# COLUMBIA TOWN CENTER ROTARY RESPONDS TO COVID-19 BY DELIVERING HELP TO THE MOST VULNERABLE

#### **Rotary Delivers Food & PPE**

By President Harsana Showunmi and Sharon Waligora month. The ODFP offers a good selection of food including canned goods, dry goods, fresh produce, frozen meat, and dairy items.

To help with the increased demand, CTC Rotary contributed \$4,000 over the past 3 months to help buy additional food and stepped up its hands-on support to load cars, direct traffic and deliver food. Because of COVID-19 restrictions, food bags were pre-packed and then loaded into the

trunk of each car. So, instead of transporting our families who have no transportation to pick up their food at the pantry, CTC Rotary improvised and delivered food to 27 families each month. Because of the increased demand from families in need and the requests for food to be delivered, Running Brook Elementary School (RBES) volunteers have willingly helped with deliveries. We anticipate that these families will continue to need our assistance in the coming months.

It was evident that in addition to the food crisis, there was a PPE shortage. Senior citizens are also extremely vulnerable to COVID-19, hence the need to take the necessary steps to help keep them safe. To help fight and protect against COVID-19, we provided PPE to Winter Growth, Inc., a Senior Care Facility in Columbia, MD. We acquired over \$2,000 worth of the following equipment and delivered it to the Columbia facility: 11 gallons of hand sanitizer, 80 KN95 masks, 130 washable cloth masks, 700 surgical masks, 100 face shields and 30 boxes disposable gloves.

Our thanks to several craftspeople who contributed equipment to this project including Elena Sotnikova for the face shields; Debbie from Frederick, HoCo Mask Makers, and Oanh Nguyen for sewing the cloth masks.

The Columbia Town Center (CTC) Rotary Club sprang into action in April to set up a hands-on project to help the most vulnerable citizens in our community deal with food insecurity and lack of PPE in response to COVID-19.

Fueled by a District 7620 COVID-19 grant, donations from Columbia Rotary Club, Howard West Rotary Club, and generous contributions from community

members, CTC Rotary set out to provide food for families living in downtown Columbia, struggling with food insecurity due to lost jobs and lack of access to the Free and Reduced Meals (FARM) program for their children at school. Additionally, CTC Rotary took on the difficult task of acquiring PPE for senior citizen care facilities and volunteers during the peak of the COVID-19 crisis.

When the pandemic hit our community, prompt response was paramount. After a record grant request turnaround from District 7620, with the leadership of Sharon Waligora and Harsana Showunmi, CTC Rotary sprang into action, leveraging our existing partnership with the Open Doors Food Pantry (ODFP) at Mt. Zion United Methodist Church in Highland MD. Every 3rd Saturday of the month the Food Pantry provides food to an average of 80 food-insecure families in the community and was ready to take on the challenge of providing more. Since this crisis began, CTC Rotary has helped the ODFP distribute food to 180, 206, and 192 families in April, May and June, respectively, at their "Drive-Thru" Food Pantry; serving more than double the typical number of families each

others, it was a date night, and for some, it was a first time experience.


The Ellicott City Rotary Club hosted the first of what they hope will be many drive-In movie nights at the Howard County Fairgrounds. Born out of the desire to do something good for the community, the HoCo Community Drive-In premiered on June 13th, 2020. The goal was to create a way for people to safely get out of their homes for an evening of family fun that supported local businesses by raising funds to assist those being impacted by COVID-19. A spectacular night under the stars was the result.

Rotary members, family, and friends volunteered to help park the sellout screening of The Princess Bride. Using an open donation model, community members donated as they were able, and this allowed those who might not be able to afford a night out with their family be do so. The event, which sold out in just 4 days, was greatly helped by the support of Senator Katie Fry Hester. In addition to sponsoring the first movie, Senator Hester helped the Rotary Club of Ellicott City navigate the state's shutdown/reopening guidelines. With her sponsorship, the event raised over \$3000 for local charities.

The atmosphere at the event was relaxed and friendly. Local restaurants offered discounts; people chatted with others from their cars, and the mood was cheerful. At the end of the movie, everyone started honking their horns with approval. And, in less than eleven minutes, the field was empty again.

The Club is hoping to run the event in July, and may make this an annual fundraiser. The drive-in movie organizer, Charles Kyler, noted the importance of supporting our local community. "It is a Rotary tenant and being able to lift people's moods and raise some relief funds was a bonus. "Kyler was pleased to report that, a spectator exclaimed, "My five year old nephew said it was the best night of his life!"

