Judging Criteria

- Originality (30 points): Be original. Use your own thoughts, ideas, or experiences to describe "Service Above Self". Create human interest appeal.
- Development of Theme (45 points): Capture the reader's attention and establish the major theme of the essay. Support and explain ideas in a clear logical order with smooth transitions. In conclusion, emphasize the major theme in the essay leaving the reader with a clear, concise message or point of application.
- Mechanics and Neatness (25 points): Follow the rules. Check spelling, grammar, punctuation, choice of words, clarity, and expression.

Rules

- The contestant must be a junior in a public, private, or home school and a Scott County resident or enrolled in a Scott County school.
- The essay must be from 300 to 500 words (1 to 2 pages).
- Quotes may be used to support ideas if properly referenced.
- The essay must be typed in 12-point font and double-spaced using 1-inch margins.
- Submit the **Entry Form,** the **Essay,** and **Photo Release** by the due date.
- The essay must be the work of the student only.

- How can we use this motto to guide our decisions?
- How do you feel lives are changed through service?
- What would the world be like if everybody followed this motto?
- How does "Service Above Self" relate to your life experience and/or society in general?
