## Erie Rotary Club Focus on Youth and Education

Rotary Club of Erie founding President William Pitt Gifford said at a September 1914 Board meeting, "The Club is now getting large enough for some activities of public good. Let's get behind several good things and do something for the benefit of the community, for example, the Boy Scouts, Good Roads, or the Grade Crossings. We ought to do something unique in Rotary - something worthwhile. I think the men [sic] of the Rotary Club of Erie can take a hold of anything and put it across." Indeed, our club is capable of great things and our leadership team has a lot of plans for the next three years.

Incoming President Diane Chido, President-Elect Maureen Rizzo and Program Chair & Vice President Allison Keenan have pledged a multi-year effort to maintain support for Youth & Education-based activities, so we do not fall prey to inconsistency that results when each new leadership team reinvents the wheel, Rotary pun intended. With that in mind, the membership will be kept apprised of our plans in detail once they have been fully considered by the Board at our July meeting. As Rotarians, all club members' input on plans and implementation of our continuing and new intitiatives are always welcome.



## Opportunities for Service and Fellowship

**Member Spotlights**: We will get to know new members by inviting them to introduce themselves to the club when they are presented. We no longer have the standard classification talks, but Zac Wild has agreed to coordinate weekly member spotlights for those *rare occasions* when we are not greeting new members, so we can all get to know each other a little better. **Adding "brags" to meetings:** A great way to get to know each other and to raise funds for the Foundation is through weekly "Brags" where someone goes around taking a dollar from each person who wants to say something. Members can thank the speaker, announce a life event like a graduation or new grandchild, ask the club to have a care for a sick loved one, even give thanks for a pro sports team win. "Brags" are a staple in many clubs and can be a source of great fun and fellowship.

"People of Action:" Erie Rotary has instituted a new committee called the "People of Action". We will organize or join with other organizations once a month to roll up our sleeves and do something useful in the community. We'll announce these activities in the **See-Way** and at meetings so you can join in when the project interests you or the timing fits your schedule. We have Past President and Area Governor Lisa Graff to thank for this. She leads a new Rotary configuration called a "Satellite Club" out of the Presque Isle Club, which has a similar goal. Membership Development: Our club and Rotary globally lost a number of members as people reconsidered and reconfigured their lives and their incomes through the pandemic. It is the responsibility of all of us to share the message of Rotary with others who may like to join us. As Past District Governor and Past President L.T Briggs and father and grandfather to two Erie Rotarians wrote in 1961, "I like to think of Erie Rotary as a procession of men [sic] starting back there in 1913 with our 28 charter members. As time marches on, older ones drop out of the ranks and younger step into line, infusing new life and vigor into the bloodstream of what would otherwise become a senile and moribund organization. It is my further observation that these younger members are facing greater problems and doing a much better job than we oldsters did in the days of yore."
