Club Invoice Mailing

All club invoices are due and payable upon receipt, and the amount due is not adjustable. Rotary International emails a copy of the invoice to every club office in January and July. To ensure that emails from Rotary are not rejected or filtered as spam, add ri.clubfinance@rotary.org to your approved email contacts.

If your club has not opted out of the paper invoice or updated your officers email addresses, you will receive a paper copy by post in late January and late July. If your club has not received an invoice by the beginning of February or August, email data@rotary.org to request a replacement. Include your club name and number and delivery address or fax number. Club dues still must be paid even if you have not received the invoice.

DISTRICT GOVERNOR OFFICIAL VISIT GUIDELINES

Once a year the District Governor makes an official visit to each club in the District.
The schedule is also posted in dacdb.com

The purpose of the visit:

- To allow the District Governor to communicate with the club members
- To be a useful counselor to further the Object of Rotary among the clubs in the District and to assist those clubs that may need some guidance
 - To motivate Rotarians to participate in service activities to strengthen the programs of Rotary.
- Bring attention to important Rotary issues as they pertain to both the RI and District levels
- Recognize the contributions of Rotarians in the club.

Process:

1. You will receive a reminder email from DG Tammy two weeks in advance of the District Governor's visit to resolve any questions as to information, format of the visit and special requirements.
2. The District Governor is a guest of your club when making an official visit. Communication is of the utmost importance, especially if you would like DG Tammy to attend your special events, etc.
3. During the official visit, it would be most helpful if your club could schedule any board meetings just prior to or after the club meeting so DG Tammy can attend.
4. If possible the AG for that club will introduce DG Tammy at the meeting. If the AG is unable to attend, the club president will do the introduction.
5. The District Governor's presentation is the program for the club and it is not appropriate to schedule any other program that day.
6. The District Governor and spouse are guests of your club for the Rotary meeting.
7. Home stays with Rotarians are desirable but the Governor has a lodging budget from Rotary International when a home stay is not convenient. Clubs are not expected to be responsible for lodging.
8. Encourage members to plan arriving early for the meeting or staying late in order to visit with the District Governor.
9. Presentations to new Paul Harris Fellows, induction of new members and other honors are especially appropriate during the District Governor's visit and the District Governor should be asked to participate in such events.
10. It is not appropriate to fine the Governor or AG, nor charge the Governor and spouse or the AG for meals.
11. The club president and club board should fully comprehend that the District Governor is not there to tell a club how it should be run, but share ideas about growing and strengthening Rotary.

Gifts: Personal gifts are discouraged. Instead it is the Governor's wish that the club use club funds toward one of their projects, or make a contribution to PolioPlus or The Rotary

Foundation on behalf of the Governor's visit.

RED SAND PROJECT

1. There are 40.3 Million victims of human trafficking globally.
2. 81% of them are trapped in forced labor
3. 25% of them are children
4. 75% are women and girls

Because of these alarming statistics I would like to ask that each club participate in the Red Sand Project.

Molly Gochman first launched Red Sand Project in 2014, after realizing the depths to which slavery continues to be a contemporary reality. Globally, an estimated 40.3 million individuals live in slavery, whether in forced marriages, forced labor, or for sexual exploitation. Molly recognized that to begin finding a solution to such a widespread challenge, increased public awareness and engagement would be essential. She initiated the first Red Sand Project action in Miami, where she filled the cracks of sidewalks in and around the Art Basel Miami Beach pavilion with red sand. The approach was symbolic, with the grains of sand representing those individuals who fall through the cracks—whether the cracks of our social, economic, and political systems or those of our personal consciousness.

Today, Red Sand Projects actions have been done in all 50 states and in 70 countries with more than one million participants.

Basically, your club will order the red sand. It is free, but they do require you to pay the shipping.

Once you have the sand, you will gather in groups of at least 15 people in a public place such as a sidewalk. (This would be a great time to invite non Rotarians to your event) Each participant will take a small cup of red sand and fill in the cracks as someone discusses the ways people are vulnerable to exploitation.
