#### **NEWS FROM ROTARACT**

The Annapolis Rotaract Club enjoyed the sunset on the Severn River at their Cigar Dinner held on October 1st at Port Annapolis. With more than 50 Rotarians and guests in attendance, the club was able to raise \$3500 for the Andrew Winters Togo Water Project, a partnership the club made easily with the Rotary Club of Potomac, sponsors of the project.

Howard County Rotaract supported the Columbia-Patuxent Clubs Luau-themed action by helping greet guests, monitoring the silent auction tables, and helping guests checkout at the end of the evening. Howard County continued with its own fundraiser by working the stands in Raven's Stadium. The club made contributions to the Walk Now for Autism.

# **HUNGER MINI-SUMMIT**

If your club was one of the eleven (Bladensburg, Greenbelt, Severna Park, Glen Burnie, Potomac/Bethesda, College Park, South Anne Arundel, Beltsville, Columbia, Washington, D. C., Catonsville) who attended the Hunger Mini-Summit on November 15th, you are aware of the dire needs in our own communities this year. In Maryland 516,000 people live below the poverty line. The demand for food from the Maryland Food Bank now exceeds the supply. Seventeen million pounds of food will be given out this year, but the demand is for eighty-nine million pounds of food. Did you know that \$1.00 you give to the food bank will buy \$7.00 worth of food. Our mission this year in Rotary International is to reduce child mortality. In Maryland, 70,000 children are served by the food bank each year. There is now also an increase in the number of senior citizens requiring help from the food bank. The situation in Washington, D. C. is just as critical. Our clubs can help with filling the gap between supply and demand. It is possible to virtual shop on line at <u>www.mdfoodbank.org</u>. The district is looking into finding a way that Rotary Clubs could shop this way as a club. Those in Anne Arundel County should check out www.aafoodbank.org who serve 800 homeless children in Anne Arundel county. Another wonderful program in the area is the "Help By Phone" program operated by College Park Rotarian Lois Jones. This is a short term program for those in crisis need of not only food, but other emergency services as well. This program serves 55,000 - 60,000 people annually by providing emergency food, medications, transportation, shelter and job help. Help By Phone can be reached at 301-441-3769. Give the gift of the human spirit – share with others what you have to give. Much thanks go to Hunger Chairperson, Joe Slert, for organizing this wonderful mini-summit.

#### **DISASTER RESPONSE TEAM**

The District's newly formed Disaster Response Team has issued a request for District Rotarians to be prepared for an event such as Katrina or Iowa in the future if needed. All Rotarians could help by preparing a "Care" package in advance. The base for the "Care" package would consist of your old coolers filled with such items as the following: pop-top cans of soup, canned tuna fish, beans, pop tarts, cereal and powdered milk, pasta, all types of canned goods, other non-perishable items, canned corned beef, canned beef stew, canned ravioli, crackers, Cheese Its, peanut butter, 2 rolls of paper towels, paper plates, bar soap, hand sanitizer,

powder, roll on deodorant, manual can opener, flashlight w/batteries, pre-paid cellular phone, dollar store wash rags. These items are based upon feedback from our two previous interventions, Katrina and Iowa. The cooler provides a handy storage unit which can be given directly to a family. As you fill your cooler, please make a list of the items inside (keep a list for yourself, as well). This enables the distributor on the other end to provide the kind of assistance an individual or family would need. Cash donations are also needed at the time of a disaster to cover the cost of transporting the goods. Our Crisis Response Team consists of Steve Kemp and Wick Caldwell, assisted by other members of the Greenbelt Rotary Club.
