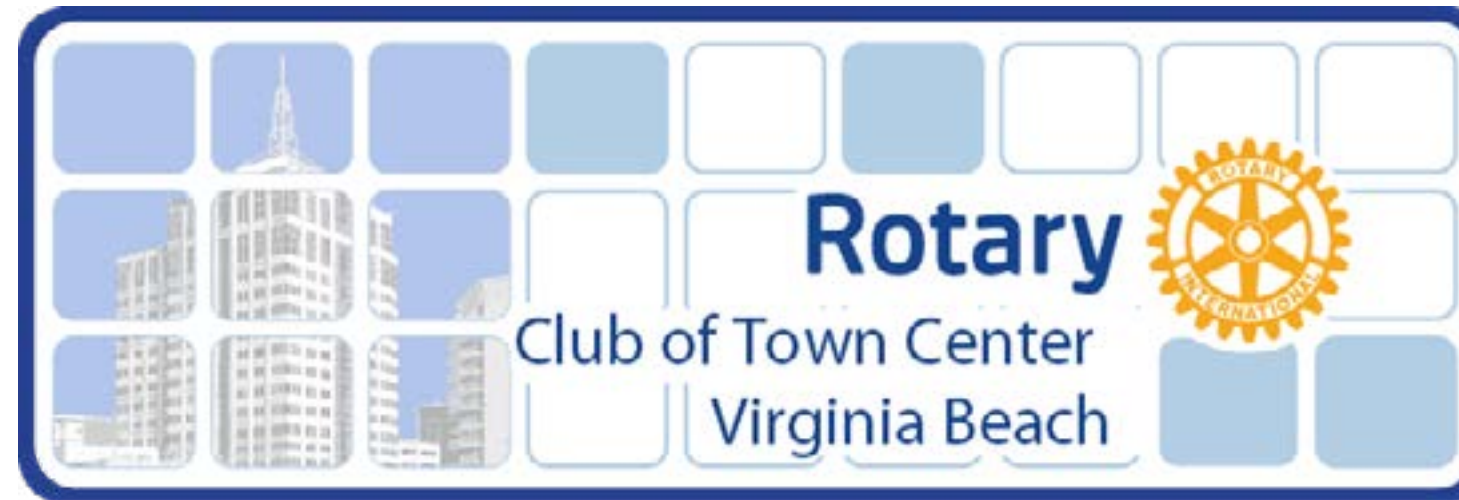

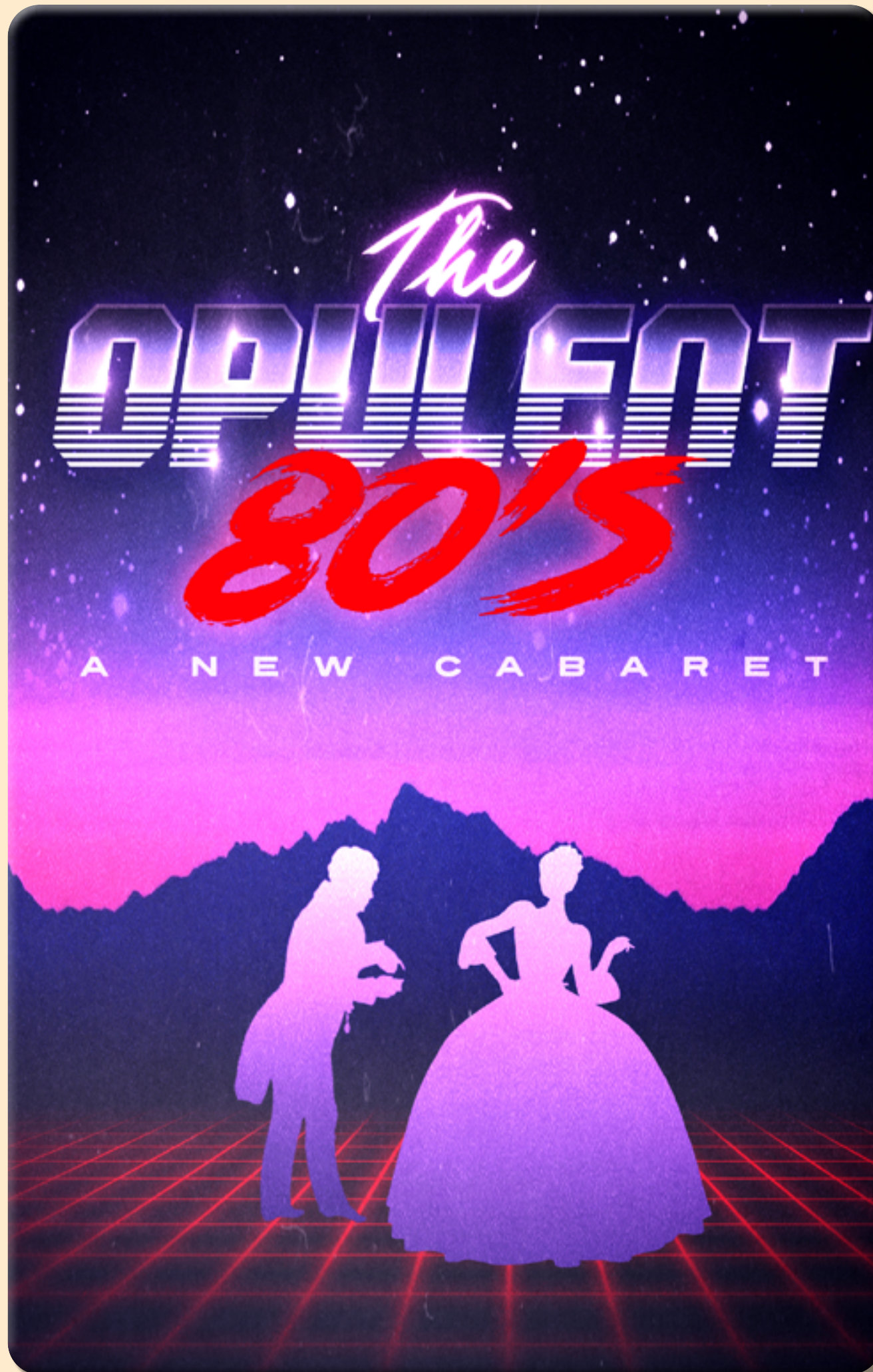

# Paradise lost



**“Kamilo” means “twisting of currents” in Hawaiian, so it’s an apt name for the beach near the southernmost tip of the island of Hawaii.**

**Early Hawaiians combed the white sands of Kamilo Beach for driftwood; they used the enormous evergreen logs that had traveled there on ocean currents from the American Pacific Northwest to make dugout canoes.**

Today, the same ocean currents bring a different kind of debris to the beach, along with a new moniker — “Plastic Beach” — and the distinction of being one of the dirtiest beaches on earth.



## Paradise lost (Continued)



A clockwise pattern of ocean currents called the North Pacific Subtropical Gyre flows south along the west coast of North America, across the Pacific, north along the coast of Japan, and back across the Pacific to complete the circle.

In the middle of this is a calm spot known as the Great Pacific Garbage Patch, less a trash island twice the size of Texas than a soup of microplastics — plastic from North America and Asia that has broken down into tiny pieces, like spices floating in broth.

The Hawaiian Islands act as a sieve, catching the debris carried by the vortex of water.

An estimated 15 to 20 tons of trash washes up annually on the 9-mile stretch of coastline that includes Kamilo Beach, 90 percent of it plastic from the Great Pacific Garbage Patch.



## Paradise lost (Continued)

At just one cleanup in August, volunteers from the Rotary Club of South Hilo and other partners collected 790 pounds of marine litter: 37 bags of trash, 100 pounds of loose plastics, and 300 pounds of nets and fishing lines. Last fall, Hawaii County ended its plastics recycling program, and the club is working with the Hawai'i Wildlife Fund and other partners to find new ways to divert plastic from landfills. "As an isolated island community, we are more directly and severely impacted by our environment than many other communities," says South Hilo Rotarian Keith Greer, who led the project. "Our footprint is constrained, and if we don't take care of what we have, there is no place else for us to go."



