

Speaker-Jared Frederick WWII Students and Soldiers

Jared presented on students and faculty members of Penn State who participated in WWII. Penn State began in 1939 as The Undergraduate Center because of railroad workers need to take evening classes. Forty-two percent of gun owners are women and 1 Sunday per month they offer women's only training with donuts at double tap. Supply change issues continue to be troublesome with ammo, for hunting calibers in particular. In 2019 there were 8.5 million new gun owners.
