Tary's Rotary Minute:



On August 25, 1982 our speaker was our Spoke Editor, Ralph Welsh who spoke on the 1982 Dallas RI Convention. More importantly, his father, Wayne Welsh, from Salt Lake City, was in the audience. Ralph had an interesting slide presentation, including photos of Larry Hagman being driven around the Cotton Bowl arena, and the Dallas

Cowboy cheerleaders passing out lunch to the crowd. It was one of the perks of being club president.

Editor's Note: Born in Utah, the son of a barber and a mother who sold flowers and vegetables in the neighborhood from a grocery cart grown on a strip of state land to finance her trip to Hawaii, my father was a remarkable man. He was so mechanically inclined, he installed an auto engine hoist in the garage, had a working windmill in the back yard, and had a workshop so neat and tidy it rivaled the

pristine engine room on our own Nels DeAlmeida's yacht. If he painted your house, all of the surfaces looked like fine furniture. A railroad engineer, paper hanger and housepainter all of his life, he claimed he could build a steam locomotive from scratch if he had the spare parts.

On a trip to the Durango and Silverton Railroad in Colorado after retirement, he walked around the steam engine, and had the engineer record all of the steam leaks and lubrication problems he found on the train. He climbed off a steamer, once, after going across the Colorado desert, and said it felt cool at 120 degrees in the shade. On one harrowing trip, he calmly brought a 150 car train loaded with steel, but without brakes, into the busiest rail hub in the west guiding the men on the ground which switches to pull so he could bring the train to a halt up a clear lead. He loved all types of hats, and wore a baseball cap throughout a formal ceremony when my daughter, Regan, received her MD from NY Med, in Carnegie Hall. He was a proud past president of his union and the Golden Agers Kiwanis Club, and took pride in the fact that all 6 of us graduated from college though he didn't. In later years while on oxygen, we unfortunately had to take his electric scooter away from him

after he took it across a busy 6 lane highway to get a haircut at 90. I followed in his footsteps to a degree, working as a housepainter for my uncle Arlo Fairbanks who later became president of the national painters and decorators association, as a fireman for the D&RGW railroad during college (Dad's railroad) and one summer as a trackman for the White Pass and Yukon RR, in Skagway, Alaska.

Did any of you have a unique parent that helped shape your life? Let me know, and I will showcase them in the Spoke.
