A Session:

This is the second time Rep. Harding has addressed our club over the years. He was elected to District 107 which involves Bethel, Brookfield, and a sliver of Danbury (the area will be redistricted after the Census by a committee from both parties).

He believes that Government is not doing that bad, and along with his

Republican colleagues apposed both an increase in the payroll tax and an increase toll initiative, believing that Connecticut did not needs these taxes. The Governor is still mulling over 14 tolls including one before Exit 11 on I-84. Harding has a 78% rating in the business community (CBIA).

He emphasized the importance of small business, and the importance of good financial planning. He admitted that Connecticut was one of the highest taxed community in the country, agreed that state spending was just too high, but



claims that the spending problem *Mark Havira asks a question* goes all the way back to the Roland administration. Roland's 10 year union contract sent the state toward fiscal trouble.

Still, there is some daylight on the horizon. The state has been able to put 2 billion into a rainy day fund, and there is improvement with the state deficit, largely helped by the stock market. He also sees improvements in the overall fiscal situation by not continually filling positions following attrition, and cutting government waste. He also suggested that some of the agencies might well be administratively top heavy.

All in all, Rep. Harding believes that the State Government is doing fairly well, and he hopes to continue to work with the other party.