## Things you can do

- ***Pack your own toiletries*** when you travel instead of using the small plastic bottles in hotel rooms — or look for hotels that provide soap dispensers instead.
- ***Carry a refillable water bottle*** and decline the free ones offered at meetings.
- ***Bring takeout containers to restaurants*** so you can avoid using plastic foam to carry home your leftovers.
- ***Wear microplastic-free sunscreen and cosmetics.*** Go to [beatthemicrobead.org](http://beatthemicrobead.org) to find out which ones are. Buy soaps, shampoos, and lotions in bar form instead of in bottles.
- An average load of laundry containing synthetic fabrics sends more than 6 million plastic fibers down the drain. ***Wear natural fibers*** instead — or buy secondhand clothes. (Clothes release the most fibers the first few times they are washed.)
- ***Recycle plastic packaging*** such as newspaper bags, shipping envelopes, bubble wrap, air pillows, and zip-top bags. Find a local drop-off site in the United States at [plasticfilmrecycling.org/drop-off](http://plasticfilmrecycling.org/drop-off). Consumers in North America can look for the “How2Recycle” label on many products for guidance.
- ***Buy products with less or no packaging.*** Buy your fruits and vegetables loose or bring your own reusable bag.

## Community Health Initiative, Haiti

Pat Edwards, Paramedic, recently returned from leading a medical team in Haiti. As a team of 10 they were the smallest medical team ever deployed by CHI. They were joined by two Haitian doctors.

A typical team size is 25. The five days of clinic were held in the two villages they have been working in for the last 6 years - Do Digue (4 clinic days) and Fondol (1 day - which is up in the mountains and takes two hours by foot or donkey to get there with all of our supplies. They saw 1148 patients, a few very ill which were taken to a hospital in Port au Prince and they delivered one baby boy who was named Jonathan by his mother.

A typical sized team will see 1500 so the numbers seen were good. The March and June clinics were both cancelled due to political unrest, making this the first clinic held since January. The next clinic will be held in October. CHI holds 5 medical clinics and 2 surgical clinics each year.

Haiti is on the Western third of the island of Hispaniola. With an estimated 10.5 million citizens, 75% are estimated to live below the poverty line. The majority of live on less than \$2 per day. Frequent natural disasters only worsen the situation. Please assist us in supporting them.



Pat works with the Community Health Initiative, Haiti. This organization has worked with hundreds of volunteers from across the United States and Canada to reach the primary and public healthcare needs of Haitian patients. CHI collaborates with local talent in their service areas to combat malnutrition, provide clean water, promote safe environments and deliver healthcare for the members of partner communities in the Arcahaie area of Haiti.

To honor this initiative and promote awareness of the service provided, we have been donating \$10 in the name of our weekly speaker to the Community Health Initiative for the last three years. This is a symbol of our ongoing awareness of the issue and a call to action while providing clean water for a family each week on an ongoing basis.



### Clean Water Project



**How to Use the Gadyen Dio System:**  
 1. Put 2 capsules of chlorine into the 5 gallon bucket, wait 30 minutes.  
 2. Use the spigot to get the water you need from the bucket. Keep the lid on the bucket, and keep the bucket out of the sun.  
 3. Water is now clean and you can drink it without a problem.

#### MAKE A "WELL" OF A DIFFERENCE!

Our work happens in Haiti as a result of a collaboration between awesome volunteers and generous donors - like you, our US & Haitian friends, staff and partners. Together we are making real tangible quantifiable changes!

#### BRINGING CLEAN WATER TO HAITI MAKES A 'SPLASH!'

Our clean water project is an exciting opportunity that positively impacts the livelihood of the Haitian communities where we work. In fact, recent data from our Gadyen Dio water treatment bucket program indicated reduced rates of diarrhea among users, decreasing from 40% to 1.8%.

In the mountains and foothills near the region of Arcahaie, CHI's Quality Control Workers (QCW) have distributed more than 1,000 Gadyen Dio (Water Guardian) water treatment buckets, which are complete with a lid and water spigot. In collaboration with our Extended Term Volunteers (ETVs), each bucket has been numbered and identified with GPS coordinates. Our Haitian staff and ETVs spent time with the families in their homes, asking them about their health and drinking water. From a 2012 survey, we know that 98% of the water from many of these sources is contaminated with fecal matter. Thus a water treatment system for our families is imperative for their health and safety!

