Rotary PETS Speakers

Donald Clinebell—Service Driven Institute



In this and coming issues of PETS Connections, we are pleased to preview a stunning lineup of keynote speakers, one at each PETS general session.

Friday night will feature one of the most renowned club program and PETS faculty speakers in the world of Rotary. He is author, lay minister, leadership coach, and attorney Donald Clinebell, whose three widely read books are collectively known as "The Trilogy of Service."

Clinebell says his own life of service began reading aloud and telling stories every evening at the bedside of his slowly dying father. The final night, Clinebell writes, "my father listened attentively, nodding gently, but did not speak. As we finished supper, we sat together in the quiet...As I turned to go, Dad stirred and waived to me to return. 'You must write that book,'" his father told him. "That night was the beginning of my journey not just to write a book, but to dedicate my life to inspiring others to live a life that matters, a life of service."

Quoting a wide range of historical figures, including Thomas Jefferson, Thomas Edison, Gandhi, Albert Einstein, and Mother Teresa, among others, Clinebell's examples of simple service to family, friends, neighbors, communities, and nations constitute a compelling explanation of why each of these historic figures identified the inevitable principal beneficiary of service as the one who gives it.

As an illustration, he relates the story of a Rotarian surgeon and ophthalmologist, who some years ago participated in a Rotary National Immunization Day (NID) in India, before that country was declared poliofree. The surgeon told Clinebell that he had administered polio drops to an infant held in the arms of the baby's blind mother. As the surgeon studied her face, he was sure he could help her. On returning to the U.S., the doctor put together a surgical team, which flew back to India with him. After eye surgery lasting 10 hours, the mother was bandaged for a period of recovery. On removing her dressing, the mother looked up and burst into tears. For the first time in her life, she was able to see her husband and children. "I cried, too," the surgeon told Clinebell. "I discovered that however much we had changed the life at that young woman, my life had been changed even more." "This," Clinebell, told his Rotary audience "is what Service Above Self really means. In serving others, we serve ourselves."

Our PETS speaker is a graduate of Pomona College (*Phi Beta Kappa*) and UCLA School of Law. He also holds certifications in public speaking and lay preaching from the United Methodist Church. Do not miss this inspiring program.
