Our motto, Service Above Self, exemplifies the humanitarian spirit of the Rotarians worldwide. Service efforts are directed toward our areas of focus: Peace and conflict prevention/ resolution, Disease prevention and treatment, Water and sanitation, Maternal and child health, Basic education and literacy, Environment, and Economic and community development.

Jeremie Kubicek spoke about improving our Peace Index. The Peace Index focuses on five areas – purpose, people, place, personal health, and provision – with one serving as the driver for the rest. If we are deficient in one area, it can affect our sense of peace dramatically. Leaders use this index as a tool to identify areas of improvement, focus on things they can control, and promote positive change personally and professionally.

Erica Keswin focused on rituals as being a key to cultivating human intelligence because they help us find the sweet spot between technology and authentic connection.

Dr. Henry Cloud addressed the 5 essentials of Trust: Understanding, Motive and intent, Ability, Character, and Track record.

Treasurer's Report

This financial summary is of June 30, 2023 and is not meant to be a detailed financial report.

Mary Ellen Good served as Treasurer, the second year of a three-year term.

Administration Account:

SBI continued to meet weekly at Tamer's Restaurant (Ocean Ridge Plantation). With the increase in the cost of breakfast food, Tamer's management increased the cost of breakfast/meeting space to \$11.25 per week. As a result, the cost of attending a meeting was increased from \$5 per week to \$9 per week. 2022-2023 dues remained at \$270 per year which, per SBI by-laws, allowed for \$3 per week in breakfast/meeting charge.

As a result of the breakfast increase, SBI's invoicing structure changed, allowing members the option to be invoiced for and "prepay" the \$9 breakfast charge. Members were given the option to be billed annually or quarterly for dues only, or annually or quarterly with breakfast cost included. 13 members chose the "prepay" option.

As of this date, the Administration Income is \$39,604 YTD. Included in this amount is \$1,321 in Happy Dollars and \$300 in initiation fees.

Administration Expense is \$32,585.

SBI Treasurer and Administrative Committee Chair meet periodically during the year to reconcile Administrative Expenses.

Club Fundraising Account:

The Club Fundraising Account continues to serve primarily as the 100 Club account. Two cycles of the 100 Club Raffle are held each year. 100 numbers, \$25 per number, are offered for purchase with a total income of \$2500 per cycle. Weekly winners of \$25 and 4 \$250 winners (\$1500) are drawn during the cycle. \$1000 from each cycle is used to provide scholarships to West Brunswick High School Seniors.



















Our most precious projects are those that help save lives and support people who have been injured and in need of blood. In the 3 Red Cross Blood Drives sponsored by our Club, more than 150 pints of blood were collected which saved up to 450 individuals that are suffering with catastrophic illnesses. What greater gift can any person give?

The Service Committee purchased two logoed park benches for the Calabash Town Park. These benches promote outdoor activity as well as highlight Rotary's presence in the community.

We also started a monthly 'Game Day' at the Boys and Girl's Home. Our objective as Rotarians is to engage the residents in a fun afternoon of game playing and making new friends. It's a great time for all to embrace the fellowship this time gives to both the kids and those of us who spend time with them.







SBI Rotary Foundation:

The SBIRF Account (501c3) serves as the Fundraising and Charitable Giving account for the Club. Accounting for SBIRF is based on a calendar year, however the reporting below is based on the SBI fiscal year of July 1, 2022 – June 30, 2023. Two annual fundraisers are held each year. The 2022 SBI 3 Bridge Bike Tour, held in November, provided \$12,916 toward Charitable Giving, and the May, 2022 Golf Tournament provided \$17,667 toward Charitable Giving. Both of these numbers reflect 90% of the net proceeds, with 10% of net proceeds designated as income to the SBIRF Permanent Fund (savings account). In addition, through the excellent work of the Service Committee, \$7,955 was awarded to SBIRF in District Grants toward Charitable Giving. In all, \$48,450 was distributed to organizations through the SBIRF Foundation.

The SBIRF Permanent Fund (Savings Account): With the increase in CD rates, the SBIRF BOD approved purchasing a 13-month, \$25000 CD through United Bank. The balance of \$5,688 in the SBIRF savings account, includes the 10% golf proceeds transfer from the May, 2023, golf tournament.

The South Brunswick Islands Rotary Club and the South Brunswick Islands Rotary Foundation, both ended the 2022-2023 Rotary year in a healthy financial condition.

Administrative and Club Service leadership, as well as the SBIRF BOD continue to work together with the Treasurer to ensure that Club and SBIRF remain in a healthy financial position.

Administrative Committee Report

The Administrative Committee consists of three areas: fundraising, materials and supplies, and social activities. While the fundraisers are "all hands-on deck" events, many SBI Rotarians worked diligently on the other tasks. We are so very appreciative of all Rotarian efforts within the Administrative Committee areas.

