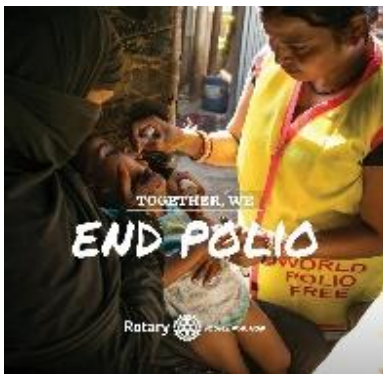

Happy New Rotary Year, RY2022-2023. Our Rotary theme this year is "Imagine Rotary" and after RY2021-2022 I am excited to **Imagine** what we can accomplish in RY 2022-2023. First, congratulations on all that you accomplished last RY. The numbers I am presenting are not final but should be pretty close. When I last checked our district donations were: Annual Fund –SHARE \$943,852.29 with 100% of our clubs donating; PolioPlus \$132,661 (that is \$97,660.50 from Rotarians and \$35,000 from District Designated Funds), with 71% of our club's donating; and \$16,321.25 donated to the Endowment Fund. The result is overall giving was over **\$1 MILLION! WOW!!** That is great and something to be proud of. Thank you for your support and willingness to help others.

Rotary President Jennifer Jones' theme this year is "Imagine Rotary", well **Imagine** the following: every club president gets their club TRF goals posted on My Rotary, so their club members know what they are. **Imagine** every Rotarian setting up a \$10 monthly recurring donation in Rotary Direct to the Annual Fund-SHARE? That is only 33 cents a day, which is pretty small. **Imagine** if Rotarians did that our district would be a 100% club-TRF giving in the first month of this RY. By the end of the RY, **Imagine** all our clubs would be 100% Sustaining Member clubs resulting in almost \$200,000 donated from those small 33 cents a-day donations.



After doing that, **Imagine** if on World Polio Day, October 24th every District 7610 Rotarian made a one-time donation to PolioPlus of \$25. That would only be an additional 83 cents per day that month, still very small, but the effect (figuring 2000 Rotarians in the district), would be an immediate \$50,000 from our district going to PolioPlus and increasing our district percentage of clubs giving to PolioPlus from 70% to 100%. Talk about being a leader and setting an example for all the other Rotary districts in the world, that would be it!

Do you know what I **Imagine**? I **Imagine** District 7610 being a 100% Sustaining Member District, a 100% club Annual Fund-SHARE giving district, a 100% club PolioPlus giving district, and another year of being a \$1 million TRF giving district for RY22-23. It is achievable. It starts with **Imagining** and then working to make it a reality. It can start with small achievements, but only if we start now. Let's get started and make what we **Imagine** into reality in RY 2022-2023!

Czech and Slovak Rotary members open aid corridor into Ukraine

Within a day of Russian troops entering Ukraine in February, Rotary clubs in the Czech Republic and Slovakia were using their connections to gain access to a strategic railway hub that has allowed them to shuttle critical supplies into Ukraine and help refugees get out.

The city of Košice, Slovakia, about 100 kilometers (60 miles) from the border

with Ukraine, is home to a rail terminus where east meets west. For decades, the terminus has received trains carrying raw materials out of Ukraine. A number of multinational shipping companies use the hub. Rotary members realized quickly that they needed to be able to use it as well.



Martin Pitorák, president of the Rotary Club of Košice, is a former vice president of U.S. Steel Košice, which uses the hub. He and Michal Sláma, president of the Rotary Club of Pardubice, Czech Republic, were among Rotary members who were able to negotiate access. “We acted very quickly,” says Monika Kočiová, a member of the Rotaract and Rotary clubs of Košice. “We were making arrangements while others were still knocking at the door.”

Rotary was the first humanitarian organization to get permission to use the rail hub for relief supplies, Kočiová says, and clubs have sent trains full of medical supplies, nonperishable food, and hygiene products across the border. The Slovak government and the European Union have since designated the hub as a primary pathway for sending supplies by rail into Ukraine.

Supplies that arrive in Košice are unloaded and sorted by Rotary volunteers into warehouses before being moved into Ukraine. Rotary and Rotaract clubs have also used more than 60 trucks and buses to carry 740 tons of supplies into the western Ukrainian region of Uzhhorod, just across the border. “It is great to see the power of Rotary at work in this time of need,” says Pitorák. “In addition to supplies, financial support is coming in from many parts of the world.”

