The District Pettengill Award is named after 1964-65 RI president Charles W. Pettengill. A lawyer, former president of the Greenwich CT Club, former DG, and close personal friend of RI founder, Paul Harris, is one of our Connecticut heroes. The University of Bridgeport and the Bridgeport Rotary club had a dinner honoring him in July of 1964, and all Rotarians were invited.



In our Rotary year 2000-01 our club won the coveted Pettengill Outstanding Club Award under the stewardship of our club president, that year, Nels DeAlmeida.

One of the last letters Paul Harris penned, during his declining years, was to his friend Charlie Pettengill. Harris wrote, "I can still appreciate the press of a warm hand and a friendly face." During our pandemic we'll have to wait for the former, but the latter is still there. Charles W. Pettengill died on November 27, 1974.

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through his roof. Some of the stones went through the metal roofs of cars. It was the second destructive storm that year.

All of the above proves that the pandemic is just another hazard along the journey of life.