# PAROLE, ANNAPOLIS AND GLEN BURNIE ROTARY CLUBS SET UP COVID-19 FIRST RESPONDERS RELIEF EFFORT

The Rotary Clubs of Parole, Annapolis and Glen Burnie set up the Anne Arundel COVID-19 First Responders Relief Effort, an effort to support healthcare workers, firefighters, police and restaurants during the coronavirus pandemic.

The \$30,000 effort will provide approximately 3,000 meals per week for six weeks for the workers putting themselves at risk on a daily basis to protect others. the clubs said in announcing the program, organizers said.

Donations began Easter Sunday with deliveries to Anne Arundel Medical Center and Baltimore Washington Medical Center.

"Faster than expected because we learned there was an expected shortage of support to workers on Easter Sunday." said Anne Myers, a spokeswoman for the effort.

Each of the clubs contributed \$5,000 to the effort, which was matched with \$15,000 from Rotary International District 7620.

Round Table Relief, an organization recently founded in Annapolis in partnership with Warrior Events and the Annapolis Police Foundation, will coordinate the order and delivery of meals to local hospitals, firehouses, and police departments. Restaurants have been closed to in-service dining, laying off thousands of service workers.

Warrior Events, an Annapolis nonprofit that works with veterans,

first responders and their families, was the first recipient of the funds and is helping coordinate the project. It started with food purchased from Heroes Pub, Adam's Ribs of Eastport and Sammy's Kitchen to provide lunches and dinners for police




headquarters as well as the four firehouses around Annapolis.

Due to conflicts and economic crises, their number has increased with UNHCR estimating that 79.5 million people were forcibly displaced in 2019. After Syria, Venezuela has the largest number of displaced people. The OAS has played a critical role in gathering support in Latin America for programs to support refugees.


### THANKS TO OUR ROTARACTOR "DREAM TEAM"

"In the context of COVID-19, tropical storm Amanda has exacerbated the needs and vulnerabilities of children being left homeless, losing their belongings, including school supplies and have had to move to shelters to protect themselves," says UNICEF Representative Ivette Blanco.

The DC Rotary Foundation added an additional \$1000 grant towards relief efforts as a result of Tropical Storm Amanda.

In addition, DC Rotary Club member, Marilyn Nevy Cruz was able to raise \$1500 through a birthday fundraiser to provide a \$750 donation to the Rotary Club of San Salvador Noreste to buy 39 mattresses for families who lost everything as a result of Tropical Storm Amanda. \$750 was also donated to the Rotary Club of San Salvador Maquilishuat to buy 80 non-perishable food packages for 80 families from the CRUZ ROJA community in the municipality of Cuscatancingo, in San Salvador.



### IN MEMORIAM: ALLEN JONES, JR

It is with sadness and reflection that Washington Area New Automobile Dealers Association (WANADA) reports on the passing of its longtime legal counsel, supporter and friend Allen Jones, Esq. He died peacefully at his home on the Chesapeake Bay with his wife Cheryl, son Matt, and family. He was 90 years old.

Allen was counsel to WANADA for 38 years, commencing in 1979 and

continuing until 2017. He followed a long tour of legal service to WANADA from his predecessor and law partner, Lou Mann. In his work for WANADA, Allen was first affiliated with the DC firm, Wilkes and Artis, later Wilkes, Artis, Hedrick and Lane; ultimately, he was with the DC firm of Hamilton and Hamilton. Throughout his extensive service to WANADA, he worked with innumerable WANADA dealer leaders and senior staff members while interfacing regularly with NADA, AIADA, MADA and VADA, along with other dealer associations across the U.S., on a variety of legal and regulatory matters facing automotive retailers. He was also an expert in real estate and corporate law and represented several major hoteliers in Washington.



A native Washingtonian, who grew up in DC, Allen graduated from Georgetown University Law School in the 1950s after finishing a tour of service in the U.S. Army and completing his undergraduate degree at Michigan State University where he was a quarterback on the football team in one of its national championship seasons. Among professional and voluntary organizational leadership positions he held, Allen was admitted to the prestigious Barristers Club, of which he was later elected president; he was also president

of the Bar Association of the District of Columbia in 1986; and he was president of the Rotary Club of Washington, DC in the years 1998-99, and president of the Rotary Foundation of Washington, DC, 2002-03.
