

# PRESIDENT Susie Ploder



Hello my fellow Rotarians and welcome to our annual report for 2021/22.

It has been a great honour and privilege to serve as our club President for the past year in 2021/22 and what a most significant year it has been as we celebrated our 85<sup>th</sup> birthday party last month. It was a time of great celebration and I doubt that there are many more clubs that have achieved such a significant milestone.

I feel humbled and very special indeed and I have grown significantly throughout the year. Thank you everyone for your kindness and guidance throughout the year. Together we achieved a great deal.

But in contrast to our very successful year, we have also had our share of great sadness. We lost our valuable members Brian Braithwaite in January and Harvey Else in March this year. Also our former Club President John Ritchie (President 1983/84) passed away during the year. These members were stalwarts of our club and gave many years of esteemed Service Above Self to our club, our community, our district, and internationally. They are sorely missed.

In this month we have also lost Mrs Diana Rose wife of Dr Colin Rose, which came as a great shock to us all. Diana always was behind the scenes supporting Dr Col in our club activities and was always there to lend a helping hand in our activities. Diana is also sorely missed and to Dr Col we extend our deepest sympathy.

As I start my yearly report as President, I also just want to share a brief background of my life.

I was born in the Philippines and studied Commerce for 4 years. During my studies I was involved in cultural dance in the Philippines to pay for my studies and during the day I worked as receptionist Girl Scout office to support my parents financially. I come to Australian 1981 to have a family of my own. I married Herbie and we have two children Sean Ploder and Rowena Ploder. We first lived in Old Bar in a quite area where I have not seen people walking outside and nothing exciting happening. I felt lonely and sad wanted to go back to the Philippines to be with my family members. Then I meet 3 Filipina friends. In my early years leaving in Old Bar, I said to myself 'this is not what I expected coming to Australian and becoming a lost person with no friends or relatives to talk to. I wanted to live in the big city to explore and learn more about the country. After few years living in Manning Area, I noticed that we do not have any people to contact and welcome our new Filipino people to our area. As a result, we formed a Filipina community and we named our group FIL-Oz Philippines Australia community. I was President in the group for 6 years and we used to meet every 2 weeks to catch up and eat our traditional Filipino food with lots of laughter and to welcome our new Filipina friends arriving in Taree .

After a few years living in this beautiful Manning area, I said to myself I want to do something and be part of this community. I met Mave Richardson as she was interested to meet some Filipina in the Manning Area. So, we started dancing in some local places and events to show and share our culture. This was very successful as our Filipino community raised enough money to donate one bed Manning River Hospital. Our dance group was a great success.

I was also involved in the Girls Guides and a BROWNIE leader for 15 years in Taree. Here I learned how to tie a knot and enjoyed camping with other leaders . As soon as our children went to school, I studied Child Care

at Taree TAFE and at the completion of my studies I applied for a job in child care at Cundletown Pre School where I been working for 26 years. I love gardening, cooking and crafts.

My life started in Rotary when I was invited by Laurie and Leonie Easter, Leonie in 2014. After 2 years in Rotary, I was the club Fundraising Director for 5 years and I was presented with a Paul Harris recognition Certificate and Pin in 2021.

I was inducted as President of Rotary club of Taree June 2021 and it started my mission in Rotary International. because of the COVID 19 pandemic.

We were using zoom to conduct meeting for 4 months just to connected with other members. A big thank you to Fr Peter Tinney for setting up Zoom to have our weekly meetings.

We also faced lots of challenges during my term of office - Drought, Fire, Flood and then came along COVID-19. We are now doing well and performing an amazing job to keep our Rotary family members safe.

I have also learnt a lot more about Rotary and the wider community.

It was my pleasure to induct 2 members during my year. we, one will be inducted at the changeover dinner.

The purpose of this report is to provide a summary of the donations and expenditures in each of the service activities, other than Club Administration, that have been supported by our club during the 2021-22 Rotary year, and as approved by the Board of Directors. During this year we have still had to contend with the COVID-19 restrictions, as well as the ongoing restrictions I have much pleasure in presenting the Treasurers Report for 2021/22 as at 31/05/2022.

