Rotary District 7410 proudly presented the Rotary colors at the 164th annual Harford Fair from 15-20 August. Twenty-four Rotarian volunteers from twelve District 7410 Rotary Clubs helped cover the booth, providing information to the viewing public about Rotary. The fair attracts an average of 50,000 visitors each year, and the exceptional weather this year promised a similar showing. The fair offers a cost-effective way to spread the public image of Rotary. At least one new membership resulted, with three other potential new memberships in discussion with the club membership chair. In addition, ninety-two dollars in donations to End Polio Now was realized. The New Milford Area Rotary also realized \$140 for its on-going 50-50 Raffle Ticket sales.

Railriders Baseball Game & Rotary District 7410 PolioPlus Fundraiser

August 14th marked the return of Railriders Baseball to the variety of PolioPlus fundraising opprotunities and public image events for Rotary District 7410. This years game realized the purchase of 132 tickets for \$660 raised for the Rotary Foundation and PolioPlus. In addition, for the first time the Railriders organization provided 100% of all proceeds from the Community Organization of the Game (COG) Store to our effort. In the end a total of \$760 was raised. With the matching feature offered by the Gates Foundation, the District hit a home run with \$2,280 riased for PolioPlus.

Also a first this year was our collaboration with the Northeast Immunization Coalition and the Pennsylvania Immunization Coalition. Each organization provided handouts and representatives at our COG table to highlight and encourage immunization efforts. This effort supported the December 2021 Rotary "Call to Action to fight COVID."

Fellow Rotarian Carol Ferguson, Founding Director of the Pennsylvania Polio Survivors Network provided the game's radio interview and threw out the ceremonial first ball. Carol was accompnaied by her Grandchildren and husband.

Next year's game is already in the plans and is to include a return to traditional paper tickets, as we continue the fight to "End Polio Now."



District Governor Visits Hazleton Rotary

Hazleton Memorial Scholarship winners 2021-2022 Darren Zheng and Louis DeAngelo updated the club on their 2nd year of college activities and thanked them again for the four year scholarship provision they each received. Zheng was awarded \$2,000 per year for four years and DeAngelo was one of two winners of \$1,250 per year for four years.





August 2022 Report

District Governor, Craig Davenport visited us and gave an overview of RI and District activities.

Donations: Second Harvest Food Bank - \$100; Carbon County Friends of animals - \$250

Membership: Mr. Robert Presley, New Superintendent of the JTASD, will be applying for membership. A mixer will be held at the Wild Elder on Sept 13 and potential members will be encouraged to attend.

Mad Money Raffle: Solicitation letters for the raffle (prizes: \$500, \$300 and \$200) were mailed - drawing date, Sept. 20.

Ghost Walks: our major fundraiser, will begin on Sept. 23. The online registration and ticket purchase is being worked out. A "mock Ghost Walk was held on August 16 and 17 members and or family and friend participated. After the Walk, members attended a "Tithing Tuesday" at the Union Publick House. The latter donated \$250 to the Rotary (10% of the proceeds) our club. National Night Out: five members attended to promote Rotary and raise money. We sold icy pops and Mad Money tickets. A 'thank-you' for our participation was received from the Jim Thorpe Police Department.

Summer Recreation Program: ended on August 11. 125 children in grades 2 – 6 enrolled and participated in art & crafts, a STEM program, games, sports activities, etc. They received breakfast and a delicious lunch (courtesy of SHINE). The Program was free-of-charge to the participants.

Childcare Program: in cooperation with Lehigh Valley Children's Center and the Jim Thorpe Area School District, we continue to work out the details of setting up pre-K, and before & after-school programs.

Carbon County Friends of Animals: Director, Dana Dunbar reviewed the program. It is a cat-only shelter. We collect items (paper towels, cleaning solutions, cat/kitten foods, litter, etc.) once per month an donate them to the CCFA.

Covid Update: Club member, Dr. Clem McGinley, presented an update on covid and answered members questions.



Jim Thorpe Rotary Ghost Walks Kicks Off 2022 Season



For 23 years, the Jim Thorpe Rotary has held the annual Ghost Walks from September to December. Lantern-wielding costumed storytellers have shepherded thrill seekers through the historic streets of Jim Thorpe. Men, women, and children, couples and families, stroll around the West side of town, formerly known as Mauch Chunk. Tales of eerie happenings, intermixed with the history of the town are woven together to form an interesting narrative. The people who built these fantastic structures are long gone, but thanks to the art of storytelling, participants in the ghost walks are transported to another time to learn about the lives of past residents – and how they ended.

Club president, Jeanne Miller, a member for over 20 years explains: "The wonderful thing about the Jim Thorpe Rotary Ghost Walk Is that not only is it a fun experience, it also supports the children and families in our community.

What many may not realize is that this endeavor is a charitable operation. Jim Thorpe Rotary has organized the Ghost Walks since 1999 and have raised over \$190,000 to fund local community programs such as a free 8-week long summer camp for children, scholarships for graduates, a Christmas clothing drive for needy children, and funding local charities and organizations.

Clem McGinley notes: "It's a very popular activity that requires a lot of volunteer effort/coordination with all our Rotary members and guides (who run the walks). The Ghost Guides are excellent and the success of Ghost Walks is directly attributable to them. Our current guides are Casey Parker, Eric Bloom, and Kelly Fritz, with Mindy Mankyo filling in as needed. Of course, there are many other guides who have contributed over the years, and deserve credit too."

In 2021 alone, the Ghost Walks entertained more than 1,000 people. Bob Stevenson & Mary Mulligan and Clem & Sophie McGinley have done most of the coordination: scheduling Ghost Hosts & Ghost Guides, selling tickets by phone, managing finances, etc. This year, the club is excited to announce that they have moved the ticket sales online to make it easier for participants and organizers alike. Tickets for the 2022 Jim Thorpe Ghost Walks go on sale online starting this Friday, August 26. Visit https://www.jimthorperotary.org/ for more information.

Tickets are non-refundable and ticket holders will receive a commemorative wine glass. This is a 21 plus event, so ID will be viewed by security at the gate. No coolers, no food, no alcoholic or outside beverages, no firearms and no pets will be allowed through the entry gates.

Music will be provided by 2 bands, PopStar Drive and Inside Out, who will alternate entertaining through the day. Wine, food and other vendors will be selling their goods.

The Festival is the major annual fund-raiser for the Tunkhannock Club and helps fund programs that benefit the local community (e.g. Drug Take Back Outreach, dictionaries for 3rd graders, Tunkhannock Public Library, Dietrich Theater, Victims Resources, HANDS, etc.), as well as, international projects (e.g. polio eradication, exchange students, disaster relief, etc.).
