In his ground-breaking book *Start with Why*, author Simon Sinek challenges us to always ask the question “Why” before we try to understand the reason for doing or judging something. In that vein, we ask the question WHY do we have two District 7610 newsletters? Are they required by RI? Do they each perform the same function? Are they mandated by district leadership? The answer to all three of these questions is NO.

Then why do we have two district newsletters? The reason is simple; they perform two quite distinct and different functions. The district newsletter is club focused. Club events, celebrations, announcements, commemorations and the like make great articles in the district newsletter. They recognize, promote, and authenticate our club activities.

The district TRF newsletter is, as you would assume, focused on The Rotary Foundation.

It promotes TRF by recognizing and thanking TRF program participants (the Paul Harris Society, Major Donors, Global and Peace scholars) and honoring club Global and District Grants. It also strives to educate all of us in the complexities (and sometimes confusing rules and procedures) of TRF. Articles are provided that may not be club specific, but are always Rotary specific to educate, inspire, and motivate us toward action.

This issue is a good example. There is an article announcing the next applications

for Rotary Peace Scholars, End Polio Now (with a special video by RIPE Jennifer Jones), Annual Fund-SHARE information, the Basic Education & Literacy Area of Focus, the Paul Harris Society, and specific data on how each club in our district is progressing with their TRF giving. The last page lists (with contact information) all district TRF program leaders. They are always available for your questions and concerns. If you wish to become more knowledgeable about our TRF, simply read the TRF newsletter each month. To put all of that information into one district newsletter would create a too lengthy edition.

There you have it. One great Rotary district with two great newsletters. One dedicated to clubs and one dedicated to The Rotary Foundation. What could be better!

- Since 2005, three DRFCs/PDGs (Sandy, Chuck Davidson and currently Juanita Cawley) and numerous other dedicated Rotarians have lovingly edited the district TRF newsletter.
- Our district publishes two newsletters. Rotary International publishes thirteen.



A few decades later, this disease would play an even more active role in my life, when I became a member of Rotary.

We have the privilege in our lifetime to participate in the removal of a disease from this planet, which is nothing short of miraculous. Each member of Rotary can "own" this victory,

each one of us can help shape our collective story.

Service is what we do but polio has truly helped define us. It has shown us that we have the perseverance and drive to tackle the world's most challenging problems. It has increased our understanding about the importance of partnerships and it has been a rallying cry that has united us one and all.

Of course we had partners in this journey – but Rotarians brought leadership – "in the field" volunteerism, financial stewardship and we have been the heartbeat of the entire effort."

Rotary Peace Fellowships



Each year Rotary selects up to 130 peace and development leaders from around the world to receive fully funded academic fellowships to pursue a Professional Development Certificate or a Master's Degree related to peace and conflict resolution and prevention at one of the participating Peace Centers around the world (USA, Japan, UK, Australia, Sweden, Thailand and Uganda). The host institutions are:

- Duke University and the University of North Carolina (Master's Degree)
- International Christian University, Tokyo, Japan (Master's Degree)
- University of Bradford, England (Master's Degree)
- University of Queensland, Australia (Master's Degree)
- Uppsala University, Sweden (Master's Degree)
- Chulalongkorn University, Thailand (Certificate Program)
- Makerere University, Uganda (Certificate Program)

*** Important Note:** *Fellowship Recipients may not study at a Rotary Peace Center in their home country, with the exception of candidates from Thailand and Uganda, who may study at their respective universities.*

The Rotary Peace Fellowship is designed for professionals with work experience in international relations or peace and conflict prevention and resolution. Applicants must also meet the following requirements:


- Three years of related work experience for the Master's program, five years for the certificate program.
- Proficiency in English
- For the master's program, proficiency in a second language (strongly recommended)
- Excellent leader skills

You play a critical role in promoting the Rotary Peace Center's programs to potential candidates. Peter's Page—**HAPPY NEW YEAR!**

Happy New Year Everyone! It is now January 2022, that means we are in the last half of this Rotary Year and time is going to start flying by. Good news, district's giving for the Annual Fund-SHARE at the end of December was at \$434,376 compared to \$306,589 last year at the end of December. That a 42% increase, which is super. How is your club doing at meeting its giving goals? Do you know what your club's goals are? Only 26 clubs (46%) have posted their goals. When was the last time your club's meeting program was about The Rotary Foundation? Ask your club TRF chair to present a review of your club's giving plan and ensure you are on track to achieve it.



Let's not forget PolioPlus. The district contributions are a little better (6%) than last year at this time (this year \$36,186, last year \$34,141). Remember, those funds are used as soon as they are needed so submit your donations as soon as you get them. (Also, in many third world countries the PolioPlus infrastructure is being used to provide COVID immunizations). We are in the home stretch for eradicating polio. We do not want to have a resurgence, which could lead to new resistant strain of polio. COVID-19 is a good model of how this can occur This is not a project which we can afford to fail.

I am a big believer in planning ahead and completing large tasks in small easy increments. While the Rotary Year goes from 1 July—30 June, your federal and state tax years are still 1 January—31 December. If you are not already doing it, start a recurring donation to the Annual Fund-SHARE or PolioPlus or both now to get that deduction at the end of 2022. Don't wait until the end of the year. Doing it in small increments makes it easier and removes some of the end of year stress when money might be tight due to 2022 holidays.

With the new calendar year have you made any resolutions for 2022? It is not too late and here is an easy one to make and keep. Make a resolution to become and maintain a Sustaining Member status if you are not already doing that. For this Rotary Year that means donating a minimum of \$17 a month to the Annual Fund-SHARE starting this month, January. If you can afford \$20 a month start with \$17 a month to the Annual Fund Share and give \$3 to PolioPlus. Next July split evenly \$10 to the Annual Fund-SHARE and \$10 to PolioPlus. Once you get started you will find it easy to maintain. More importantly you will be helping people around the world through Global Grants and PolioPlus, and our district through District Global Scholarships and TRF's District Designated Funds (DDF), which are used to match our club Global Grant funds and fund our District Grants (\$3000 per club in RY 2021-2022). Now that is a great way to start the New Year!

BASIC EDUCATION AND LITERACY Rotary supports activities and training to improve education for all children, and literacy for children and adults.

Area of Focus Statement of Purpose and Goals TRF enables Rotarians to ensure that all people have sustainable access to basic education and literacy by:

1. Supporting programs that strengthen a community's ability to provide basic education and literacy to all
2. Increasing adult literacy
3. Working to reduce gender disparity in education
4. Funding graduate scholarships for career-minded professionals related to basic education and literacy

Parameters for Eligibility TRF considers the following activities to be within the scope of the basic education and literacy area of focus:


1. Improving academic outcomes at the early childhood, primary, and secondary levels, in collaboration with local school officials
2. Educating adults in reading, writing, and numeracy skills
3. Providing professional development opportunities for teachers with a qualified trainer in curriculum implementation, effective instructional methods, or student assessments
4. Strengthening basic educational outcomes by providing improved learning materials and facilities supported by enhanced curricula and new professional development for teachers
5. Improving academic support for before- and after-school programs by training tutors and teachers, conducting student assessments, and providing equipment if needed
6. Supporting educators' ability to help students with physical or developmental disabilities achieve greater academic outcomes by providing professional development opportunities for teachers and staff, as well as basic educational materials and enhanced facilities if needed



Paul Harris Society Update


