IMAGINATION

It always seemed to me that it wasn't easy to find information about the club. It was listen at the meetings, scroll through old Spokes, or ask Wendy. In fact, when I was a new Rotarian in 2015, I asked where I could find information and the seasoned Rotarian said, "call the office." Not much has changed. We have a website. There is a lot of information but much of it is out of date. Worse – it's hard to tell what is out of date.

One of the goals I had for my Presidency next year was to get more accurate information out to the members. Since I have started early. I may as well start that early. First up: Putting the minutes of the Board meetings online. We're creating a place where members can review the minutes. By the time you read this, I expect that most of 2021, all of 2022 and the first part of 2023 will be there. We won't put the current minutes up until the Board approves them in the following month so, if you want those, it's still ask Wendy or ask me.

Sign into DACDB, go to MyClub, then Club Files, go to the secure area and click on Board minutes.

My first task is to make the information available. Making it easy to get to is going to take a while.

Next: making sure the calendar on DACDB is up to date with all events and making sure the website is accurate.

If you're wondering why it will take so long – the DACDB training is all by video. I've asked Future District Governor Michael Soden to *please* find me something to read.



Join Howard's table - he has people interested in our club - Sit with them and Spark the Fire!!

Membership recruitment tip of the week— you don't have to invite everyone you meet. Meet prospective members when they visit. To my surprise, and to Howard Raff's, some of you think that Howard's table is fully reserved and invitation only. Not only can you sit there but you are encouraged to do so. Some weeks, he has 3 or 4 people visiting and he can't talk to all of them at lunch. You don't even have to pitch Rotary. All you have to do is talk to them. There's nothing that will convince someone *not* to join more than sitting alone and staring around the room.



Helen Baas introduced our speaker today, Dr. Ron White, a historian, lecturer, and author of a 675-page biography of President Abraham Lincoln, who found himself in Hamburg, Germany in 2008 at the invitation of the State Department to speak to high school teachers about America, and specifically about President Lincoln. It was a low point for American relations due to the Iraq War, and Dr. White was at the American Embassy to try to re-invigorate the American ideals, and the German high school teachers wanted to know all about President Lincoln – both Washington and Jefferson were "well-born people" and Lincoln, in the eyes of the European educators, was "a man of lowly birth who earned the right to be President of the new country, America."



Immediate Past President Cory Brendel rang the Rotary Bell on time and proclaimed the meeting to be open, as President Justene Adamec - serving an 18-month term – is giving past presidents a rotation at the podium. PP Cory offered his "first tip to future Presidents – End the meeting on time, at exactly 1:30 pm." He seems to have learned the hard way and started the meeting promptly with a musical love ballad by the late, great Burt Bacharach (Lyrics by Hal David), "I Pray a Little Prayer for You", with Don Andrues on bass guitar and Jonathan Edewards on a percussion



tube-thing. Cory led us all on the trumpet part, which meant we tried to sound like a kazoo with our mouths, to hilarious results (imagine being in a car with your friends trying to sound like the trumpets parts). PP Cory announced a "Save the Date" for the Annual District Conference in Las Vegas on May 5-7. This is our District 5300, which stretches from Pasadena all the way out to Las Vegas, and here is your chance to tell your office and clients that "you are serving the greater good by attending the Rotary Conference" while sneaking away for a weekend in Vegas. You need a break, and the Conference highlights the good community deeds our club has done in the past Rotary year.



- PP Cory also announced that since President Justene was doing a double-duty- year,
 Stephen Smith has been promoted from President-Elect-Elect to the high honor of President-Elect. The room applauded politely.
- PP Scott Vandrick appeared at the podium to predict the future (since his year celebrated the 100 years of Pasadena Rotary past while he was president (2019- 2020) "The First Ever Pop Trivia Bonanza" with fellowship that includes fun at every table, every member, and a challenge to be the Master Player for bragging rights. There will be valuable swag, from the past and the future, with PP Scott being the emcee. Jan Sanders won the first prize (bragging rights) by correctly guessing that Phantom of the Opera was fictionally situated in Paris!
- John Burt made two announcements. The RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership academy chaired by Desiree Alvarado) will host 200 high school 10th and 11th Grade students in the mountains of Idyllwild on March 24-26th, and our club is sponsoring ten (10) local students we are seeking "facilitators" and if you feel the calling, we could use you. David McAlexander and PP Mary Lou Byrne are among the club members who enthusiastically feel it's a worthwhile weekend experience for the students, and the facilitators.

A very worthwhile experience that delves into the deeper issues that Rotarians care about in a divided world – see what Rotary can and does do to bring peace and prosperity to the world.

Then PP Cory saw that his effective time management of announcements and guest introductions gave him five minutes to go free-lance, so he decided to unleash the members to introduce themselves around the table and find the member whose birthday is closest to today – that member has to tell that table a personal fact about themselves that no one would know – and chaos ensued. Trying to reign in the room took a mighty swing of the club mallet onto the Rotary Bell – we do like having fun!



Helen Baatz introduced our speaker, Dr. Ron White, who had authored and offered his latest book. "Lincoln In Private -" What His Most Personal Reflections Tell Us About Our Greatest President" and it was fascinating. Dr. White offered that Lincoln is the most quoted president, and one of the first to come from such humble beginnings to rise to President, and during a time that the country was tearing itself apart over slavery. He lost his first term as a congressman over his concern that the US started the war with Mexico and went back to being a country lawyer in the rural Illinois for the next five years. It was his intolerance of slavery that led to his famous debate with Douglas in 1958, between two Illinois Senate candidates, and even though Lincoln lost the Senatorial race, the publication of the debates by a Columbus, Ohio publisher led to Lincoln becoming probably the first social media star - since the debates elevated Lincoln's stature enough for him to be elected to President in 1860.

Also, of new interest, was the time an unformal educated Lincoln learned the law and the skills of representing

plaintiffs in the courtroom, and how he wrote notes to himself as a loose-note pile of notes, 112 of them known to exist, and shaped his style and language to be the Lincoln quotes we know today. His rise from the prairies of Illinois to the White House was not direct, and totally without precedent, and the book explores Lincoln's inner thoughts as he navigated one of the most turbulent times that shaped the America we know and revere today.

Dr. White shared four of these fascinating notes with us on Slavery, Niagara, Meditation on the Divine Will and Notes for a Law Lecture.

Following an active Q&A session, members enjoyed a book signing.