This year was another good year for our club given how the impact of Covid-19 had on our club meetings. We have done exceptionally well under these circumstances. Our income has not skipped a beat and we are in a very good very financial position at this point in time.

It was really pleasing that all member subscriptions were paid for the year. Some financial highlights are:

1. The annual Australia Day Golf Day was a resounding success. This year we saw a record of 180 players taking part and this enabled us to continue our support our 3 main charities:

- 6. A district grant of \$4,000.00 was received for 20 baby kits at Ali Carung.

I would like to thank Ian for all his invaluable assistance throughout the past 2 years that I have been Secretary. I could not have done it without his help.


In closing I would like to thank President Susie and our many board members for their hard work and dedication throughout the year. It has been very educational and rewarding and a real privilege to serve in this capacity.

# **COMMUNITY SERVICE Director Neil Hanington**



This has been another very strange year with all the COVID-19 restrictions continuing.

#### **Rotary Central**

The Rotary Clubs of Taree, Taree on Manning and Taree North received government grants totaling \$120,000 to build a storage shed on land provided by the MidCoast Council. Our club proved the labour for the internal fit out of the building and the building is now well utilised.

#### **Bicentenary Park**

The Bicentenary Park project is continuing and the focus is to make the Bicentenary Park a showcase park at junction of the Manning River and Brown's Creek and when completed it will form part of Fig Trees on the Manning residential project which will transform the River bank at Chatham.

#### **Rotary Park**

We have been able to carry out an improvement to Rotary Park we have installed a Rotary Peace pole in the park.

RYSTEM Engagement Midcoast Inc - Rural Youth Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics

The RYSTEM company has been registered and we have obtained our ABN number and we are now underway with the new program.

In order to provide affordable science activities to our schools a company was formed with the Rotary clubs of Dungog, Gloucester, Great Lakes, Lower MidCoast, Taree, Taree on Manning, Taree North and Wingham as the shareholders with our Community Services Director acting as the Public Officer. The company is known as RYSTEM Engagement MidCoast Inc.

Our primary objective is to deliver these activities at no cost to our local schools

A number of scientific activities have been designed and were tested with the Dungog High School and this is an exciting project which we will bring to all the primary and secondary schools in our area.

Following on from the test program at Dungog High School the following events were conducted:

- 1. 3<sup>rd</sup> May at St Claire's High School 12 Rotarians from all clubs helped stage the event and lunch was provided by Rotary Club of Taree North.
- 2. 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> June at Taree Racecourse. This was the first full 3-day event RYSTEM has conducted for Primary and High Schools. The program was well received by the students and teachers and once again lunch was provided by Rotary Club of Taree North.

#### **Entrance to The Service Centre at Taree South**

We cleaned up the entrance the service centre and planted a row of tress along both sides of the road in collaboration with Midcoast Council and Taree Lions Club.



#### THE PROGRAMS OF THE ROTARY FOUNDATION

- a) Polio eradication. This is our number ONE priority.
- b) District Grants. These are small (up to about \$5,000) grants that can be used for local or international projects. The Rotary Club of Taree has successfully applied for 8 District Grants in the last 6 years.
- c) Global Grants are large (US\$30,000 minimum) projects where clubs/districts work with international partners
- d) Vocational Training Teams have replaced the former Group Study Exchange (which can still operate) and are focused on professionals travelling to learn or to teach about their vocation
- e) Area of Focus Scholarships, formerly known as Ambassadorial Scholarships, offering post-graduate level of studies aimed at enhancing career experience
- f) Rotary Peace Scholarships. Rotary has partnered with 7 leading universities around the world, including University of Queensland, where students are trained for placement variously around the world working towards peace and conflict resolution.

#### THE WAYS WE CAN SUPPORT OUR ROTARY FOUNDATION.



The Centurion Program, where we can contribute A\$100 per year to the Annual Programs Fund via Rotary Foundation Australia , set up to give tax deductibility. Contributions count towards Paul Harris Fellow recognition.



