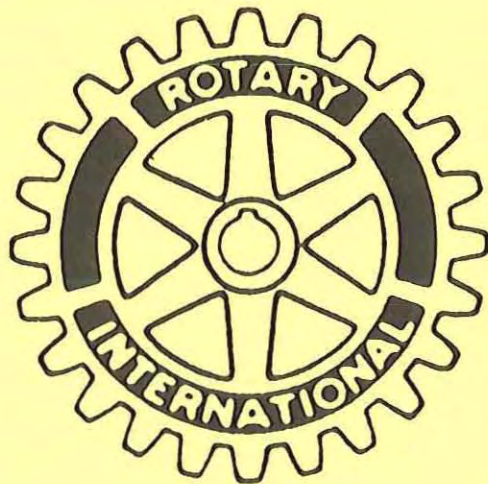

P R O L O G U E

A cogwheel emblem, known worldwide from Argentina to Zambia, may be seen at entrances to villages, towns and cities, announcing that Rotary meets there, working to improve the community, assist its youth, and extend friendship to fellow humans in other lands.

What is Rotary? It is the epitome of service in efforts to improve the community, help its youth, and reach out with friendship to people of alien cultures and beliefs.

Rotary was born on February 23, 1905 in Chicago, Illinois. A young lawyer, Paul P. Harris, from Wallingford, Vermont, was lonely in the great city. To promote friendship he invited a small group of men, each of them engaged in a different form of service to the public, to gather together regularly. At first the members of the new club met in rotation at their various places of business, thus suggesting the name "Rotary".

In the 75 years since 1905 the ideas of Paul Harris and his friends have become ideals accepted by men of practically all nationalities, and political and religious beliefs. As of this three-quarter century anniversary there are about 18,500 Rotary clubs and an estimated 855,000 Rotarians, in 154 countries and geographical regions. Rotary clubs everywhere have one basic ideal: the "Ideal of Service", which is thoughtfulness of and helpfulness to others.

The original members of the first Rotary club, through their business and professional contacts with men around the country, fostered the establishment of clubs in other cities. Starting slowly at first, by August 1910 there were 16 clubs dotted across the United States. A first convention was held that month in Chicago, with approximately 1,500 persons in attendance. "The National Association of Rotary Clubs" was organized at that convention. Later that year the organization became international with the admission of Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada. In 1911 clubs were begun in Ireland and Great Britain, necessitating a name change to "The International Association of Rotary Clubs". At the 1922 Convention held in Los Angeles, California the name was again changed to "Rotary International", which official designation has continued to the present.

ROTARY IN ALTOONA - ORGANIZATION

New Rotary clubs were being established at an increasing pace. On March 8, 1916 the Chairman of the Extension Committee of the Rotary Club in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, B. K. Elliott, wrote to William W. Blake of the Blake Wholesale Tobacco Company, of 1011 Green Avenue, Altoona, citing the high ideals of the Rotary movement and its rapid expansion. He urged that an effort be made to assemble a group of twenty-five or thirty representative business and professional men of Altoona, and offered to bring the Pittsburgh Club's Committee to Altoona for a luncheon meeting, to explain Rotary.

"Billie" Blake, in turn asked Charles F. Anderson of the Anderson Paper and Twine Company, then located at 908 11th Avenue, to assemble a group and arrange a meeting. "Charley" Anderson, in his turn, then wrote to B. K. Elliott, pleading inability to handle the arrangements, and advising that Elwood G. Mateer, Manager for the Bell Telephone Company, would assume the task of organization.

Allen D. Albert, President of Rotary International, acting upon the recommendation of B. K. Elliott of Pittsburgh and of the District Governor, George W. Harris, appointed Oliver Rothert Chairman of the Organizing Committee for a Rotary Club in Altoona. The Pittsburgh men came to Altoona and met with a group of local men who had expressed interest. At the meeting considerable enthusiasm was engendered toward the formation of a club.

