M.A.D.E. is the only program in DC that meets these young women where they are emotionally and provides evidence-based programming that addresses underlying causes that disconnect girls of color from their peers and academic communities, keeping them stuck in cycles of poverty and crime. For at-risk girls of color, M.A.D.E. flips the script.	\$20,000
iFLY Youth	Camp iFLY is a five-week summer day camp that will culminate with a one-week trip abroad to Costa Rica. The proposed aim of the summer program can be narrowed down to the 3 Es: Expose, Explore, Experience. Its new curriculum, which aligns with best practices in Social-Emotional Learning and Common Core standards, will allow its iFLY Scholars to expand knowledge of self, interpersonal skills, their community, and the world.	iFLY's target audience for the camp are 6th, 7th and 8th grade girls of color from the DC Metropolitan area from underserved neighborhoods. This is despite the fact that selective institutions typically cost them less, owing to generous financial aid, than the two-year and nonselective four-year institutions to which they actually apply. The mentoring program would assign a professional mentor to each student and support them through SAT test preparation, college guidance and financial aid support and high intensity academic services.
