Grant Process District and Global

- Global grants support large international projects with long-term, sustainable outcomes in one or more of Rotary's areas of focus. They range from \$30,000 to \$400,000.
- District grants fund smaller-scale, short-term projects that address immediate needs in your community or abroad.

The lifecycle of a Rotary grant



Draft

Rotary members plan a project or scholarship and build their grant application online

Authorization

Club and district leaders review the application and authorize funding

Submitted

The grant's planners submit the application to The Rotary Foundation

Approved

If the grant is approved, the Foundation issues payment

Completion

Members carry out the project, reporting to the Foundation annually until the work or studies are finished and the grant is closed

District qualification



Three Types of Global Grants

Humanitarian project

Address community needs and produce sustainable, measurable outcomes

Water and Sanitation construction projects, medical equip, rehab structures, educational equipment, furnishings (limited), etc.

Vocational Training Teams

Build skills within a community by sending teams of professionals that will travel abroad to train or learn from host country they visit

Medical Teams (doctors, dentist, nurses)
School Teachers exchange

Scholarship Programs The easiest to write, fund & administer Fund international graduate-level study for a career within an Area of Focus



A Global Grant Is

- Large, International project, value at least \$30,000
- Must have a Partnership with an overseas club and/or district
- A Host club were the project occurs and the international (your) club
- Responds to <u>Community Needs & requires a Community Assessment</u>
- Align with one Rotary <u>Area of Focus</u>
- Longterm, Measurable, Sustainable Outcome
 - Three sources of funds: Club, DDF & World Fund 80% match of DDF
 - Timing- Flexible, multi-year, no deadline





First Consideration-Who is your Primary Contact? i.e. Grant Administrator

- responsible for all of the **communications**, contacts, administrative and financial aspects (<u>receipts</u>, <u>photos and reports</u>, <u>etc</u>) of the grant. They complete the GG application in the online Grant Center.... And, next year there will be a Progress Report due and then a final report will be due when the grant is completed.
- My Rotary Account
- Work in the Grant Center
- The person RI and the District Grant Chair contact for accuracy and completeness and to answer questions



Second Consideration-Who is your HOST club??

- UNDERSTAND the Differences!
 - Your host partner's culture. It will be different. They may be hesitant to act, slow to communicate (poor Internet), and have a convoluted banking system.
 Be patient!
- PATIENCE
- The planning and application process may take many months to coordinate & complete.
- Language barriers ???
 - TRF may challenge your project's need's assessment or training and may/or require a partner MOU.



Third Consideration-Community Needs Assessment

- Document the Need Humanitarian and VTT applications are required to formally document the need! GG Scholarships do not require a Community Assessment
 - Describes Beneficiary Community
 - Demographics
 - Who conducted assessment
 - Methods
 - Community Participants
 - The need your project addresses
 - What is their need, not our perception of need? i.e. Toxic Charity
 - Project's primary goal and how to accomplish
 - Challenges
 - Documented results are uploaded in your grant application
 - District grant funds may be used to fund an assessment site visit



Fourth Consideration-Work with the TRF Cadre?

CADRE OF TECHNICAL **ADVISERS**

Cadro members are Rotarians around the world who have professional experience and expertise in Rotary's areas of focus or financial auditing. Cadre members receive online and in-person training from Foundation staff and guidance and oversight from Rotary staff and Cadre leadership.

WHO THEY ARE

HOW THEY CAN HELP

- Advising Rotary members who are planning or working on Rotary Foundation grant projects, especially on topics like community assessments, sustainability, and financial management.
- Establishing monitoring and evaluation plans that safeguard Foundation funds. reviewing global grant applications, and evaluating projects on behalf of The Rotary Foundation Board of Trustees.



Rotary Areas of Focus Your grant must meet Rotary Area of Focus criteria

- The area of focus guidelines (for each area) explain the types of projects and their goals, list the kinds of projects that are commonly funded, and specify what activities are eligible for global grant support.
- Read more about each one in the <u>AREA OF FOCUS POLICY STATEMENTS</u> to ensure that your grant fits within one of the areas of focus and meets all of those Requirements.
 - Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution
 - Disease Prevention and Treatment
 - Water and Sanitation

GLOBAL GRANT SCHOLARSHIPS

Must be Graduate level

Area of Study aligns with 1 of 7 Rotary Areas of Focus Study periods of 1-4 years

Selected area of focus <u>"strongly"</u> relates to:

- 1. Previous work, volunteer, and study experience
- 2. Selected Academic program
- 3. Future career plans (immediate and long-range)

Host and international sponsor clubs \$30,000 minimum budget





Understanding Your Funding

- Three sources of funds:
 - Donor cash from clubs and individuals
 - District 7670 District Designated Funds (DDF)
 - Rotary Foundation World Fund "matching funds"
- How it works: World Fund will match DDF \$1 with \$0.80

Your club wants to do a \$32,000 grant and another club has offered \$2,500 to support the grant. The District has given you \$14,000 DDF to support the Grant. How much more club money do you need to Fund this grant?

Example

Club Cash \$ 8,000 W.F. Match is calculated

7670 DDF $$15,000 = $15,000 \times 0.80

W.F. Match \$ 12,000

Total \$ 35,000

District DDF = 14,000 World Fund match = 11,200

Other Club Cash = 2,500 Subtotal = 27,700

Your club cash is 32,000 - 27,700 = 4,300



Note: TRF will charge a 5% fee on all of your cash donations if sent and held at The Rotary Foundation