On May 16, 1916, in the Logan House, with thirty-six charter members present, a Charter was applied for, and the first permanent officers were elected, as follows:

- President - Frank Hastings, of the 2nd National Bank
- Vice Pres. - William W. Blake, of Blake Tobacco Company
- Secretary - George G. Zeth, of the Zeth Business College
- Treasurer - Frank P. Beam, of Beam's Restaurant
- Sgt-at-Arms- Charles F. Anderson, of Anderson Paper and Twine Company
- Directors - Scott S. Crane, of Altoona and Logan Valley Electric Railway
Elwood G. Mateer, of Bell Telephone Company
Oliver Rothert, of Rothert Furniture Company
Noel W. Smith, Supt., Middle Division, Penna. R.R.

The application for a Charter indicated that meetings would be held on the first and third Tuesdays of each month, in the Logan House, with dinner at 6:30

P.M. The approximate population of Altoona was given as 65,000, with 6 manufacturing plants in the city, and 500 retail stores. The names of the thirty-six charter members will be found noted in the permanent all-time roster of the club, in the Appendix of this history.

Certificates of membership in the International Association of Rotary Clubs was issued on July 1, 1916 and received in Altoona on July 10, 1916. Altoona Rotary became Club Number 240 in the Association.

The club became a unit in the Third Rotary District, of which Stuart McFarlan of Pittsburgh was District Governor. Territorial limits of the club were defined as all the area included in the boundary lines of Blair County.

The early growth of the club was so rapid that action was taken to limit growth for a time to three new members per month. The twice per month meetings of the new club were continued during the Great War years, with meetings eliminated in the months of July and August. However, summer outings were held at the Spruce Creek Rod and Gun Club. In 1919 it was decided that weekly luncheon meetings should be held at noon, but with one evening dinner meeting each month. This latter arrangement was soon dropped because of inconvenience to members who lived out of town, and noon luncheon meetings became standard.

EARLY ACTIVITIES

Initial social events were limited to men only, as it was felt that the Rotary Club was strictly of a business nature. The first recorded evening social was hosted by Oliver Rothert on Election night, November 7, 1916. The records do not indicate the members' reactions to the reelection of President Woodrow Wilson over Charles Evans Hughes. With the coming of Womens' Suffrage Rotarian wives, soon known as Rotaryanns were recognized as important factors in Rotary, and Ladies Parties became a part of the year's programs.

Before very long the Rotary Club of Altoona showed interest in community activities. The first recorded project was in cooperation with the Board of Education in Americanization plans for the alien residents of the city. At the same time a special committee worked in cooperation with the Chamber of Commerce in their efforts to secure work for boys on farms of the area. \$150 was contributed to this program. In addition, farm clubs for both boys and girls were sponsored. In November 1917 the club entertained 30 prize winners

in the farm clubs at the Strand Theatre, where the children saw Mary Pickford in "Rebecca of Sunny Brook Farm".

The advent of the Great War brought new activities for the club. Members assisted in distribution of information relating to War Income Tax. They sold \$2,300 worth of Smileage Books - a relatively large sum at that time. They also canvassed for Liberty Loan Drives, and assisted in the securing of athletic equipment for military camps in the United States and overseas.

NOTABLE EVENTS - A CHRONOLOGY

November 1919 A committee headed by Mal H. Neuwhal raised a fund to initiate preliminary work toward the establishment of a Boy Scout Council in Blair County. Individual club members contributed a minimum of \$25.00 each toward the fund, while raising a total amount of \$22,000 in the community.

July 27, 1920 Replacing the weekly meeting, an auto trip was taken to Williamsburg. At the Penn Central Light and Power Station a tour of the plant was escorted by Rotarian J. Harry Shearer. The next stop was at the County Children's Home. Then a chicken and waffle dinner was enjoyed at the home of Mrs. Ida Fay Roller.

November 16, 1920 The Catherine Township Livestock Club, oldest club of its kind in the state, was entertained at the Logan House. This event was credited with giving the impetus toward establishment of the Morrison Cove Agricultural School at Martinsburg.

January 12, 1921 The first real Ladies Night was held. The District Governor, Richard Aspilwall, of Buck Hannon, W. VA., spoke on "The Leveling Influence of the Rotarians". Given names were used for all present, the titles Mr. and Mrs. being dropped for the evening.

October 11, 1922 Held a "Boys Work" meeting for school officials and Boy Scout officers. Local scouting activities were reviewed by Scout Executive Harry E. Frayer, including Camp Espy at Spruce Creek.