Each month, the QCWs return to visit the families, ensure the buckets are operational, sell replacement chlorine, and answer any questions the families may have. By staffing this project, CHI encourages health equity by continuing to lower incidents of diarrhea, cholera, typhoid fever, rotavirus, and other water borne illnesses.

Currently, 1,000 buckets have been distributed into the homes in our service area. CHI works with a company called Deep Springs International to distribute their Gadyen Dio buckets. Their mission is to "...improve life in developing countries by identifying and encouraging the use of affordable water purification systems, teaching the importance of proper household water treatment, and creating new business opportunities for local people." Using this business model has been instrumental in enhancing quality of life, reducing rates of diarrhea and providing economic opportunities for our Haitian staff.

Our vision of unanimous access to clean water is large. With CHI and Gadyen Dio, each small step we take brings us closer to achieving that goal.

We assessed the abilities of the "Learners," and have developed a plan to provide training/direction to these largely untrained teachers to help them be more effective. These visits are always "eye-opening" as well as fruitful, and lest I neglect to mention - enjoyable!

October 20, 2019 Terekeka - Day #24

This has been letter-writing day. The letters from so many of you were distributed a few days ago. The process started at about 1:45 this afternoon, and the last one completed at 5:00. It is always a marathon with younger children needing help from beginning to end and older ones writing and rewriting with lots of artwork. Letters from the hearts of the children at the Terekeka orphanage on their way to you!

October 21, 2019 Terekeka - Day #25

It was an energetic worship service with music from children, teachers, house mothers, cooks, and cleaners - and an inspired word from Steve Wiley, urging us all to give thanks in all things. The river is too high for swimming but it was a great walk, with crocodile sighting, a couple of snakes, several monkeys, and a kajillion frogs in evidence. A perfect end to a very good day!

Date: October 21, 2019 Terekeka - Day #26

This was the final assessment day for BCLP - Tomba's 4 Bush schools. These schools are educating students in distant communities too far from existing Primary schools, many of which are already over-crowded. The drill was the same - alphabet trays, numbers bingo, floor puzzles, groups reading from "Big Books." The Buko students acquitted themselves well, and Tombs has new materials to add to his arsenal. I also gave out the last of the ties to a few teachers and the oldest males at the orphanage; and scarves and earrings to the cooks at the school. Notice the deep scarring on the faces of these women - the tribal mark of the Mundari. We all enjoyed Harriet's terrific chicken soup and chapati for lunch. This little slip of a girl knows her way around a Bush kitchen! I have almost completely divested myself of all the supplies so many of you generously donated. A few earrings still remain, some crayons and markers, materials for Uganda. Two more full days here, which I will spend at the school - then back to Juba on Thursday, on to Uganda Friday morning.





## November 11, 2019 Terekeka - Day #47

My last day in South Sudan and a memorable one it has been! I went to the school with Angelo and company to address the students one last time - also shot some video footage, which they really got into and had quite an audience. Unfortunately, the flight was delayed for two hours, and at the Rumbek airport with no creature comforts, that is a very long time! Only 45 minutes to Juba, thank goodness!

Here's where it gets interesting. Upon landing, I was met by two nice young men in the employ of the Ambassador at whose home I was invited just last Thursday. I was whisked to AFEX for quick change and then off to - VOILA! - the residence of the President and First Lady of South Sudan - President Salva Kir and Mary Ayen Mayardit! I knew this was in the works but didn't say anything about it, because it could have very easily not happened. The security at the residence is tight, as you would imagine. There are no plain clothes police as we have in the U.S. - just soldiers in camouflage with big guns - AK 47s, I presume, but don't know that much about military weapons. They had not been told we were coming and swarmed the vehicle we were in. It got my attention.

I was accompanied by a career diplomat with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs just back from a posting in Turkey, who made a couple of phone calls, and a few minutes later we were allowed to drive in the compound. I wasn't allowed to take any photos - no surprise there - and it would be hard to describe the interior of the grounds, actually pretty non-descript. The door opened and we were led into a room that could only be described as opulent. You can tell from the background in the photos the type of furniture -and a lot of it - red velvet with gold trim. I was seated in a chair where my feet could barely touch the floor.

This diplomat and I were left alone for about 10 minutes, during which time I tried to get information. "What do I call the First Lady?" "Her Excellency." "How many children do the President and First Lady have?" "In our culture, we don't talk about the number of children so don't ask that question." I was getting the impression I shouldn't ask any questions at all.

