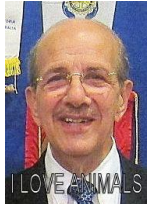

Birder Caryl Lucchesi is taking courses in astronomy to study birds on other planets. John is thrilled.



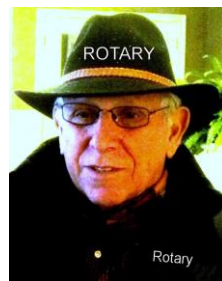