May 4, 1923 Sponsored "Boys Week" in Altoona in observance of Rotary International's "Boys' Day in Industry". Features: A parade of all city school boys - prizes to winning units; arranged inspection visits by the city youth to the Railroad shops, and other factories, business establishments and offices; conducted a mouth organ contest in the Y.M.C.A. rooms, with monetary prizes.

May 15, 1923 Began a Crippled Children Survey. Each Rotarian was assigned to a particular area of the community. 103 cases were discovered. Eighty-four of these children were examined in clinics. The parents of the other 19 refused the help. It was determined that fifty-five of those examined, if given treatment, could be either completely cured or experience a great improvement.

April 14, 1926 The 66 member club celebrated its Tenth Anniversary, while still meeting at the Logan House. The club maintained a modest profile, seeking publicity in the press only in activities of general public interest.

Summer 1926 The exact date has been lost, but the club moved its meetings location to the new Penn Alto Hotel, in the ballroom fittingly named the Logan Room.

In 1929 A Student Loan Fund was started to assist needy students in completing their higher education. The fund was combined at first with a similar fund of the Altoona High School Alumni Association, but in 1932 the latter was discontinued, and the club's Fund was thereafter administered by a club committee. Loans were made on a non-interest bearing basis, and over the next approximately 40 years, due to the sagacity of the committee, only a relatively insignificant amount of the loan accounts receivable were not repaid. During most of this time the Student Loan Committee was chaired by Herman L. Greenberg, to whom great credit is due for the Fund's wise and efficient management.

April 1930 Hosted the District Assembly of Rotary District 34. All business sessions and social events of the Assembly were held at the Altoona Cricket Club.

1930-31 Charter member and Past President Arthur E. Winter served as District Governor for Rotary District Number 34.

Spring of 1933 Conducted a Hobby Fair in the Y.M.C.A. building, primarily for participation by community youth. The Fairs were continued annually until 1942 with overall participation by thousands. Poster contests for high school students were a part of the annual events; and in 1937 a Model Airplane contest was held in connection with the local visit of famous aviator Col. Roscoe Turner. The Fair was discontinued after 1942 because of the increasing number of adult contestants, and lack of sufficient display space.

May 1936 Hosted the Annual Conference of the 34th District. Meetings and events were conducted at the Penn Alto Hotel and Jaffa Mosque.

1939 Provided much of the initiative and organizational work in establishing the Altoona Undergraduate Center. Robert E. Eiche became the first Director, continuing in that capacity over the next approximately 30 years.

May 1940 Doctor J. Floyd Buzzard organized a Rotary Boys Band. Composed of 50 members from among high school graduates, the club provided uniforms, music and some of the instruments.

May 20, 1941 The Club observed its 25th Anniversary. Representatives from seven other Rotary clubs and from several other service clubs attended the banquet celebration. Speaker for the occasion was William Dern. His topic was "Keep Your Sunny Side Up". The club had 100 members.

December 1941 - August 1945 Nine of the Club's members were called into active military service during World War II. The men were: Harry L. Chenoweth, G. Hewitt Knode, Harold J. Pegg, Robert W. Sheraw, J. Stevens Baird, William B. Maloy, Francis A. Stevens, Samuel Cook and John M. Groobey. All were given temporary Honorary memberships. Many club members saw numerous family sons and daughters and relatives volunteer or were drafted into service. Club members also served on Draft Boards, Registration and Induction Centers, and on various governmental alphabet agencies.

November 1943 Club President William H. Haller sent more than 3,000 items of costume jewelry and the like to Rotary Project Headquarters in New York, to be sent to service men stationed in countries where trinkets had more value than cash in bartering for services of the natives.

December 22, 1943 Sent framed "Certificate of Honor" to the closest relatives of 75 young men of the area who had made the supreme sacrifice.

August 15, 1944 A Summer Party was held at the Summit Country Club, Cresson. Cards and Golf were enjoyed. Five sailors and junior hostesses from Hollidaysburg provided a program of music and fun.

May 1946 The first "Citizens-of-Tomorrow" were sent to the District Conference, hosted that year by Altoona, to represent the club among other youth in attendance. One student each from Altoona High School and Altoona Catholic High School were sponsored. This program was continued annually through 1975, and resumed in April 1979.

