build the legacy I want to leave to my family and community and ensure that my dreams become a reality.

I return to the Cleveland Clinic for my first follow-up on May 3rd when I will learn if I am to continue chemo for a while longer, which would consist of 5 days a month on chemo (pill form) and the rest of the month off. This could possibly continue throughout the year. Once I have that news I will send out another update.

I have been in touch with many of you over the past couple months and want to send special thanks to those of you who helped out by driving me to and from the Cleveland Clinic on weekends and staying with me during the week. It's comforting to know that I have such good friends and family who gave of their time to do this for me.




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ARTrageous – an event unlike any other.

We receive recognition on their website, social media and THREE event tickets.


Everyone who signs in at the April 10, April 17 and 24 meetings receives an entry for the tickets.
