



Did you know that Mark Twain died in Redding, CT, on 4/21/10? He was fond of saying, "I came in with Halley's comet, and I expect to go out with Halley's comet"—and that he did. Although born

in 1835, our next door neighbor, the late Ziggy Anderson, used to bring him groceries to his second home *Stormfield*, in Redding, CT. Ziggy frequently arrived to discover Twain having lunch with a famous person, or two, and Thomas Edison even made a movie of Twain's time at *Stormfield*.

Twain once told the N.Y. Times, "Stormfield is the most out of the world and peaceful and tranquil and in every way satisfactory home I have experience of in my life." Tragically, it burned to the ground in 1923, but much of his library is still housed at the Mark Twain Library, in Redding---with his own personal comments written in the margins.