December 3, 1946 Renew the custom of pre-war years of hosting area farmers and dairymen, a project of the club's Rural-Urban Committee.

March 1947 The noon-day luncheon price was increased by the hotel to \$1.00.

March 27, 1947 Received a citation from Rotary International for efforts in helping to establish the Undergraduate Campus.

February 1948 The Blair County farmers reciprocated by hosting the club at a dinner meeting in Duncansville.

Summer 1948 Many members sent packages to Denmark, including textiles, and clothing for babies, children and adults, articles extremely scarce in that country. Many letters of appreciation were received.

January 7, 1950 A new activity of the club was opened at the Y.M.C.A. Under the sponsorship of Howard W. Peffer, the Rotarian General Secretary of the "Y", and with the leadership of Thomas L. Caum, the club's Crippled Children and Youth Service Committees set up a program to bring together for an hour each week, a group of crippled children, mostly polio victims. The children were to be gotten into the pool for hydrotherapy treatment, and where possible, to teach them to swim. If the response warranted, it was proposed to add a Social hour for the children. Other club members assisted the participants, especially William B. Morrison, and after his club induction in 1951, Dr. Arthur E. Pollock.

May 15, 1951 The 35th Anniversary of the club was observed, with famous poet Edgar A. Guest as speaker.

March 1952 Alexander Nader, an Altoona young man, whose candidacy was sponsored by the club, was selected by the District Foundation Committee to receive a Rotary Foundation Fellowship. Alex was approved for graduate study at the University of Beirut in Lebanon.

February 1954 Susan Holtzinger, daughter of Rotarian J. Edward Holtzinger, was awarded a Rotary Foundation Fellowship for graduate study, in Australia.

March 8, 1955 The Golden Anniversary of Rotary International was observed. Six other clubs, Roaring Spring, Martinsburg, Bedford, Everett, Claysburg and Hollidaysburg joined for the event. 407 people attended the banquet meeting, held at Jaffa Mosque. The Anniversary Committee, chaired by Paul Winter, also included Rudy Kleinschmidt, Park Hite, Clair Clugh, Bill Wade, Charlie Clugh and John Dillen. Club membership was then 135.

January 1, 1956 The sudden death of J. Clyde Cassidy was a tragical loss for the club. Clyde had served as Club President in 1934-35, and for 17 years since 1939 had been the club's Secretary-Treasurer and guiding hand. Highly respected

throughout the District, he was known as "Mr. Rotary", and also served as District Secretary-Treasurer. After his death the Board of Directors separated the offices of Secretary and Treasurer, electing Ralph A. Mannion and Howard W. Peffer to these respective positions.

May 29, 1956 A special commemorative program was observed for the club's 40th Anniversary. Old papers and pictures were on display. Two of the original charter members, N. Augustine Stevens and Arthur E. Winter were present, and still attending meetings regularly. Will Ketner and Gerry Henderson provided a narrative presentation, with a tape recording of voices and background material. A large number of distinguished guests were in attendance.

October 25, 1956 In recognition of United Nations Week and Rotary World Fellowship Week, Rabbi Nathan Kaber, Chairman of the club's U. N. Committee, presented a special program, including a U. N. film, "Of Human Rights", and the presentation of a United Nations flag to the City of Altoona, represented at the meeting by Mayor Robert Anthony and all members of Council.

December 18, 1956 On recommendation of the Board of Directors the club approved a contribution of \$1,150 toward the purchase of a station wagon for the Blair County Society for Crippled Children and Adults. This amount represented one-half the cost, the other half being underwritten by the Altoona Chapter, American Business Clubs. The approval of the contribution also provided that the money be withdrawn from the club's Student Loan Fund. The station wagon was to be used in transporting to and from the Y.M.C.A. participants in the Crippled Swim Program. Agreements over legal technicalities and interest safeguards were worked out by Attorneys Louis S. Walton, Jr. and Robert F. Hare, Jr., representing Rotary, and Attorney Park Loose representing A.B.C.

February 19, 1957 A new name for the club bulletin, "ROTA-NOTE" was the winning selection in a contest conducted in the membership. Fred Miller and Charter, Honorary member Dr. John Nugent each submitted the same suggestion. Duplicate sets of glassware were awarded as prizes. The runner-up name, "ROTA-SCOPE", was also submitted by two men, President Robert E. Eiche and Dr. James Taylor, Sr.

