hyped the moment. \$ 2,269, only 18 cards left, and a lot of tickets sold had everyone eager for the draw. Joel Gentry had the privilege but was a card away from winning, but he smiled all the way back to his table.

Jessica McKnight introduced our speaker Mike Gatton of the Piedmont Fellows. Mike started off telling of the story of James Cash Penney and how his one store evolved to over 1,600 based upon his policy of following the golden rule and treating people like they would want to be treated themselves. That story evolved into the one about the founding of Rotary's Four Way Test of the things we think, say, or do. He ran his 'test' by some of his friends and business associates who were from a variety of religious backgrounds and the creator's test was embraced favorably by all of them and their religious denominations. So how do we shape people into a culture that lives out their values? And how do we shape that values in the first place? Mike thought one answer might be that he could put other's needs before his own by recruiting, training and retraining college grads in our community. That would include mentoring, providing executive training, and being a part of a loving, caring community. His business IS business! He finds entry level positions in companies willing to allow the fellows to work Monday through Thursday for \$ 18.50 an hour for 9 months. On Fridays, they have programs on faith or vocation speakers. Last year, five fellows were in the program and all were offered full time jobs after the end of the 9 month program. Charlotte, Winston-Salem, Raleigh and Greensboro have all had success with this kind of program. They are landing millennials and 'Gen-Zers The businesses are usually mid sized to smaller ones, but all are welcome. Many big companies often have their own similar program. Mike combs the universities and

colleges in the region to find potential fellows, whether a recent college grad or already a young professional. He sited the success in Knoxville where 139 grads in their program resulted in 92 having stayed in Knoxville. Imagine what that would do in our community. But Mike needs business partners to provide jobs and will soon be hosting a Fellows Dinner in February to get fellows and job providers together. 



Bruce Boguski

Bruce Boguski, author, motivational speaker, columnist, and media personality is well known for his ability to inspire others to "do the impossible". Bruce holds a B.S. degree in business and education from Bowling Green State University. He

also possesses a Level Two Certification in Brain Based Learning Strategies.

Bruce is President of The Winner's Edge, a peak performance consulting firm in Findlay, Ohio. He is a nationally known presenter on motivational tactics and mental toughness training for schools, sports and business professionals, using high-energy, interactive techniques to inspire and delight his audiences.

Bruce knows firsthand the attitude and skills required to overcome physical and mental challenges. At age 18, Bruce was partially paralyzed in an automobile accident. Although doctors warned that he might never walk again, he left the hospital a few months later under his own power. After a two-year struggle to regain full use of his body, Bruce went on to become a two-time state champion in racquetball and played on a state championship softball team. He later served as head baseball coach and assistant football coach at Van Buren High School and the men's and women's tennis coach at The University of Findlay.

Bruce speaks to educators, parents, students, athletes, and business professionals and has conducted over 2200 presentations over the past 27 years. Bruce has addressed virtually every group imaginable at dinner meetings, school assemblies, conferences, seminars, and clinics.

A former personal and career counselor and a professional with a significant disability – Donna Mack has more than 30 years' experience educating about and advocating for the abilities and rights of the Disability Community. This unique combination of expertise served as the catalyst for the formation of her

speaking and consulting business, Disability Diplomat.

Donna hails from the Dallas-Fort Worth area and holds a master's in education.

Faced with vision loss at the age of 12 due to a retinal detachment, she learned quickly that the same old approach doesn't cut it when life throws you a major curve. As the world fades before her, she is confronted by the reality that some previously familiar people are now uncomfortable around her due to their own hyperawareness of her disability. The desire to bridge that gap and create an atmosphere of understanding that allows people to be viewed for who they are, rather than for the limitations of their bodies, became her driving force.

The proud parent of two caring and successful young adults, Donna is a lover of God, people, laughter, parties and dark chocolate. She considers long walks and snuggles with black lab, Wella, among her most sacred investments of quiet time.
