UNICEF has estimated that 1,800 children, worldwide, die every day of diseases related to unclean water. Providing a village with clean water is a virtual life saving act.

Rotary has made clean water a priority internationally, and we were fortunate to hear from two dedicated Milford attorneys, Jane Holler and her husband, Dan Marecki, who recognized a pressing need in Uganda, and established Uganda Farmers, Inc to assist the poor rural farmers of Uganda. One primary goal of theirs was to provide several communities with precious clean water.

When Make-A-Wish provided 17 year old cancer survivor Danielle Burns of Toland a chance to meet Taylor Swift and Michele Obama, she chose to raise money to bring clean water to two schools in Africa—and to fulfill her wish she was flown to Uganda to present her gifts in person. Nothing could be better than that.

Jane and Dan were brought to us by Rotarian Don Thomas of the West Haven club.

Next week, on June 10th we'll have a Power-point presentation by Dr. Judy Toski Welsh. Judy is the Medical Director of the Lakewood Hospital E.R., a part of the Cleveland Clinic, who went with a group of her colleagues from the clinic to NYC to help out during the worst time of the COVID-19 crisis. Again we had a Virtual Luncheon. Our Speakers, Jane Holler and Dan Marecki, Told their Remarkable Story of How they Brought Clean Water to the Children of Uganda:

Having visited Uganda, and watching children



drinking water out of a polluted stream filled with cattle, Jane Holler was moved, in 1907, to create Uganda Farmers Inc. This NGO has now drilled 13 deep water wells, and is

working on several more. The initial bore hole costs

\$8,500, but the final cost with pumps, piping and storage facilities generally runs about \$20,000 to \$30,000—a pittance compared to the lives it saves. Danbury Rotary was invited to become investors in their work. This is an item that will come before the Board.
