


Message from the District Governor Craig Devenport

Ukraine Relief

The letter that follows this introduction is an urgent message for assistance from our Rotary Brothers and Sisters in Ukraine. It highlights the war-time induced limitations of the Rotary International Disaster Relief focused fund initiative by the Rotary International Foundation Trustees to assist Ukraine. Meanwhile Rotary must and can do more.

Locally, Rotary District 7410 has executed one \$125,000 Global Grant earlier in calendar year 2022. You will see an update on that from PDG Mary Ellen Bentler in this newsletter.

Another Global Grant application is currently in process in collaboration with Rotary Districts' 2231, 2041, 7410 and 1940, including twenty-two (22) Rotary Clubs. These clubs include five (5) from Rotary District 7410, with approximately \$13,100 in combined contributions by these District 7410 clubs. The other seventeen (17) Rotary Clubs are spread across the globe, including Italy, Poland, The Netherlands, Scotland, Germany, and Ukraine. This effort was introduced to us in the district at the District Conference in November 2022, and we have acted! This Global Grant will total \$142,269 U.S. Dollars and purchase up to six (6) water filtration systems for communities in Ukraine.

Additionally, our District leadership has approved a protocol for clubs and individuals to donate funds directly to our District Treasurer function for international wire transfer to the Warsaw City Poland Rotary Club to support steady state requirements to continue providing long term relief to Ukrainian refugees and Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs). This process was introduced last month to all club leadership positions and District Assistant Governors in the District via a Clubrunner e-mail message blast.

To date we have realized \$2,450 in contributions (including from non-Rotarians) to send to the Warsaw City Poland RC to support this steady state requirement. Bluntly, we need more! See your club leadership and consider donating to this initiative as soon as possible.

LETTER to RI PRESIDENT NOMINEE Stephanie Urchick from D2232 team

1st of January 2023

Dear RI President Nominee Stephanie.

We hope you and your family are safe and well now. As you know, DRF funds collected for Ukraine by Rotarians of the world have been exhausted.

On behalf of every Ukrainian, we are sincerely grateful for all the help we were able to provide thanks to DRF. We are convinced that our efforts have significantly improved the situation in Ukraine.

According to the results of using the DRF, **442** grants were implemented by different districts. Including our D2232 was able to realize **24** grants.

About 30% of the total amount was spent for the projects outside of Ukraine.

Another **40%** of the total amount was received by foreign districts based on applications for the individual projects of some Ukrainian Clubs, and the District does not have accurate information about their use.

Finally, only **30%** of DRF was spent in Ukraine under the fair rules of participation among all **66** Rotary Clubs.

Unfortunately, the situation in Ukraine remains extremely difficult. The biggest threat at the moment is the arrival of Winter. In our region, the temperature can drop to **-30 degrees Celsius**. The issue of providing Ukrainians with heat and electricity is a matter of survival. It is the infrastructure facilities that provide this and are now the main target of all missile strikes.

From every Rotarian and from every Ukrainian, we ask you to consider the possibility of further financial support of Ukraine. Perhaps, based on the results of the DRF distribution, the format can be somewhat optimized.

The D2232 team is ready to take full responsibility for every dollar of aid. We have complete and absolute information about problems and needs in every region of Ukraine and are able to respond to all challenges as effectively as possible.

We are always ready, at any convenient time for you, to discuss the above facts and possible next steps in a joint Zoom meeting.

We are infinitely grateful for everything you have already done for Ukraine, and we believe that we will not be left alone with the enemy in this dark, cold and hungry winter.

Ukraine Relief District Foundation Committee

I wanted to inform the District Members of the efforts we have made to help the people in Ukraine. Rotarians throughout the world donated \$15 million to support 400 Disaster Response Grants that are providing essential support to people whose lives have changed because of the war in Ukraine.

District 7410 was the lead district on a multi-District Disaster Response Grant for \$125,000 with 4 other districts in New York and New Jersey and the District 2232 and the RC Kyiv International.

With this grant we provided \$125,000 to supply shelter, beds. water filters, linens, mattresses, refrigerators and washing machines to support some Internally displaced people in Irpin Ukraine.

Also, Dave Palmer the chair of the International Service Committee worked with the Milano Nord Rotary Club in Italy to support a Pure Water for Ukraine. The Milano Nord Rotary Club is apply for a \$142,269 US Dollars for the Global Grant to supply 6 Attrezzatura Water Purifies for Ukraine. District 7410 has committed \$40,100 to support this grant. This consist of \$15,000 of our District Designated Funds with the 80% match from the world fund of \$12,000 and club contributions of \$13,100.

These are two examples of how the Rotarians in this District continue to provide Service Above Self and improve the lives of the people in our communities and around the world.

By Supporting our Rotary Foundation we can continue to make the world a better place!