Finally "Her Excellency" appeared and it was time for the photo op. I was asked for my camera and there was another camera in use, I suppose to record the visit for the First Lady. I would say she is reserved. She doesn't speak fluent English, which surprised me, and one reason for the presence of the diplomat was to interpret. Most of the visit the First Lady was talking directly to the interpreter, but when I spoke she looked directly at me. We discussed the need for education in South Sudan and she thanked me for my efforts in bringing education to her country. She had visited the U.S. during the Obama Administration, and had met Michelle Obama and had a tour of the White House. She asked me to greet Michelle for her, and I had to explain that most likely that would not happen.

The President and First Lady are eager to establish a relationship with the U.S. that will result in greater involvement of American interests in South Sudan. Everyone appreciates the role the U.S. played in helping the South gain independence from the North. She was pleased to learn that I like local food, and said she would be happy to cook for me sometime. I asked if there was anything specific she would like from the U.S. and she said any gift would be appreciated. For about 15 minutes there was similar banter and when the interview was over, it was obvious she was finished.

I appreciate this opportunity and those who made it possible. Maybe in time some good can come of the visit.

Tomorrow I fly to Entebbe, Uganda, and the Africa portion of this trip will close. It has been full and profitable, although not everything was accomplished that I had hoped and even expected. Wednesday I will rendezvous in Tel Aviv, Israel, with my daughter, Rebecca, and we will spend the next 11 days touring the sites of the Holy Land compliments of a mutual friend.

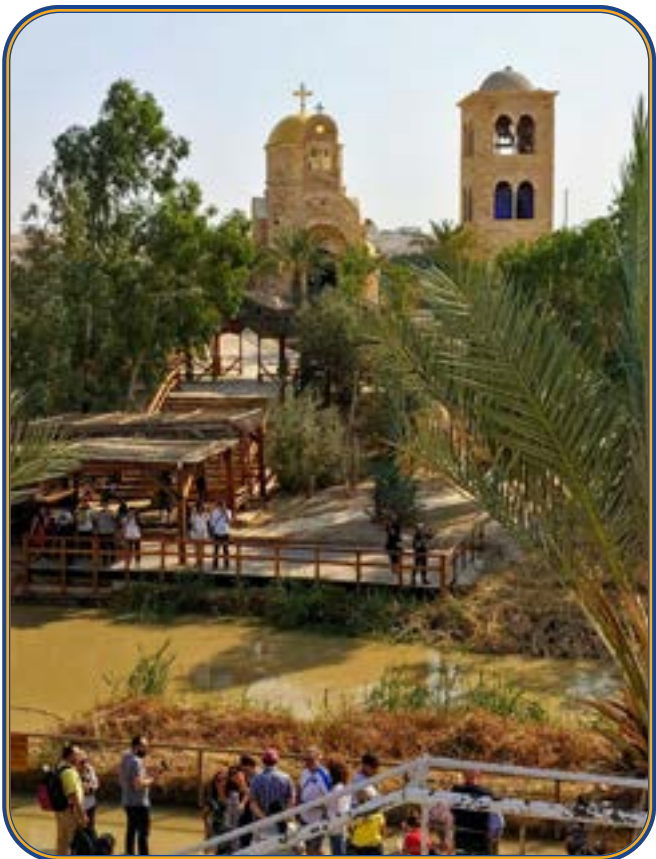


November 17, 2019 Terekeka - Day #53

We checked out of our Tiberias hotel at 9:00 this morning and headed south toward Jerusalem. Our first stop was Kaser El Yahud, the actual location where Jesus was baptized by John - located in the occupied territory of the West Bank. During the hour or so drive to this spot, Elad gave a history of the Arab/Israeli conflict beginning in 1948. To say this is a complicated issue would be a gross understatement. I have a better grasp of the situation and the events that led to the current impasse, but can't say I totally understand it despite Elad's efforts and my questions.