May 7, 1957 Pauline Frederick, a native of Gallitzin, nationally known commentator at the United Nations, presented a masterful discourse of her experiences during a Ladies Night held at Jaffa Mosque.

June 17, 1958 The retiring Club President was surprised at a climatic evening with a "This Is Your Life, George Kelchner" program. The pageant reviewed the human side of the life of President George, a man of tremendous impact on the community, while ever working in a quiet, unassuming manner.

July 9, 1958 A distinctive club banner design was adopted and a supply ordered. The banner depicts the Horseshoe Curve inside a Keystone, done in five colors.

October 1, 1958 The Board initiated the custom of providing memorial volumes to the Altoona Public Library and the Penn State Center Library on the occasion of the deaths of Altoona Rotarians. The books would contain suitable inscriptions, and the families of the deceased members would be informed of the memorials by the librarians.

1958-1959 Past President Howard W. "Pop" Lindaman served as District Governor for Rotary District 735. Altoona hosted the District Conference at Bedford Springs on April 26, 27, 1959. A record registration of 465, including 74 Altoonans and guests, provided a splendid tribute to Governor "Pop".

October 2, 1961 Tragedy shocked the club. President A. Bruce Denniston was killed in an automobile accident. Immediate Past President Rabbi Nathan Kaber was elected by the Board of Directors to complete the term.

November 1, 1961 Beginning an annual tradition, the Board of Directors, at the invitation of Director Joseph C. Glasgow, met for dinner and business session at Spruce Creek Rod and Gun Club, of which Joe was a member.

1962-1963 An intensive survey was made of the southern business and shopping areas of the community to determine the feasibility of establishing a new Rotary club in that section. A special committee, including Bill Brumbaugh, Tom Colantino, Ernie Wissinger and Joe Orr, Jr., determined that while some interest was expressed, it was their considered opinion that the area was not ready to support a strong club. The Board of Directors formally accepted this recommendation, and further action was terminated.

1963 Rotaryann Judy Pollock prepared a spectacular collage of the club's bannerette collection. The banners were attached to a large dark blue felt material measuring approximately seven by fifteen feet, and designed to be hung on the wall back of the head table at club meetings.

May 17, 1966 An elaborate banquet with an extravaganza pageant marked the celebration of the club's Golden Anniversary. In preparation and rehearsal for almost six months the affair was by all measurements the most outstanding event ever staged by the club. 279 people attended the affair, held in the Logan Room of the Penn Alto Hotel. Special guests included Robert Barrett and his Rotaryann, representing the original sponsoring club Pittsburgh, District Governor Lee Treible of Waynesburg, and Dr. John Dollar of Tyrone, incoming District Governor. Old club documents and pictures were on display. The Pageant was written, directed and narrated by Rotaryann Muriel, wife of Walter L. Oswalt. All participants were Rotarians and Rotaryanns. Included were such acts as an eight-man Glee Club; a Chorus of ladies, with choreography by Rotaryann Jane, wife of Ardie J. Dillen; Beautiful Babies; Bathing Beauties; Flappers; Hula Dancers; Go-Go Girls; The Beatles; and Apple Seller, Dr. Fred Miller. Dr. Clair Burket presided at the organ for all numbers. The general theme was "Do You Remember?", and a large sized replica of the entrance to the old Logan House was the principle feature of elaborate decorations. A fine souvenir booklet was given to all present, edited by Bill Canan and designed by Hans Kraatz. Past President Arthur Pollock was General Chairman for the commemorative affair.

October 9, 1967 The club was again sadly stricken by the unexpected death of Treasurer Howard W. Peffer. As General Secretary of the Altoona Y.M.C.A. he had been instrumental, as noted earlier in this record, in organizing and controlling the club's successful Rotary Swim Program. Joining Altoona Rotary in 1940, he was during the War Years a member of the clubs in Port Jervis, N.Y. and South Amboy, N.J., returning to Altoona in 1948. Howd maintained a continuous perfect attendance record for 27 years. After his death the Board of Directors elected Robert E. Donahue to the office of Club Treasurer.

