

PROGRAM LAST WEEK by Mallory Holley



Dr. Tim Hardee, the President of South Carolina Technical College System, spoke to the club on Monday, September 16th. The SC Technical College System is working to impact the quality of life of South Carolina residents and positively impact economic development throughout the state. In order to reach those goals, the system is focusing on making sure the technical colleges are affordable, accessible and relevant. 52 percent of higher education takes place at technical schools and the system wants to make sure that the students coming out of the technical system have less student loan debt than the national and state average. Annual tuition at a technical system school is 34 percent less than that of a state four year institution. Accessibility is also important to the technical college system. The 16 technical schools are spread out across the state and they all work to educate the public on what degrees are available and what jobs are available once you receive a certification or degree from a technical school. 95 percent of enrollees are South Carolina residents with 61 percent being female and 43 percent minority. The system is also helping youth access technical college

programs. Partnerships have been created with business owners to allow high school juniors and seniors the opportunity to earn a wage while they learn new skills and enhance their employability.

One of the biggest impacts of the technical college system is that they offer programs that meet the economic development needs of our community. As businesses move to our area, the number of skilled workers increases and the technical system wants to educate, train and prepare South Carolina residents for the new jobs. To meet these needs, the system offers credit programs, ReadySC, continuing education, Apprenticeship Carolina and SC Wins Scholarships. Over 110,000 South Carolina residents are enrolled in credit programs and those credit programs are offered based on the demand for specific skilled workers.

The SC Wins Scholarship is a program that hits on all three areas of focus. SC Wins stands for South Carolina Workforce and Industrial Needs Scholarship and it is a scholarship program to address workforce shortages and to supplement lottery tuition assistance. Eligibility requirements include qualifying for lottery tuition assistance and majoring in one of the following fields of study – Healthcare, Information Services, Advanced Manufacturing, Hospitality/Tourism, Constructions or Transportation/Distribution/Logistics.

In conclusion, Dr. Hardee re-emphasized the mission of the technical schools to prepare students for high-demand, high-wage jobs and commended Aiken Technical College and Dr. Mahan for the work they do in our community.