Rotary and Rotaract clubs are part of an initiative called Railway Helps. Started by the owner of Gepard Express, a Czech passenger transportation company, Railway Helps is using passenger trains to bring supplies into Ukraine and refugees out. So far, the initiative has brought more than 500 tons of supplies into Chop, a town in the Uzhhorod region. Trains returned to the city of Pardubice carrying more than 5,500 Ukrainian refugees.

Kočiová and Ivana Lengová, both members of the [International Fellowship of Healthcare Professionals](#), oversee the purchase of medical supplies and the processing of medical equipment donated by companies in Europe. Lengová, a member of the Rotary Club of Košice Classic, helped secured equipment worth more than \$730,000 from Siemens Slovakia, including four mobile imaging units and three mobile X-ray units. “Because the fellowship includes members who work at Ukrainian hospitals, we have been able to react very quickly to changing needs,” Kočiová notes.

The clubs are also in regular contact with officials and volunteers at several Slovak-Ukrainian border crossings, coordinating accommodations and transportation for refugees. Just four days after the war began, Kočiová spent time at the border. “You could feel a lot of pain and see tears,” she says. “The refugees are broken, but they are very strong and proud. They were not asking for anything. Even the small children were not complaining.”

Kočiová was away from home on a business trip when the war began, but when contacted by a Ukrainian friend and fellow Rotaractor, she arranged for her to stay at her home. “I arrived home a day later and saw her with just one small backpack containing all she had,” Kočiová says. “She is a high-level manager. Her mom was escaping along another route, and her sister yet another, and they were planning to meet up in Switzerland. When you imagine yourself in that situation, it becomes very real.”

Global leaders urge action on polio eradication

G7 and Commonwealth Heads of Government call for strengthened support to global polio eradication effort.

Leaders at this week's (6/28/2022) G7 Head of State meeting in Germany and last week's Commonwealth Heads of Government meeting in Rwanda renewed global commitment to polio eradication. In their official Communiqué, the [Leaders of the Group of Seven \(G7\)](#) vowed to 'continue our support for polio eradication through the Global Polio Eradication Initiative', while the Commonwealth Heads of Government, in their joint Communiqué on '[Delivering a Common Future](#)', urged the continued intensified effort to eradicate polio, even amid other pressing health and development issues. These calls and commitments follow similar engagements made at previous global political fora this year, notably the recently-held [G7 Development and Health Ministers meeting](#), and the [World Health Assembly](#).

Global partners of the eradication effort, notably led by Rotary International and Rotarians around the world, are working with the public sector to ensure political commitments are fully operationalized.

In April 2022, GPEI partners, led by WHO Director-General, launched the '[Investment Case for Polio Eradication](#)', the sister document to the Polio Eradication Strategy 2022-2026, which lays out the economic and humanitarian rationale for investing in a polio-free world, as well as the broader benefits of polio eradication.

In October 2022, Germany will generously co-host a global pledging moment, giving the international development community and polio-affected countries the opportunity to publicly re-commit to this effort, including to support a stronger and sustainably-funded WHO, so that the organization can maintain its capacity to support countries in achieving and sustaining polio eradication, and continue to benefit broader public health efforts, including support for pandemic preparedness and response.

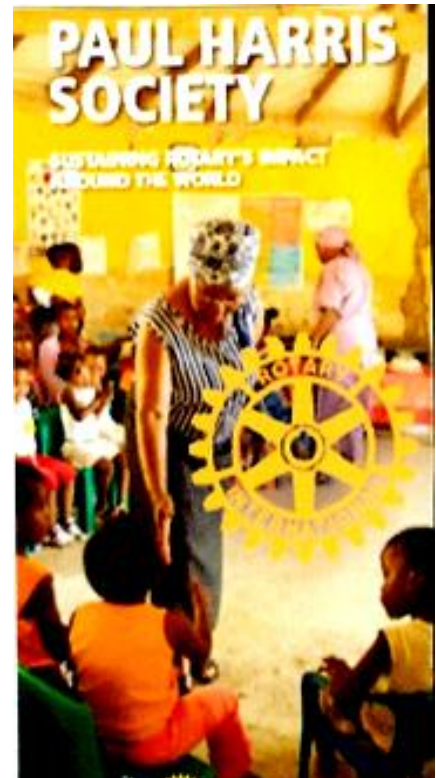