July 1, 1968 Past President Arthur E. Pollock began his duties as Governor of Rotary District 735. Due to the illness of his Rotaryann Judy and subsequent death, Governor Art asked for assistance in his District duties. On the recommendation of the District College of Governors Past District Governor F. Perry Smith of Cumberland, MD was appointed by Rotary International in November 1968 to act in Governor Art's place for the remainder of the year.

October 8, 1968 A Ladies Luncheon was held with 220 attendees, including 92 guests. Speaker for the occasion was Anne Blair, Washington News Bureau Chief for a number of Television and Radio outlets.

October 15, 1968 Herbert T. Wolf, Sr., by contribution to the Rotary Foundation, became the first club member to be named a Paul Harris Fellow of the Rotary Foundation.

April 18, 19, 20, 1969 The District Conference was hosted by the Altoona Club at Hershey, PA. 54 Altoona Rotarians and Rotaryans, plus 2 Citizens-of-Tomorrow were included in the total registration of 428.

August 6, 1969 Rotarian Helmut O. Hornung, a State Game Warden, asked the club to sponsor a program of firearms education for children under 16 years of age, as required by the State for licensing. The club complied, and through Vice President Edward R. Brown and Bill Brumbaugh, provided arm patches for the young participants.

December 9, 1969 Because of continually lessening activity in the Student Loan Fund action was taken to expand the aid to high school graduates, and to make grants rather than loans, to carefully screened applicants. The activity was renamed The Student Grant Fund.

July 14, 1971 The Club undertook to clean up and plant shrubbery in the small lot at the exterior corner of the Mishler Theatre. A plaque was attached to the wall commemorating this project, with indication of continued maintenance.

June 27, 1972 A surprise program of recognition and appreciation was presented for Dr. Fred D. Miller. It was noted that no Rotarian had ever done more for the advancement of Rotary in Altoona than Fred Miller. A member since 1919 he had likewise served the longest period of membership.

July 1975 The Club sponsored the relocation in Altoona of a Vietnamese family. Rentals, furniture and food were subsidized. Work was found for the husband, and educational arrangements made. Clyde Yon, Tom Cooney, Ed Giller and Jack Ray, among others, gave much time and assistance to the project. Cost to the club was over \$3,000. In the end the family left the city and moved to Harrisburg.

May 25, 1976 The Club observed its 60th Anniversary with a special commemorative program narrated by P.D.G. "Pop" Lindaman. Rotarian Robert C. Jubelirer, State Senator of this District, presented a Citation to the Club from the State Senate of Pennsylvania.

July 1976 In recognition of the United States Bicentennial, Club memorabilia and rosters were deposited in the Time Vault provided to the community by the Mid State Bank.

September 8, 1976 A Fellowship Day for the club members, including a special dinner, and provision for all recreational activities, was highly enjoyed at Blairmont Country Club. This fellowship get-together has since been repeated annually several times.

May 4, 1977 A large wall display case was erected in the Penn Alto Hotel Lobby for the permanent showing of the club's collection of approximately 300 bannerettes from Rotary Clubs all around the world. Jack Rea chaired the project, arranging placement of the banners; Joe Orr, Jr. provided the carpentry and materials; Don Devorris the lighting; and Francis Huber, Hotel owner, provided the wall space. This is a colorful and handsome display.

July 1, 1977 Irving Seltzer began his year as District Governor of the 42 clubs in Rotary District 735. Irv had served as Club President in 1973-74.

March 31, April 1, 2, 1978 Hosted the District Conference at Sheraton Motel. John D. Anderson was the Conference Chairman. Governor Irv Seltzer reported 100% participation by the 42 clubs, with 601 total registrations, including 83 Altoona Rotarians and 95 guests. 443 attended the Governor's Banquet.

May 1, 1979 Five area clubs, Altoona, Hollidaysburg, Martinsburg, Roaring Spring and Claysburg held a joint dinner meeting at the Sheraton Motel, with 166 present. Six men from India, the visiting Group Study Exchange Team, were honored. The visitors provided the program, information of social and economic activity in their home land.

