Rotary hosts meet and greet reception

Candidates for mayor and city council in Belmont made their pitches to a full house of voters when Belmont Rotary Club hosted a meet-the-candidates event at TechWorks Gaston on Thursday, Sept. 28.

Four candidates are running for mayor following the recent resignation for health reasons of long-time mayor Charlie Martin. The winner will serve the remaining two years of Martin's term. All of the mayoral candidates participated in the Rotary Club event, including Martha Stowe, Rick Jordan, Richard Turner and Amanda Wall. Stowe and Turner currently serve on the Belmont City Council.

Eight candidates are seeking three seats on the Belmont City Council, and seven participated in the Rotary event. They are: George (Buck) Altice, Peg Argent, Jim Hefferan, Cynthia Hegler, Charlie Hill, Cory Miller and Jason P. Rumfelt. Council candidate Barry Flynn did not attend. Jim Hefferan and Jason Rumfelt currently serve on the council. Rumfelt was appointed in July to fill the unexpired term of Marc Seelinger, who was named interim mayor after Charlie Martin's resignation.

The candidate meet and greet opened with a reception during which voters had an opportunity to talk individually with candidates. The second segment of the program featured three-minute presentations by each candidate, and the evening concluded with more time for voters to engage with candidates asking follow-up questions or making comments.

Belmont Rotary Club President Thomas Hunter III was host for the event and introduced the candidates. Voters will have another opportunity