Ukraine Relief Rotary Membership grows by 23.5% in Ukraine

Recently I ran across an article on My Rotary https://my.rotary.org/en/ that spoke of a 23.5% increase in Rotary membership in Ukraine since February 24, 2022. The article was by Tom Gump, member of the RI Membership Growth committee and past governor of District 5950 (Minnesota, USA), and Mykola Stebljanko, publicimage coordinator in Zone 21A and past governor of District 2232 (Ukraine).

It seems that the region, including Rotary District 2232 added four Rotary clubs and five satellite clubs. The article commented that the reasons behind this growth provide important insights for Rotary clubs and districts desiring to increase membership and or add clubs.

Clubs in Ukraine became more visible in their communities in the days and months after the war began, as people witnessed the positive impact clubs and members are having and wanted to join in in making a difference. An example of this was one club whose members became volunteer firefighters so they could put out fires and provide emergency services when local buildings were hit by shelling.

Tom's ultimate point was that "people are drawn to the opportunity to find meaning and purpose when they see real positive change taking place."

Thank God we do not have to rely on a war to realize this opportunity for meaning and purpose, but we have dozens of needs in our communities each day that can manifest positive change taking place in our communities and region. The key is that we need to also publicize these activities outside our Rotary family in a fashion that provides a positive public image in our communities that manifests the opportunity for Service Above Self.

I spent thirty-seven years in the United States Air Force, (USAF), before joining Rotary in 2013. In the USAF, our motto was "Service Before Self," so I found the call to Service Above Self by Rotary familiar and attractive. I know from reading our monthly district newsletter that many of our District 7410 clubs are remarkably busy in their communities and the world, executing every type of service imaginable. We need the words and images that these articles transmit internally to also be expressed in our local and regional media, to witness the positive impact of our clubs and members.

If Rotary in Ukraine can increase by 23.5% in ten months, despite a war, we can certainly increase our membership under the environment of peace. I am immensely proud to be a Rotarian. 

THE ROTARY CLUB OF TRAIL

Don Demarest, club president for The Trail Rotary Club, Factoryville summed up his feelings about his involvement with Rotary International as a whole:

"When you wake up and smell the coffee, then pour yourself a bowl of Wheaties, put your glasses on and shake the cobwebs loose, you pick up the paper and realize everyday what non-profit organizations ac-

complish in NEPA for the good of our citizens and children. Now magnify this by the thousands across this country."

He sees the big picture. "Rotary is not just a club, it's an education."

Demarest has witnessed firsthand what the organization has done locally as well as throughout the world. And he wants to spread to the world that people are needed in all walks of life to help the endeavors club members face.

The Factoryville resident has been busy with Rotary for three years, club president for 2011-2012 and 2012-2013, and has experienced first hand what the organization does locally, as well as throughout the world.

"It's just amazing how much the government or county or non-profits have made a difference during times that are hard for citizens...so no matter how little, every bit is appreciated. It's a team effort. I stress that — T-E-A-M effort."

Though Demarest's team is small, he claims it is mighty. He says there are a lot of clubs larger and stronger than his, yet they are No. 1 in their district per capita in giving per member; 12 members and counting. The majority of them are baby boomers, born between 1946-1964. "At present, we have most likely achieved the American Dream. But, slowly, our future and dreams are fading fast. As far as tomorrow, most are taking it a day at a time. If you care about our young people, our children, and grandkids, how many tomorrows will it take so they have a brighter future? Will they be able to live the American Dream?"

Some of Demarest's successes with The Trail Rotary Club include having started a chess club, sponsored a bowling tournament for the last two years to raise money for polio, and helping out at the library every Saturday from 10 until

His goal is to increase membership. His hope is to start clubs for past alumni, teachers from any district club and 21-30 year-old graduates from Lackawanna Trail. Demarest said it only takes five members to start those satellite clubs and members can meet once or twice a month whenever and wherever they want. The Trail Rotary Club, they meets at Gin's Restaurant on Tuesdays at noon. Meetings are open to the public.

According to him, the difference is non-profit organizations do this with love, honor and most important, they do it peacefully. "There is little time left before we pass on, so be a mentor, volunteer, perform a service or join a club. We are the future. With positive thinking and an 'I Can Do' attitude, we can make dreams come true. Kindle the spark to continue. Ignite the flame toward mankind. Reach within and embrace humanity."

Holiday Giving: 191 children each received \$50 GAP gift cards (\$9,550). Donations to the project were received from the Mauch Chunk Trust (\$1,500), the Jim Thorpe Neighborhood Bank (\$500), and two Anonymous Angels (\$2,000).

This includes ~ \$3,200 in support of the Rotary Foundation and other international projects.

<u>Membership:</u> Robert Presley, Superintendent of the Jim Thorpe Area School District was officially inducted as a member on December 6, 2022.

<u>Bloodmobile:</u> 33 individuals (Rotary and community members) participated in our blood donation drive in December.

For the first time in two years, we were able to hold our annual Christmas Party on December 16!