September 18, 1979 A new banner listing the names of the Club's Paul Harris Fellows was formally presented to the Club by the visiting District Governor, Donald J. Tressler of State College. Rotarian L. Eugene Leapley, as Special Chairman, had designed and arranged the procurement of the banner. As further Paul Harris Fellows are designated, their names are being added to the banner, which has become a permanent display feature at Club meetings.

SUPPLEMENT to CLUB HISTORY of March 1980

June 1981

November 10, 1979 A successful College Fair was held in Jaffa Mosque, with Rotarian Jerald P. Sacks as Chairman. Forty-four Colleges were represented. Approximately 400 high school students took advantage of personal contact with the facilities and offerings of the institutions.

December 18, 1979 The Club visited the Altoona Area Vo-Tech School, ate luncheon in the dining hall, and toured the shops and instructional operations.

January 28, 1980 57 Club members and guests enjoyed a bus trip to St. Francis College for a basketball game between the Red Flash and the University of Pittsburgh. Before the game a fine smorgasbord dinner was enjoyed.

March 25, 1980 An in-club celebration of Rotary's 75th Anniversary was held. Old films were shown, and much historical memorabilia and photographs were on display. A club History Booklet edited by Secretary Ralph A. Mannion was distributed.

April 9, 1980 With Altoona serving as host the six Blair County Rotary Clubs held a joint meeting at the Sheraton-Altoona in celebration of Rotary's 75th Anniversary. 324 Rotarians and guests participated. Pennsylvania Governor Richard Thornburgh was the guest speaker, introduced by Altoona Rotarian State Senator Robert C. Jubelirer. The meeting was the personal project of President Thomas D. Cooney, and was the outstanding event of the Rotary year.

Sep. Oct. Nov. 1980 On a trial basis the club met once in each of three months at The Holiday Inn, The Eldolyn Terrace Restaurant and The Heidelberg Club. It was determined that if for some unforeseen reason the Penn Alto Hotel might become unavailable, one or other of the alternate locations could be used.

November 1980 Preparation of the club billings was changed from manual to computer processing.

December 1980 The Club attained 1,000 percent status in the Rotary Foundation.

March 17, 1981 In a surprise program Secretary Ralph A. Mannion was honored for 25 years of service as Secretary and Bulletin Editor. Seven Past Presidents, who had served during that period, expressed the esteem of the club.

April 21, 1981 60 Secretaries were guests of club members in a special recognition program celebrating Secretaries Week. Each one received gifts.

April 28, 1981 Arranged by President R. Stanton Over presentation of checks to 16 charitable and civic organizations was made to representatives of the various groups. The total amount involved was \$7,100.00, the proceeds of the 1980 Rotary Radio Day campaign.

June 16, 1981 32 Club members were awarded Certificates of Perfect Attendance in recognition of having maintained 100 percent attendance for 1 to 33 years.

June 16, 1981 Proceeds from this day's Rotary Radio Day campaign have been committed to purchase an aluminum casting copy of the statue "The Express Mail Carrier" by Heinz Warneke, in the National Collection of Fine Arts, Washington, D. C. This statue is then to be presented by the Club to the Altoona Rail-Roaders Museum.

ONGOING ACTIVITIES AND CLUB CHARACTERISTICS

To the present date the Rotary Club of Altoona has had 64 different Presidents, of whom 24 are still living. Four of the Presidents, Arthur E. Winter, Howard W. Lindaman, Dr. Arthur E. Pollock and Irving Seltzer, have been honored, and have honored the Club, by election to the office of District Governor.

There have been only five Secretaries during the 64 years of the Club's existence: George G. Zeth, Frank F. Hennaman, Rev. Harry L. Saul, J. Clyde Cassidy, and Ralph A. Mannion.

The Club has been included in seven different Rotary Districts: No. 3 until 1918; No. 5 until 1922; No. 34 until 1939; No. 180 until 1945; No. 178 until 1949; No. 264 until 1957; and No. 735 until the present.

Attendance has ever been stressed as true evidence of Rotary spirit and ideals. Historically approximately 25 per cent of the membership have maintained perfect attendance from year to year. The current holder of the record is William T. Canan with 44 years, since his induction in 1936.

