

Who proclaimed it and when did the US officially start American Heart Month? Leading cause of death in US for men, women, and people of most racial/ethnic groups


One person dies every 34 seconds in US from cardiovascular disease

About 697,000 people in US died from heart disease in 2020—that's 1 in every 5 deaths

Heart disease cost US about \$229 billion each year

Coronary heart disease is the most common type of heart disease, killing 382,820 people in 2020

In 2020, about 2 in 10 deaths from CAD happen in adults less than 65 years old




Heart Disease in the United States

Congenital Heart Defects (CHD) in the United States

Birth defects are common Every 4^{1/2} minutes, a baby is born with a birth defect in the United States.

Birth defects affect 1 33 babies born in the United States each year. That translates into about 120,000 babies.



- Most common type of structural birth defect.
- CHDs are the leading cause of birth defect related infant death during the first year of life.
- Hospital costs to care for children with CHDs exceeded \$6 billion (2013 data).
- About 1.4 million adults and 1.0 million children in US are living with CHDs.
- More than 1 in 6 CHD survivors have physical, educational, or occupational limitations.

The HEARTest Yard was created as a program within **Receptions for Research: The Greg Olsen Foundation** to support enhanced treatment and resources for pediatric patients with congenital heart disease and provide them with comprehensive cardiac care to help reach their fullest potential.





- Provides families of babies affected by CHD with services including in-home, private nursing care, physical therapy and speech therapy among other benefits.
- Services **are provided at no charge** to the family or the hospital.
- Goal: improve the interstage mortality rate and increase life expectancy and long-term prognosis for children born with CHD.



- Family access to a neuropsychologist, educational specialists, mental health professionals, dieticians and other innovative patient therapies all in one location.






WHERE DO WE SERVE?

Why Neurodevelopment?

Cassidy et al, *J Int Neuropsych Society* 2015 Bellinger et al., 2011 Shillingford et al. 2008

- 80% of children with complex CHD are impaired in at least 1 measure of executive function (memory, flexibility, inhibition)
- 1 in 5 repeat a grade at least once
- 1 in 4 receive occupational, physical, speech therapy, and/or psychotherapy
- Estimated 25% of patients with complex CHD struggle with attention difficulties
- Anxiety
- Depression



Simple actions we can all take to make a difference:

- 1. Live a heart healthy life!
- 2. Annual wellness checks
- 3. Be CPR certified
- 4. Get PulsePoint app—sends alerts to CPR trained individuals
- 5. Ensure business/org has AED on site
- 6. Donate blood
- 7. Check the "organ donor" box at the DMV



Challenge to Conquer Allograft Vasculopathy (CAV)



WHY ARE WE DOING THIS?

As you may know, Sophia had her first heart transplant at 5 months old. This was an incredible gift, and she was "doing well" for 11+ years with her donor heart. Then, at her annual cardiac cathetarization and heart biopsy procedure on April 11¹⁰, 2022, cur family was shocked to learn she was experiencing a severe form of organ rejection called Cardiac Allograph Vasculopathy, or CAV. She was hospitalized immediately due to the severity of her rejection. She needed another heart transplant for a chance at survival as there are no other reasonable interventions to fix her transplant.






Spectrum News 12-yearold persevering after two heart transplants
