## First joint district conference to bring hundreds of Rotarians to area

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More than 400 Rotarians and guests representing 102 Rotary clubs in 29 central North Carolina counties will assemble in Charlotte this week to forge friendships, exchange ideas, celebrate accomplishments and learn new ways to serve in their communities, across the nation and around the world.

The first joint conference of Rotary Districts 7680 and 7690 is set for May 5-7, at Le Meridien Charlotte hotel. District 7680, with 53 clubs in 14 counties, extends the width of the state from Mecklenburg County north to the Virginia border. District 7690 encompasses 49 clubs in 15 counties, including Guilford and Forsyth.

Five Gaston County Rotary clubs will be represented at the conference, including: Gastonia, Gastonia East, Gastonia Evening, Belmont and Mount Holly.

Rotary is an international service organization with 1.4 million members in more than 200 countries. It was founded in Chicago in 1905 when Paul Harris invited two community leader friends to begin meeting with him regularly to discuss local needs and how to meet them. The number of clubs grew rapidly, and "Service Above Self" soon became the Rotary motto.

"Service will be a priority topic during the Charlotte conference," said District 7680 Governor Kam Chandan, a member of the Rotary Club of Lake Norman-Huntersville. Rotarians will volunteer to work on a variety of local service projects during their three days in Charlotte.

"As Rotarians, we are called to serve others by promoting peace, fighting disease, providing clean water, sanita-



tion, and hygiene, saving mothers and children, supporting education, growing local economies, and protecting the environment," Chandan said.
