#### **MILTON ROTARY CLUB**

The <u>Milton Rotary Club</u> recently contributed \$2,000 to ShelterBox in light of the devastating earthquake in Turkey and Syria. The cost of each Shelter Box is \$1,000.



Shelter Box was formed by British Rotarians in 2000 to meet the needs of the homeless due to disasters such as hurricanes,

war, earthquakes, and other events.

The first consignment of 143 boxes was sent to earthquake victims in the Indian state of Gujarat in January 2001. Over the next three years, the project matured, and by the end of 2004, nearly 2,600 boxes had been dispatched, following 16 major disasters. In 2005, ShelterBox sent out more than 22,000 boxes, almost 10 times the number delivered in the previous three years. Not only were they sending aid to survivors of a tsunami, but we were also able to help those who had lost their homes to Hurricane Katrina in the USA and the massive earthquake that hit the Kashmir region of Pakistan.

Since the inception in 2000, support has been given to over 1 million people. Currently Shelter Box have been deployed to Turkey and Syria, Pakistan, Ukraine, Syria, Mozambique, Lake Chad Basin, Burkina Faso, Yemen, and Ethiopia.

ShelterBox customizes the contents of the kit to meet the individual needs of each community they help. They often add several other essentials like solar lights, blankets and water containers and purifiers to help families return to normal life as soon as possible, as well as providing family-sized tents for shelter.

## Third Annual District 7360 Foundation Walk/Four-Way Test Speech Contest



Come out and enjoy a leisurely walk in one of three locations. This year we have expanded the reach of the District Foundation Walk to include, from east to west in the district, Muncy, PA, State College, PA, and Chambersburg, PA. It will be held on Saturday, May 20<sup>th</sup>. Registrations will begin at 10 am and the walk will begin at 11 am. It will take about 20-30 minutes of *leisurely* walking in these communities. In Muncy and State College a lunch will be provided at the venue for \$10.00. In Chambersburg, you will be right next to the restaurant area of town and be given ideas for different types of eateries available.

This is a district fundraiser for the Rotary Foundation Annual Fund. Each club is encouraged to attend, having at least one representative come out, but the more the merrier! Prior to the walk, members are encouraged to commit an amount and/or have individuals sponsor them for the walk (the money each raises goes to toward Paul Harris Fellow points). Since there is no distance to walk, it is that you are walking to raise monies to help to fund the many projects that are funded from our annual giving. The club with the most money raised will be the proud caretakers of the walking stick that travels to the winning club each year. A question has been asked, may corporations donate to the walk – the answer is yes, BUT the amount that they donate will not count toward the club total toward the walking stick but will toward the club total annual giving. Every penny helps others in our communities and around the world, so don't be shy, just ask.

Don't just attend to walk, also take a break between Mother's Day and Memorial Day to slow down for an hour or two, enjoy a nice stroll with old and new friends. Take time to meet others you may not normally have the opportunity to do. Take some time out to fellowship and explore a new area you may never have been to. This is intended to be for the whole family!

Finally, if you attend the Muncy walk, another exciting district event is occurring, the <u>Four-Way Test Speech Contest</u>. This is the finals for four students from around the district. It is always exciting and is usually only about an hour. Come out to hear what is on the minds of high school students today and how they defend it with the Four-Way Test. You always come away in awe. This will be at the First United Methodist Church in Muncy where the walk registration and lunch following will be held. <u>The Speech contest will begin at 2 pm.</u> This will give you time to return and have a leisurely lunch then enjoy four thought-provoking speeches.

What do I do now? <u>Go to DACdb</u> and go to the calendar, making sure you have selected the button that enables you to see the district events, and sign-up for the location where you will be walking.
