This is Rotary, In the beginning...

- The first Rotary Club was founded in Chicago on February 23, 1905, by Paul P. Harris. The club, with four members, met in rotation at the offices of the members - thus the name Rotary.
- 16 Clubs formed the National Organization in 1910.

## Rotary's Motto: Service Above Self

- Rotary soon recognized that fellowship alone would not keep a group together — there needed to be a purpose.
- Rotary became the world's first “service club.”
- First project was a “comfort station” (public restroom) in downtown Chicago. It was made possible by a \$26.50 donation by Rotarians from Kansas City, MO, which was the money left in their club account at the end of the Rotary Year in 1917.

## Object of Rotary

- The object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the “ideal of service” as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:
- First
  - The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;
- Second
  - Set high ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the

dignifying by each Rotarian of his or her occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

- Third
  - The application of the “ideal of service” by every Rotarian to his or her personal, business and community life;
- Fourth
  - The advancement of international understanding, good will, and peace through a world of fellowship of business and professional people united in the “ideal of service.”

### Five Avenues of Service

- Club Service
  - focuses on making clubs strong. A thriving club is

anchored by strong relationships and an active membership development plan.

- Vocational Service
  - calls on every Rotarian to work with integrity and contribute their expertise to the problems and needs of society.
- Community Service
  - encourages every Rotarian to find ways to improve the quality of life for people in their communities and to serve the public interest.
- International Service

- exemplifies our global reach in promoting peace and understanding. We support this service avenue by sponsoring or volunteering on international projects, seeking partners abroad, and more.
- New Generation Service
  - recognizes the importance of empowering youth and young professionals through leadership development programs such as Rotaract, Interact, Rotary Youth

## Your Obligations in Rotary

### *Participation*

- To be a Rotarian you must give of your time and talents:
  - in community work
  - in social functions
  - in Club and District activities.

## *Attendance*

- Attendance at the weekly meetings is a benefit of Rotary. A minimum of 65% is expected.
- You can maintain your attendance levels by making up at another Rotary Club within 14 days in advance or 14 days after a meeting is missed; make up online; participate in a club sponsored event; or by attending a District event or a RI Convention.

## *Financial*

### **New Member / Initiation Fee**

- \$100 = paid upon joining
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### **Active Member Quarterly Dues = \$220.00**

- \$180.00 = Dues
- \$15.00 = Scholarship Fund
- \$25.00 = Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member Fund (many give \$100 or more/quarter)
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### **Senior Active (R-85) Member Annual Dues = \$310.00**

- \$150.00 = Dues
- \$60.00 = Scholarship Fund
- \$100.00 = Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member Fund
