Rick Lawrence Showed us the Remarkable Work Rotary is Doing to Save Countless lives in Guatemala, through Clean Water, Non-polluting stoves, and Clean Sanitation Facilities:



Not only is **Rick Lawrence** a member of another District, he now lives in Rhode Island, and drove more than 2 hours, one way, to address the club. But the message was an important and impressive one.

The work Rotary District 7890 is doing to save lives in Guatemala is nothing short of remarkable. A Rotarian with 41 years in Rotary, Rick and his wife, Ellen have made a special commitment to the people of Guatemala and the tears of joy and gratitude

coming from the people has spurned everyone to keep on going.

So far, since 2006, various Rotary Clubs along with our Foundation have contributed \$792,718 to assist in clean water projects in Guatemala. A total of 1,556 families and over 9,000 people have been

served. At present, the project is working with three communities, where it often takes 2 hours one way, and two hours back carrying heavy clay pots laden with water from unclean rivers and streams. Currently, \$112,500 has been raised (half of that matching funds from the Foundation) but more is needed. Currently clubs from 8 Districts are involved.

One can't dismiss the importance of clean water. Thirty thousand people die of water related illnesses every day, 90% of whom are children under 5. There is nothing more important to a community than clean water.

Carl Bailey also spoke. Their burn center in Nicaragua is seriously underfunded and needs help. That's, of course, what we do. We're Rotarians.


