With the help of her successful businessman husband, she purchased the cavernous building the program now occupies, and proceeded to develop Workspace. passions, get new skills, do enormous projects, contribute meaningfully to the world, and create for themselves the best life, ever. Does it do all of this? Our tour of the facility indicated that it probably has the potential. This is a summer and after school program and is still not at the break- even level. Ms.