Paul Harris Fellow recognition, where a donation of US\$1,000 made by a club or an individual gives the opportunity for the club OR the individual to name a person a Paul Harris Fellow.



A Bequest Society member is an individual or a couple who have made a provision in their estate plan to gift a minimum US \$10,000 to The Rotary Foundation. The number of jewels designates the level of the bequest. A **Benefactor** is one who makes a provision of US\$1,000 in a will.

#### **DISTRICT 9650 ROTARY FOUNDATION GRANT**

Our ongoing support of The Rotary Foundation was critical in the approval of our Rotary Foundation District Grant application for \$4,000 for the provision of 20 baby kits to the community of Ali Curung in the NT. The contents of these kits was determined by the school principal in consultation with the mothers in the Ali Curung Community.

The preparation of these kits has been delayed due to the fact that major renovations and alterations at Alekarenge School has limited the space available to store and distribute the kits. We will continue to liaise with the school principal and anticipate that this project will proceed

very soon.

#### Our Partnership with Alekarenge School, NT

#### Initiated by our commitment to assist in the National program to EndTrachoma

The Rotary Club of Taree has been partnered with the Alekarenge School, in the community of Ali Curung, 378 km north of Alice Springs. We prepared, delivered and personally handed to the students 200 toiletry kits, plus other items such as blankets, rugs, pillows and nappies as requested during discussions with the then School Principal Colin Kiel. We discussed an extensive range of possible ways that Rotary could support and partner with the school and the community.

One of the EndTrachoma projects is the provision of mirrors in every home. PDG Helen Ryan and members of the Rotary Club of Nelson Bay have very generously supported our efforts by the purchase and provision of 145 packs of 3 acrylic mirrors, each measuring 300 mm square. 100 packs will go into the homes in Ali Curung; 25 packs are for Alekarenge School, and 25 packs for the nearby Murray Downs School and Community. We are very appreciative of this support.

There is still enormous potential for The Rotary Club of Taree to work with the school and our First Nation people in Ali Curung, particularly in the areas of health and education. We want these young people to have the same opportunities in life as our children have had, and are confident that we can find a pathway forward together.


#### SCHOOL OF SAINT JUDE: TANZANIA - STUDENT SPONSOR

The project is to fund one or more Emergency Department/s (Emergency Care Centres) in Kenya to purchase and install an oxygen gas manifold system. This is essentially a stable low-technology plumbing system to provide basic oxygen, from storage bottles to multiple patient beds.

Oxygen is fundamental to modern emergency care: relatively inexpensive, and essential to initial patient stabilization in a wide variety of life-critical emergency medical situations. The **overall goal of the Adopt-an-E.D**. project is to improve the basic emergency care services available to the general public in this relatively poor country, by focusing on its rural and countryside County hospitals.

Our Rotary Club has raised \$10,345 and with an incoming pledge from the DAK Foundation the total amount for 3 oxygen manifolds will be covered.

This month of June 2022, a Rotary Global Grant Application will be submitted and if successful the grant will be able to fund a total of 6 oxygen manifold, for 6 county hospitals in Kenya namely:

- 1. Kariuki County Referral Hospital. (Nyandarua. County- 167km from capital Nairobi)
- 2. Hola County Referral Hospital (Tana River County-487 km from capital city Nairobi)
- 3. Lamu County Referral Hospital (Lamu County-467 km from capital city Nairobi)
- 4. Wajir County Referral Hospital (Wajir County- 709 km from capital city Nairobi)
- 5. Iten County Referral Hospital (Elgeyo Marakwet County- 346 km from capital Nairobi)
- 6. Busia County Referral Hospital (Busia County-476 km from capital city Nairobi)

Once approved, we are aiming to have these 6 oxygen manifolds installed by year-end of 2022, with a plan for Taree Rotary Club Members as an Overseas Volunteer Team to visit to Kenya in 2023.

# COVID HOME CARE KIT SUPPORT PROGRAM PHILIPPINES - Registered as RAWCS Project 34-2021-22

The Project: In the Philippines, 80% of covid-confirmed cases are in home isolation, providing them with Home Care kits containing equipment for monitoring temperature and oxygenation as well as support medications will help prevent delayed hospital presentation/admission/death.

