Next Global Grant Scholars Selected

The D7610 Global Grant Scholarship committee met on Saturday, December 4, 2021 to interview five candidates competing for two \$40,000 scholarships to study abroad for the coming academic year. The committee was proud to announce the selection of Maija Butler, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Fairfax and Samuel Campbell, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Charlottesville.

Maija earned her BA degree from Franklin University, Switzerland (Political Science/Art History and Visual Culture) and MS from the London School of Economics (International Development and Humanitarian Emergencies). Maija will be furthering her studies at the Geneva Academy of International Humanitarian Law and Human Rights.



In her scholarship application, Maija explained why she made this choice: *“The program of study I am pursuing is the Master of Laws (LLM) in International Humanitarian Law and Human Rights. The Geneva Academy is a leading education and research institute globally renowned for training humanitarian practitioners in international law, human rights and transitional justice, and provides a rigorous and challenging academic environment with a diverse student body guided by today’s experts and leaders in peace education. The LLM program relates directly to Rotary’s Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution area of focus through both its approach in training students as effective real-world practitioners of peace, and through its course content emphasizing conflict transformation and resolution.”*

Also selected by the committee was Samuel Campbell who will be continuing his studies at the University of Cambridge in the United Kingdom. Samuel graduated from the University of Virginia (Global Development Studies and French) and studied Politics and Law at the Paris Institute of Political Studies. At Cambridge, Samuel will pursue a master’s degree in Conservation Leadership.

Samuel explained the importance of pursuing this degree in his scholarship application. *“To make an impact in wildlife and biodiversity conservation requires strong organizational leadership and management skills, but these are often lacking in the conservation sector. As Sir David Attenborough has said, ‘Saving our planet is now a communications challenge.’ We have sufficient evidence of the environmental problems mankind has caused and sufficient knowledge of the actions we need to take to protect our environment, but we need the societal and political will to make change. To cultivate this will require unifying leadership empowering communications and competent management. Cambridge’s Masters in Conservation Leadership is designed to fill this gap. This learning environment will allow me to grow as a professional and smoothly transition to the next step in my career with new capacity for leading positive change.”*



Area of Focus Statement of Purpose and Goals: TRF enables Rotarians to prevent and treat disease and support health by: 1. Improving the capacity of local health care professionals 2. Promoting disease prevention and treatment programs that limit the spread of communicable diseases and reduce the in-

cidence and effect of noncommunicable diseases 3. Strengthening health care systems 4. Providing clinical treatment and rehabilitation for physical disabilities 5. Funding graduate scholarships for career-minded professionals related to disease prevention and treatment

The eradication of polio has of course been Rotary International's major worldwide, corporate effort since the early 1980's. Remarkable progress has been made. The job is not finished however and you can rest assured that we will not, cannot, set this torch down until that job is finished. Disease prevention and treatment is one of the Rotary Foundation Areas of Focus. And for good reason. The health and vitality of a person, a family and a community can be seriously impaired by what in many cases is a preventable disease. Disease prevention is really a keystone to progress in other areas as well because of the interplay with other areas of focus like Water and Sanitation and Maternal & Child Health.

Polio Eradication: Light at the End of the Tunnel?

Three decades in, it's still a moving target but we must stay the course.

As I sat down to write this article, my memory brought back an evening in the late 80's when the chair of the Polio Campaign Committee of the Springfield Rotary Club (Springfield VA D7610) and a member of his committee met with Jo and me in our home to urge our support for the very first Polio campaign. A couple of weeks earlier, he had announced at a club meeting that he and members of his committee would be calling each of us to set up an appointment to explain why Rotary was having this campaign and why every club member needed to support it.



As I thought about this, I remembered that Chuck Davidson and I were members of the same Rotary club at that time, and that the chair had either already visited Chuck and Nita shortly before or would be visiting them shortly thereafter. I also remembered that, as a result of that meeting, Jo and I both became

Paul Harris Fellows with the proceeds going to polio. It is now a little over three decades since that evening meeting. And fellow-EPNC Chuck and I are still urging Rotarians in Zone 33 to support eradication of the incurable wild polio virus.

We have faced many obstacles over the past 30+ years but we can now see the light at the end of the tunnel. We have seen inflation raise the cost of delivering the vaccine to the children from about 60 cents a dose to more than \$2. We now have to have two types of vaccines—an injectable as well as an oral one. An injectable vaccine requires paid health workers who can give the injection to a child. The World Health Organization (WHO) has hired health workers who can travel to the 40 countries where we know, by testing, that the virus still exists either in the wild or circulating in the environment.

When we first started there were three types of the polio virus. We have now stopped the transmission of two of those virus types. At the beginning, one of our greatest logistical problems was keeping the vaccine at the right temperature as we transported it to sites in the third world. Recently, terrorist threats and the killing of health workers in certain areas have raised our costs by requiring security protection for our health workers. Poor governmental infrastructure has also been a problem in many of the areas we are still working in.

We have made much progress over more than three decades. One of our partners, WHO, has developed and set in place almost 150 labs to help identify the virus type and identify its DNA so we know its origin. We have only had four reported cases of the wild virus in the endemic countries, Afghanistan, and Pakistan, so far this calendar year. We have had a few hundred reported cases of vaccine derived polio, but a new vaccine has been developed that is more stable to mutation and should lead to that issue's resolution. And, we have also learned that preventive inoculation will be able to keep us at zero cases once a country gets there.

But we also know we ARE NOT THERE YET. We are still vaccinating 400 million children in 40 countries. We are keeping the outbreaks and cases to a minimum. Yes, there is light at the end of the tunnel, but we haven't completely eradicated the moving target yet. We still haven't completely fulfilled the commitment that Rotary made to the mothers and children of the world in the 80's.

Please continue to support Rotary's #1 humanitarian priority with your individual and club contributions. And please remember the 10 little words of Mother Teresa that PRIP Jim Lacey gave to us many years ago...IF IT IS TO BE, IT IS UP TO ME!


