CARECEN currently provides immigration legal services, housing counseling (foreclosure prevention, communication with landlords regarding housing code violations), tenant association organizing, and citizenship courses that prepare candidates for the citizenship exam and was instrumental in supporting the immigrants bused to DC from Texas and Florida.	CARECEN's building, called La Escuelita (the Little School), is in need of repair. It was last refurbished in 2005. The Special Projects Grant from the Rotary Foundation would be used to update the facilities to make the schoolhouse a safer, cleaner, and more modern environment. This would include repairing the roof, remodeling the bathroom, repairing broken windows, and tuckpointing the outside mortar in order to reinforce the brick structure.	\$20,000
Christ House	Christ House is a residential medical facility for men experiencing homelessness with acute medical needs in Washington, DC.
