From the Editor's Desk:



The Beginning of our Airforce, 110 years ago: A Young Man from CT Was Key to it All:

On July 30, 1909, at Ft. Meyer, Virginia, Orville Wright and a first lieutenant from the Aeronautical Division, Benjamin Foulois, took a Wright Model A airplane for a speed test on its final qualifying flight. It successfully flew south for a 10 mile round trip. The craft reached an altitude of 400 feet and averaged 42.5 miles per hour. This was a daring experience for Foulois, who had followed the flight of another Wright plane that crashed in September of 1908 killing Lt. Thomas E. Selfridge and severely injuring Orville Wright. Three days later, the plane belonged to the U.S. Army. Soon, the flying program moved to a field in College Park, MD, and it resumed in Oct. 1909, with the Wright Brothers training more men on how to fly. On, Oct. 26, 2nd Lt. Fred Humphreys became the first Army officer to solo.

Born in Washington, CT, Foulois had a colorful career, ultimately rising to Brigadier General, offending nearly everyone in Washington, DC while pushing everyone to develop airpower. He finally persuaded a reluctant Congress to pass a \$640 million bill for airpower, which was the largest appropriation ever passed by Congress at that time. His tenacity in pushing the use of airplanes in combat has resulted in his being recognized as the true father of U.S. Airpower.

Gen. Foulois died on April 25, 1967, was buried in his hometown of Washington, CT, and received a final honor—a flyover of USAF jets in the missing man formation.




