Others are just odd, such as: "Mary passed away on March 23, 2018 in

Others state the obvious, including this one: "Ron passed away on May, 27, 2018, as a consequence of having lived to the age of 97." Others are brutally honest. This obit states:" She spent her childhood in the community raising hell with her beloved brother and partner in crime and to say she was unique is quite an understatement. As one of the first female truck drivers in our state, she proudly embraced the moniker her fellow drivers bestowed upon her - "Wacky." As above, four letter words were occasionally used for emphasis, such as an obit that describes the departed as: "...the best damn cook you could ask for." But still my favorite appeared in the News-Times a number of years ago, clearly a typo, indicating that the deceased was buried with "Full military horrors."