Fundraising

South Brunswick Islands Rotary has two fundraising events. SBIR is proud to announce the monies collected are used in only three areas. Firstly, the events pay only direct event expenses. After 10% of the net proceeds are allocated to the SBIR Club Foundation permanent fund, the proceeds are used exclusively by the Service Committee projects. The Fore Kids Golf Tournament generates income specifically benefiting the children of Brunswick County. The Three Bridge Tour generates income for the remaining local and international Service Committee projects. With the Rotarians' hard work and the sponsors' generosity, we can support the Service Committee which is where the "rubber meets the road".

Supplies and Materials

Thankfully, the club has Rotarian Ken Dresser's audio-visual expertise to call upon and Kim Barnarr and Michael Jacobs have volunteered to assist. Ken handles the audio/visual when a zoom meeting is required. Ken fortunately has robust equipment to handle the zoom requirements. Our normal meetings utilize the simpler stand-alone audio equipment and a new battery operated projector. Since the new projector is battery operated, it unfortunately is not as bright as a wired projector, but it was within a reasonable budget for the club. The Supplies and Materials committee appreciates the club's patience with the video equipment.

Social Events

Without a firm committee, several Rotarians (Jennifer Vanasse, Glenn Humbert, Toni Titone, and others) have stepped up to the plate and organized several non-meeting social gatherings. While most of the social gatherings have been at Makai Brewery, and Calabash Photography Art and Curios for beer and wine "sampling" with food truck and potluck nourishment, the club is exploring ideas for family friendly picnics and activities.

Through the fundraising efforts of our Club, \$34,400 went directly to programs that supported the children of Brunswick County. Our project spending highlights include:

Scholarships to high school (3 x \$2,000) and 1 college (\$1,000) student.

Support and participation of Special Olympic Athletes (Spring & Summer Games).

Dictionary and Summer Book Program for 3rd graders.

Union School Field Trip, support in bus expenses.

STARS - \$1,400

Youth Services (Leader Cast)

Brunswick Family Assistance summer food and drinks distribution for the 'At Home Children's Lunch' program.

Girl Scout cookie drive, and Boy Scouts annual donation.

Girl's & Boy's Home partner funding.

Joe Gore Scholarship \$2,500.

On an international level over \$7,100 was spent on projects to support youth throughout the world. These include:

Rotary Polio fund contribution.

Contributed to the XETONOX Rotary water global grant.

RISE Against Hunger program assembling 10,000 meals with the help of 75 Rotarians and community members. These meals are shipped to help feed children in various international locations.

Bethel USA Blind Schools - \$500 (Members of the club raised an additional \$3,500 for this effort).





Service Committee Report





2022/2023 was again a remarkable year for the Service Committee and the South Brunswick Rotary Club. The committee approved and completed 35 projects meeting its goals of supporting the education and development of the children of Brunswick County. In 2023 we increased our support with Special Olympics, Future Farmers of America and Oliver's Entourage. We also added programs with the local elementaries schools supporting their field trips and several book distributions. One new program is our "Signed Speaker Book Program" in which each speaker that presents at our club meeting is given a book to sign with the Rotary Insignia. These books are then donated to local school libraries.

We are so fortunate as a Club to have an amazing group of individuals on our Service Committee that truly put 'Service before Self'. Whether they are needed to pack duffle bags for children moving into community facilities or work with a multitude of representatives while assembling grain packs that will ship all over the world to the hungry, they always show up.

All 11 planned District Grants for our community were accepted. The following is a list of grants completed:

Membership Committee Report

Currently, our club has 43 active members, 6 members that are Rule 85 and 1 Honorary Member for a total of 50 members. Obtaining new members has been a challenge in our current economic environment and it will require all members of the club to actively be involved in recruiting new members. We have been fortunate to have had a number of excellent Rotarians transfer into our club from other districts.

Our District 7730 has faced the same membership challenges and has lost around 230 members over the past few years. They started the 2022-2023 Rotary year with 1,629 members and added 199 members but will finish the year with about 1,630 members. So, no real net growth. Our club has taken every opportunity to let our event attendees know about our club and its welcoming attitude.

The membership committee has also turned their focus to keeping our current members connected by scheduling a number of casual social get-togethers at local pubs and restaurants. We have had some success recruiting at these events as well.

The committee also plans to reach out to the Newcomers club to see if we can generate some new potential connections. Greg Rupp has again offered to host a recruitment dinner for potential new members in a relaxed setting to meet some Rotarians and learn about Rotary when he returns in the fall.

We have work to do and ask that all members bring a potential member to a meeting at least 2 times per year.
