



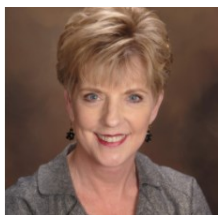

The Teacher's *PETS*

Education Chair Marilyn Sanderson



If Rotary Southwest PETS education were a motion picture, the director and screenwriter would be PDG Marilyn Sanderson (D 5340, San Diego).

Marilyn was born in Newport News, Virginia and grew up in Guthrie, Oklahoma. She earned a BA in Education from Oklahoma State University and an MS in Education from Wichita State University. She taught secondary language arts for many years before becoming a professional union negotiator and organizer for teachers in Oklahoma and California. She retired from the California Teachers Association in 2004.

Marilyn was president of the Rotary Club of La Mesa Sunrise in 2009-10, later serving her district as assistant governor, public image chair and executive aide to the district governor. She became district governor in 2016-17. Retiring from real estate, she moved to the desert, where she quickly became the president of the Rotary Club of Rancho Mi-

rage.

When asked to describe in a word the reason for attending PETS, Marilyn used three. "It's valuable, challenging, and rewarding," she says. These are the reasons I've been involved with PETS for the past 11 years."

How does she remember her own experience as a "PE"? "My first PETS as a club president-elect was a blur. Information by firehose," she says. "A thick binder of printed information from my DGE. (I admit I put it on a bookshelf...permanently)."

Determined to improve PETS, Marilyn proceeded to roll up her sleeves. "Since that first PETS, I've served as a presenter, facilitator and moderator as well as chairing the PETS Education Committee for four years to develop the curriculum – I loved that! Capturing the interest of the PEs, providing hands on materials, and challenging them to participate, learn and get to know each other – those are my consistent goals.

"I've served in many clubs, district and zone roles, including district governor. Every one of those positions was a learning experience providing me with what I need to be effective and inspiring for PEs. PETS is an exciting adventure, a challenge adapting to change and so rewarding to see the light bulb come on in the eyes of presidents elect. I wouldn't miss PETS for anything!

"And of course, the education sessions are a group effort," she says. "The talented, experienced and dedicated members of the Education Committee get the credit for the curriculum."

The energetic PETS education chair is looking forward to resuming the program in person at the LAX Marriott Hotel. During the weekend, take time to say hello. She is always eager to meet the new students.

DGE Olivia Patterson-Ryans



“I am the oldest of six children,” Olivia begins. “So, I learned leadership, management, organization, accountability and responsibility at a very early age. I did not realize I had these skills until later in my adult life. My siblings labeled my attributes as bossy, controlling, nosy and demanding...thus I was labeled,” she says laughing.

“After graduating from Pepperdine University with degrees in math and psychology, I taught high school algebra and geometry, earning teacher of the year from LA Unified School District. After obtaining my master’s degree, I worked as a high school counselor and dean of students. It had been my intention to be a high school principal, but working as an administrator, I became disillusioned with the politics of education.”

Olivia turned next to employment in the auto industry as a fleet manager, while also designing a sales course for employees in commercial trucks sales. From there her new skills led to a career in commercial real estate, where she today specializes in apartment building and property in probate. Desiring to build a stronger connection with the

community, Olivia became involved in the chamber of commerce, and, in due course, Rotary.

“Rotary has become a major part of my life,” she says. “I work and play with people from every community and from all over the world. Some have become my best friends. And what a joy it is to have a life partner (Rotarian Robert Ryans) who shares my Rotary values and experiences,” she says.

“PETS for me was like leaving my tight knit family and community and going off to university for the first time,” she recalls. “My exposure to the district, to Rotary International leaders and to other presidents elect expanded my Rotary world. Meeting and talking with Rotarians outside of my club stimulated my imagination and creativity. I went back to my club with fresh new ideas, several of which were accepted and implemented by my fellow club members.

“I was my club president in 2006-07. Since then, PETS has evolved, maintaining its relevancy to the times. It only gets *‘gooder and gooder.’* At PETS you will be joined by presi-

dents-elect from seven other districts. You will have the opportunity to not only learn from Rotarian leaders, but you will also meet new friends, sharing ideas and best practices and forming partnerships with Rotarians from all over the Western United States, including Hawaii!