- A total of \$2,250 was raised, which allowed the purchase of 200 Covid Home Care Kits.
- Two hundred kits were distributed to 7 local municipal health units and had been distributed to covid patients with the left over distributed to health staff for monitoring of future covid cases.



For any organisation to survive for 85 years in a world that is constantly changing is a remarkable achievement.

As you know, Rotary, as an organisation was formed in February 1905, so that Rotary International was only 32 years old when the Rotary Club of Taree was formed in 1937 – sponsored by Newcastle. And can you imagine the drive from Newcastle in 1937. It would take a whole day.

To put that in some context, Rotary arrived in *Austria* in 1938, Italy in 1939 and so forth, so this is very old and distinguished club by any measure and we can be proud of it's many achievements.

Our lives are series of threads, in career and privately – those threads build a complex and unique patchwork, which reflects all aspects of who we are. Rotary was an important thread for me.

How did I become associated with Rotary?

After many career experiments and experiences, (all of which I enjoyed) I decided to pursue my love of images and with Jan's help, opened a pokey little photographic store in the Valley Fair shopping Centre. This was after I had declined offers of work as a journalist and broadcaster in other cities.

My first customer was Apexian and later a distinguished Rotarian called Peter Dahdah. We have been friends ever since.

That little one-man store eventually brought about many changes to the photo industry and spawned Australia's largest group of photo specialists – the Camera House group.

One day, a smiling pleasant man called Roy Allan dropped into my store – introduced himself and explained he was from the Rotary Club of Taree and would I like to consider joining the club.

I thought Rotary was only for special people, but on a handshake. I agreed to come along one night as his guest to see what it was all about. And from memory, I think it was the year of Rex Yen's Presidency, I became a proud Rotarian.

There have been many highlights for me as a member of the Rotary Club of Taree including the creation of special audio-visuals for Rotary conferences,

the aerial photography for the planning of Rotary Park – one of the best Rotary legacies on the coast – I also enjoyed being a Rotary Director looking after international exchange students – really great experiences with quality human beings... all future leaders of their communities.

And the really big one, assisting to create, maintain and grow our Sister Club arrangement with the Rotary Club of Okayama Chuo in southern Japan.

The Rotarians of Okayama Chuo have become very special to all of us and based on their actions, vice versa. I think it is the best international project we have done --- the sister club arrangement has been going now for almost 25 years and was an important part of Brian Hole's presidency who signed the formal agreement in the most memorable and enjoyable ceremony I can remember. My respects also to Herb Beer who was one of the early driving forces towards engaging with the city of Okayama and the Rotary Club of Okayama Chuo.

As an aside, I must tell you about my first night as a Rotarian after my induction. I sat down at a table opposite two older very distinguished Rotarians – one was Mert Duncan headmaster of Taree High School, the other was the head of the TAFE college at that time, whose name escapes me.

I was in my early twenties and had a young face. Mert said quietly, but loud enough for me to hear: "I see they are letting schoolboys into Rotary now!"

Without thinking I said something I wished I hadn't: "Could it be that

It is because you older guys don't do enough – and then wished I could swallow my tongue. But sometime later all was forgiven and we became Rotary friends.

The other thing I am very proud of is that one day I was talking with Ashley Cleaver and brought up the matter of introducing women to Rotary. After some discussion we decided to introduce the idea to a forthcoming Rotary dinner meeting I well remember dropping that bomb at a Rotary meeting at Manuels Restaurant.

World War 111 broke out almost immediately and I needed urgent surgery after being sawn off at the knees by some

Rotary luminaries. Following a harsh rejection of the idea I was quietly determined and we decided to re-introduce the subject in about 6 months time.

This produced a more muted response and within a year or so we had our first female member. And you have to ask yourself: what would Rotary be today without our female members. The change spread across Australia and the world.

Although many members threatened to resign, in the end most did not and our club and Rotary worldwide are stronger and better for the move.

Finally, a tribute to President Susie Ploder; she took on the top job and with energy and determination, has made it work. Well done, Susie....