We got to Jerusalem just in time for lunch at the Mahane Yahuda Market - this time at a Jewish-Iraqi restaurant that served dishes with some of the most unique flavors I have ever experienced - hard to describe. Each dish was brought to the table in a big bowl, from which we served our plates. When that one was finished another one was brought, so only one dish was served at a time. The first was Kubeh - semolina stuffed with beef served in a broth. Then Sufrito - basically beef pot roast, but maybe the best I ever tasted. Moussaka was next - also excellent - followed by Azura - the house specialty - eggplant with minced beef and pine nuts in a cinnamon safron sauce. Elad insisted we sample Rogalach, an Eastern European pastry from a Kurdistan bakery. I am still full!

After lunch, we drove into the Old city and to the Mount of Olives area where we could see the Dome of the Rock on Temple Mount; an ancient Jewish cemetery; and walk through the Garden of Gethsemane. Outside the church adjacent to Gethsemane is a carving in stone of Jesus kneeling - praying and obviously in great agony - one of the most moving depictions of the hours before the crucifixion I have seen. We will spend more time in the Old City, but Elad wasn't feeling well and needed to get home. We hope he is much improved tomorrow. Blessings! Ellen

# Forrest P. "Bill" Anderson

June 12, 1930 - August 9, 2019

Born in Memphis, TN • Resided in Virginia Beach, Virginia and Salisbury, Maryland



Forrest P. "Bill" Anderson died at age 89 on Friday August 9, 2019 at Peninsula Regional Medical Center. He was surrounded by family in his last hours. He had been a resident of Salisbury, MD since June 2017. He lived in Virginia Beach for most of the prior 40 years. He was born on June 12, 1930 in Memphis, TN. He was the son of Jerry M. Anderson and the former Dorothy Burnett.

He is survived by his wife, Hathaway G. "Happy" Anderson, residing in Virginia Beach. They were married on September 17, 1954, in Montgomery, AL. He is also survived by his children, Robert G. "Bob" Anderson (Donna) of Salisbury, Elizabeth P. "Libby" Anderson (Joe Mahon) of Garrison, NY and William K. "Bill" Anderson of Asheville, NC.

He had two grandchildren Robert G. "Rob" Anderson, Jr (Tori) of Salisbury and Christine E. "Christy" Hallman (Steve) of Salisbury. He had seven great-grandchildren: Brooke, Ellie, Will and Seth Anderson as well as Brinley, Charlotte and Sawyer Hallman. He received months of compassionate care and friendship from his family in Salisbury as well as from Visiting Angels and at Atria Assisted Living.

He was a loving husband, father, grandfather and great-grandfather (known as Granddaddy). He was courageous, tough, ambitious, a Patriot, a leader and a problem solver. He often had a servant heart. He traveled to many parts of the world while in the Navy. He continued to travel, mostly to England, in retirement.

Forrest P. Anderson entered the Naval Academy in 1949 and graduated in 1953. He retired from the Navy in 1981 with the rank of Captain. During his time in the Navy, he served at 12 different duty stations in Florida, Virginia, California, Hawaii and Italy. He flew over 200 combat missions, in Vietnam, as a Fighter Pilot



primarily flying the F4-Phantom. He was Commanding Officer of Fighter Squadron VF 213, USS Spiegel Grove LSD 32 and the USS Oriskany CVA 34 Aircraft Carrier. The Spiegel Grove and Oriskany now serve as artificial reefs off the coast of Florida.

During his Navy service he was awarded numerous medals and service ribbons. These include the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Bronze Star Medal (for Valor), the Air Medal and the Presidential Unit Citation.

He joined Kidder Peabody in Norfolk, VA in 1983 as an Investment Advisor. Kidder Peabody became Paine Webber and eventually UBS. He retired from being an Investment Advisor in 1999.

He helped his wife open and operate Arcana Fine Linens in Virginia Beach. They also designed a custom vacation home that was built in 1986, near Kilmarnock, VA. The home was the site of many fun gatherings with friends and family. These gatherings included boating, fishing, eating crabs, enjoying the outdoor decks and the boat dock.

In Virginia Beach, he was very active in the Princess Anne Rotary Club and served as a volunteer at the Virginia Marine Science Museum for over 15 years.

He and his family attended Galilee Episcopal Church in Virginia Beach, starting in the late 1960's.

A Memorial Service will be held at Galilee Episcopal Church located at 3928 Pacific Avenue on Friday August 23, 2019, at 11am. Reverend Nigel Mumford will be officiating.