The Handicapped Swim Program has been the most outstanding community service provided by the Club. Begun by Thomas L. Caum, it has been guided since his death in 1962 by Clyde E. Yon. Each year the participants and their families are entertained at a special Christmas Party; and they are taken annually to the Circus, tickets being provided by individual Rotarians.

Club meetings have from time to time been conducted at other locations as guests of those facilities. These include the Altoona Campus, the Altoona High School, the Allegheny Lutheran Home, the Altoona Y.M.C.A., and the Altoona Area Vocational-Technical School.

For many years the Club underwrote the summer camping expenses, two each year for blind boys, and for the Y.M.C.A. Camps.

During the past several years bus trips have been made to Major League baseball games in Pittsburgh, and to College Basketball at St. Francis College, Loretto.

Several area Rotary Clubs enjoyed the sponsorship or assistance of Altoona in their original organization. Included are Hollidaysburg, Roaring Spring, Tyrone, Coalport and Huntingdon.

Begun in May 1973 the Club has annually conducted a so-called Rotary Radio Day. To provide funds for the Club's charitable projects the members solicit spot radio advertisements to be broadcast during the selected day. Radio Station WFBG, owned and operated by Rotarian Edward T. Giller, has made its facilities available for these special ads and Rotary announcements. Rotarians act as Assistant Disc Jockeys. During the last campaign in 1979, over \$9,000 was raised, which has been distributed to a number of worthy charities and community operations.

Historically the Club has enjoyed continuously excellent programming at Club meetings. The Program Chairmen have ever been especially dedicated to the task of providing fine programs.

In the area of assistance to Youth, the Club, in addition to programs outlined earlier in this record, has participated in or sponsored such other activities as: Career Conferences for high school students, including in November 1979 a College Fair; Awards to specific winners in the Junior Achievement movement; Sponsorship of a number of high school age Rotary Exchange Students, both in sending them to foreign countries for a year of study, and receiving students from other lands, this necessitating the providing of host families during their stay in the community, with arrangements for attendance at school; Special Show Blanket awards to 4-H Dairy Calf Club participant winners; and Sponsorship of an Interact Club in the local high schools.

Providing for successful integration of new members into the Club, in addition to informal introduction on the first day of attendance, formal induction is conducted with a special ceremony involving a respected member of the Club, and with the new man's sponsor making a biographical introduction. This is followed by a Rotary Information Meeting or a Fireside Meeting conducted by the Club's Executive Officers, again assisted by the respective sponsors.

Honorary members have been elected from time to time, though relatively sparingly. With the exception of war time service the award has been given usually to senior members who have in their lives and Rotary service exemplified the high ideals of Rotary. In at least one instance Honorary membership was given to a nationally respected community area personage upon his retirement and return to the area, U.S. Commissioner of Narcotics, Harry J. Anslinger.

Up to the present time eight Altoona Rotarians have received the distinguished honor of Paul Harris Fellowships of the Rotary Foundation, through the contribution to the Foundation of \$1,000 in each case, by the individual, his family, a friend, a group of fellow members, or by the Club as a whole. These honored men are: Herbert T. Wolf, Sr., Dr. Arthur E. Pollock, Howard W. Lindaman, Ralph A. Mannion, Ernest E. Wissinger, Irving Seltzer, John Rea and William T. Canan.

Club bulletins, issued weekly, have provided information as to programs, attendance records, notices of special meetings and events, and current facts about members. It is not known when the first bulletin was provided, or by whom edited. A printed card form was used during the 1920's titled "ROTA-SQUIBS". Secretary J. Clyde Cassidy, during his years in office, edited a paper known simply as the "WEEKLY BULLETIN". Beginning with 1956, when it was titled "ROTARY NEWS", and changed to "ROTA-NOTE" in April 1957, the Club bulletin has been edited by Secretary Ralph A. Mannion.

At the last Club meeting of each Rotary year it has been a long standing tradition to present the retiring President with a diamond centered Past President's Rotary lapel button. Also, the retiring President's name and year of office is then engraved on the silver bands of the Club's ceremonial gavel.

The events and activities recorded in these annals have withstood the test of time, in themselves attesting to the remendous impact of the Rotary movement. Altoona is a finer community because of the influence of dedicated Rotarians during the past 64 years, exemplifying the Rotary mottoes of "Service Above Self" and "He Profits Most Who Serves The Best".
